Course Objective:

This class is a survey of Southwestern archaeology. The course is reading intensive and relies on lecture and discussion based on reading material. The goal of the class is to provide a general and brief exposure to topics in archaeology in different areas of the continent north of Mexico. Though topics are covered by sub-region and period, several current issues in archaeology are also subject matter for the course.
