Course Description

Spanish 2040 is a language course designed to bring students to an intermediate level of proficiency in the Spanish language. The course focuses on Spanish grammar and emphasizes in particular listening, speaking, reading and writing skills. Students will participate in listening comprehension activities, oral projects, in-depth cultural study, readings, audio and video resources, as well as Web-based language interaction. The class will be conducted in Spanish and students are expected to use only Spanish in all assignments.

Pre-requisites

This course is designed for students who have passed Spanish 1010, 1020, 1030 at UNT or the equivalent. For more information, please contact the Department of Spanish in LANG 101, 565-2404.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course students will be able to:

- Analyze personal relations, cultural values, traditions, and celebrations
- Discuss food and eating habits
- Analyze historical figures, politics, and contemporary society
- Recall and describe past events
- Express feelings, opinions, preferences, and desires
- Recommend or tell others to do something
- Convey doubt, hope, and uncertainty
- Explain what you and others have done

Required Materials

Blitt, Casas and Copple. *Exploraciones* Curso Intermedio 1st edition. Book with iLrn access code for online homework (iLrn) ISBN: 9781285193953. If you buy a used textbook, you can purchase the access code separately at https://hlc.quia.com/books/bookstore.html. Your instructor will provide a second code in Canvas that you will be using along with the book code to register for the course. This textbook and access code will be good for two semesters of Spanish: SPAN 2040 and 2050.

IMPORTANT: It is highly recommended that you take SPAN 2050 this summer or spring 2019. Beginning Fall 2019, we will not be using this textbook and iLrn key anymore as we are adopting a new textbook.

IMPORTANT: When you buy the access code for the homework, you will also have access to the electronic textbook. Buying the hard copy of the textbook is optional, but the access code is obligatory.

- A computer webcam, microphone, and speakers (or a headset with microphone) will also be required to complete the oral exercises.
- **Systems:** UNT Canvas, Cengage iLrn Learning Center. (iLrn is the website where you will have access to grammar video tutorials, interactive eBook, voiceboards, study flashcards, practice tests. You need to buy the card code and register to have access to this website).
- **IMPORTANT:** Canvas and iLrn work better using **Chrome or Firefox** browsers.
- Be sure to update Adobe Flash Player and Java in your computer.

Course Content

All the content of the course will be stored in in the main menu in Canvas. Study assignments are organized in 4 modules. Modules will cover **chapters 1-4** in the textbook and include specific information about readings and assignments for each week. It is your responsibility to consult the class schedule and meet the deadlines for all assignments. Work on assignments at your own pace but keep in mind that <u>all weekly assignments</u> have to be <u>turned in before every Friday 5:00 pm</u>. This is a fast course and it is highly recommended to work on assignments every day. Late work will not be accepted.

In order to enroll in the next level of Spanish, students need to pass this course with a final grade of C and above.

ACTIVE PARTICIPATION

The participation portion of your grade will be derived from the level and quality of your interaction with other students and your professor in the course. As active participation, and to practice your writing,

listening and speaking skills in Spanish, you will be required to complete **weekly discussions** (<u>3 written</u> and 2 comments each and 2 videos and 2 video comments each) in Canvas on specific topics related to the chapter of study. After you post your discussion, you will watch or read the answers of **two** students and you will give each of them a substantial comment.

Written Discussions and comments: during the course you will be posting in Canvas 3 writing discussions and will be giving 1 writing comments to two students' writing posts (for a total of 9 writing discussions). Writing discussions and comments must be the student's work and should reflect their writing skills. Using translators or outside help for this assignment will result in a grade of 0 without the opportunity to redo the work.

Video Discussions and comments: during the course, you will be posting in Canvas 2 short video discussions and will be giving 1 video comment to two students' video posts (for a total of 6 short videos). Written or audio comments will not be accepted. Reading while making the video will result in a grade of 0 without the opportunity to redo the work. For more information and rules, read "On Academic Integrity" section of this syllabus, page 5.

Full information is provided in Canvas. Discussions will be graded according to the rubric provided. **Late work is not permitted.**

Early Discussions Submission Bonus:

Students who 1) submit their first post by Wednesday at 11:59 pm AND 2) submit their 2 comments by Friday at 5:00 pm will earn +2 points extra credit added to their discussion score for that week. However, students who submit their first post early, but then do NOT submit their 2 reply comments will not be eligible for the 2 bonus points because they did not fully complete the assignment. The purpose of this incentive is to motivate early submission, and thereby provide a wider variety of posts for reply commenting by classmates. This is the grading policy for ALL online courses.

QUIZZES

There is only one quiz in this course. This quiz is for a grade and it will evaluate your knowledge over the <u>syllabus and Canvas informational modules</u>. It is important to read the syllabus completely and get familiar with the information in Canvas before taking the quiz. For this quiz you will have **two attempts** and you will receive the highest grade. To take the quiz you will need to download (one time) in your computer the application "LockDown Browser System" provided by UNT. The link and instructions to download the application, and <u>how to access the quiz and exams</u> is available in the correspondent folder in Canvas. Taking quiz 1 using LockDown will also serve as a practice before you take exams. Without the application you will not be able to open quiz 1 and exams. **Late work will not be accepted.**

iLrn ONLINE HOMERWORK

Using iLrn (textbook website), you will be assigned a variety of weekly online activities and Grammar videos to watch from both the textbook and the SAM (Student Activities Manual). Weekly homework is due every Friday before 5:00 pm. It is highly recommended to watch the grammar videos and do the homework every day and before taking the exams. Late work will not be accepted.

CHAPTER EXAMS

There will be one exam for each chapter covered in the textbook (4 exams total). **All exams will be using the Lockdown Browser System application.** you will need to download the application to your computer in advance. For more information about this system, see the folder in Canvas. Exams can be taken at **home or in the Language Lab** (Lang building, room 105, check their website for their

schedule). More information and a study guide before each exam are available in Canvas.

Chapter exams will evaluate your listening, reading, writing, vocabulary and grammatical skills. Each exam will be available ONLY on the days and time assigned in the course calendar and will be timed. You will be logged out of the exam once the time allowed expires. If you take the exam in the Language lab, plan your time well and arrive at least two hours before the lab closes. Lab is closed Saturdays and Sundays. You will need to bring your UNT student ID and sign in and out at the front desk. Without ID students will not be able to take the exam. **Make-ups for exams will not be accepted**. For exams due dates consult the course calendar.

IMPORTANT NOTE ABOUT EXAMS:

- All chapter exams are <u>closed book</u>, <u>closed notes</u>, <u>closed resources</u>. Exams must be taken <u>alone</u> and no communication with other individuals is allowed. The usage of electronic translators is completely prohibited. As a UNT student, academic integrity and honesty are expected of you. Infringements on this policy will result in a grade of 0.
- Before taking exams and when prompted by the LockDown Browser System, students need to **complete and fully** show their environment to the webcam, including their desk or lap. Failure to do so will result in a grade of 0 for the exam without another opportunity to take it.
- Do not start any exam until you are ready to take it.
- The timer starts upon access and the exam will close when the time is over.
- Do not navigate away from or exit an online exam before hitting the submit button as this may lock you out of the exam and invalidate your score.
- Notify your professor immediately if you experience a technical issue while taking an exam. Take a screen shot as a proof of the problem and send it to your professor if necessary.
- Students who do not write the writing portion of exams will not be allowed to submit the following written discussion.

A Note on Computers:

- Do not wait until the last minute. Take your exam as early as possible. In the event of a technical issue with your computer, you are able to solve it and take the exam before the deadline.
- Make sure your laptop computer is <u>fully charged</u> before beginning the exam. Make up for exams will not be allowed due to computer problems.

FINAL ORAL CONVERSATION

At the end of the course you will have a short conversation in Spanish with your Professor or a classmate using the "Conference" Video call feature in Canvas (for more information see the Module "Conversación Final" in Canvas). The conversation will last for 2-3 minutes per student, cover communicative functions practiced in class, and will be based on topics related to chapters themes covered during the course. You will be graded on content and detail provided, incorporation of grammatical structures and vocabulary studied throughout the course, preparation, and use of communication strategies. Students will sign up a week in advance (in Canvas Calendar) on the day and time provided by the instructor and best fits their schedule. For this assignment you will need a webcam in your computer.

Grading rubric, topics, questions and guidelines are available in "Conversación Final" folder in Canvas. Consult the Class Schedule for the due date. If there is a conflict with the time slots available, contact your instructor immediately to reschedule.

The paragraph reads:

(G) For F–1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken on-line or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination or other purposes integral to completion of the class. An on-line or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F–1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no on-line or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experience integral to the completion of this course.

If such an on-campus activity is required, it is the student's responsibility to do the following:

- (1) Submit a written request to the instructor for an on-campus experiential component within one week of the start of the course.
