# Shakespeare: Fall 2022 Tuesday/Thursday 9:30am – 11:50am AUD 100

### **Description:**

Discovering a closer relationship, understanding and ease with Shakespeare are the primary focus of this class, which includes Breaking down Shakespeare's language through primary, secondary and tertiary methods, developing rehearsal techniques for the actor, cultivating a sense of curiosity and equivalency with this 450+ year old language, exploring all aspects of poetic rhetoric, and using the fundamental techniques of character and scene building. Acting is behaving truthfully under imaginary circumstances.

## **Objective:**

At the completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- \*Breakdown the poetic language of Shakespeare's text
- \*Apply the advanced processes of acting fundamentals/realism work
- \*Enhance their observation, curiosity and self-reflection/analysis of their acting instrument in this specialized form

#### **ATTENDANCE & PUNCTUALITY POLICY**

(2 Meetings a Week)

Punctual attendance is critical for your success in the course. Thus, students are expected to be present and punctual for all classes.

The following policy is consistent with all acting courses in the department:

- Students are allowed no more than a total of THREE (3) absences during the semester.
- Students are considered tardy if they arrive for class no more than 30 minutes late.

Arriving more than 30 minutes late for class is considered an absence.

- Students are expected to attend class for the duration of the period. Leaving before the class concludes is considered an absence.
- An occurrence of tardiness for the class FOUR (4) times is the equivalent or ONE (1) absence.
- A total of (4) absences means that the highest grade the student can earn in the class is an F.

Any student with an issue in the area of attendance and/or punctuality will be referred to the Acting Faculty for guidance.

If a student's absences have resulted in a grade with which they are not pleased, they may choose to withdraw from the class.

The professor's roll is the official record of absences and tardiness. At any point, students are welcome to check the grade roster on Canvas to be sure that their attendance/punctuality record is accurate.

### STUDENT OBLIGATION TO ACADEMIC/PRODUCTION WORK

Dance & Theater students are expected to budget and organize their time and efforts in order to meet both their academic and production commitments satisfactorily and on time. The faculty and staff recognize that the academic and production assignments within the department, as well as outside employment and other obligations, sometimes impose conflicting pressures on DT students. One of the main responsibilities of each student is to identify carefully and monitor the commitments that comprise his/her departmental assignments and outside obligations.
