Description/ Objective:

Acting Styles will focus on the Period Styles from Greek to Vaudeville. Students will research and study the trends of the periods as well as the art, clothing and other societal impacts on each individual form.

At the completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- *Identify the primary structures of each style
- *Apply the processes of voice and body work dictated by each style
- *Work with an ensemble to present a specific style period

Attendance:

In-Class Participation is 50% of your overall grade. You can only learn Acting: Realism by being in the room and engaging in the exercises. Therefore. It is imperative to your success in class that you are present, on time and ready to work. If you are absent you will not receive your 20 participation points for that day. If you are more than 10 MINS TARDY you will forfeit 10pts of your participation day. This is due to that fact that

punctuality is of the highest importance in the theater world and to the fact that missing the warm-up is detrimental to your ability to work fully in class that day. **One can only learn acting by DOING.**

Dress Code:

Students are required to wear clothing that allows for unrestricted movement to each class. The main focus of our work takes place on our feet, on the ground and in motion. Therefore students must feel comfortable and able to move without restrictions. However, there may be specific styles that require the use of long skirts, character shoes (no-spike heel of 1.5 inches), and men's suit jackets. I will inform you of these needs ahead of time.

Disability Accommodations:

Assignments:

Scene Work: One can only learn acting by DOING. Therefore, it is imperative to your success in the class that you are present, on time, and ready to work. Each style will require scene work, memorization, and outside class rehearsals with your partner/s.

Final Group Project: The class will be broken into five groups each representing one of the main styles we studied over the course of the semester. (Vaudeville, Comedy of Manners, Commedia, Restoration and Greek) Each group will be required to produce a 10 minute presentation on the style including The history, influences and “sign posts” of the style. *Please include visual aids* Each group will also be required to present a 10 minute scene example of the period, using an alternative playwright to the one used in class. Each member of the group is required to participate in at least one aspect. (Presentation or Scene) An Assignment Guideline will be handed out when the groups are assigned.
