Course Description

The CHEM 2370 is the first introductory undergraduate organic chemistry curriculum at UNT. The course will cover material from chapters 1 – 10 from the Solomons and Fryle Organic Chemistry textbook. The focus of the study will be on understanding the organic structure, nomenclature, occurrence, and uses of main classes of organic compounds; functional groups and their interconversion; the character of chemical bonding; stereochemistry; structure and reactivity; acid/base reactions, resonance, inductive and steric effects; reaction mechanisms. Please look at the [course guide document](#) for the timeline of the topics. This is an online/internet course, weekly modules are the main resource for information, and additional information can be obtained from the textbook. During the first few weeks, the quizzes and assignments will be posted weekly, once the students are adjusted to the routine, quizzes and assignments will be posted much earlier so students can finish the assignments at their convenience. Entire course material is available online, each chapter will contain PowerPoint presentations, online lectures (pre-recorded with CC), activity quizzes, homework problems,

and practice problems. NO PERSONAL MEETINGS OR IN-PERSON SESSIONS ARE INCLUDED, OFFICE HOURS ARE NOT MANDATORY.

Course Prerequisites or Other Restrictions

Students must have taken General Chemistry I and II (CHEM 1410 and CHEM 1420) and earned a grade of C or above. This is an Internet course. Course enrollment is restricted and non-texas resident students residing outside of the state are not eligible to enroll in this section.

Course Structure and Preparation

The course is designed to be fully online. Course content is available on Canvas, students will have the opportunity to attend the online office hours with the instructor and the TA. Because the class is designed online, office hour meetings are NOT mandatory. Students will finish the required homework problems and submit them through Canvas for grading. Students will finish every graded/non-graded assignment at their convenience and are expected to submit on/before the due dates. All materials, assignments, quizzes, and exams are delivered online on Canvas, and information about other learning platforms will be provided. Students are required to finish the Exams online using the Respondus Lockdown Browser, Exams are available for 24 hours, 3 mid-term exams are included, made available on a Saturday, The Final exam will be made available following UNT's final exam schedule.

Because this is an Internet course, the students are expected to be prepared to cover all the material using resources available on Canvas. Contrary to what you may have heard, organic chemistry does not have to be a difficult course. You will learn more in it than in almost any course you will take—and what you learn will have special relevance to life and the world around you. However, because organic chemistry can be approached logically and systematically, you will find that with the right study habits, mastering organic chemistry can be a deeply satisfying experience.

1. Watch for the due dates for each assignment and plan your reading/preparation accordingly
2. Watch online lectures more than once if required. Write notes while watching online lectures.
3. Attend TA's session so you can go over the problems or questions in detail.
4. Keep up with your work from day to day—never let yourself get behind.
5. Study material in small units and be sure that you understand each new section before you go on to the next.
6. Work all class review/practice problems.
7. Work all the in-chapter and assigned problems.
8. Write when you study.
9. Learn by teaching and explaining.

10. Use molecular models when you study.

NOTE: The instructor does everything to ensure closed captions are accurate for all the recordings, however, if there are issues with cc's, students are requested to reach out to the instructor or the TA for clarification. Many of these recordings are from a previous semester, reference to a previous semester's due dates, exam discussions, or bonus point questions/discussions needs to be disregarded. Only focus on the chemistry content of the recording.

Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to

1. Recognize the key aspects of online learning and evaluate the differences between in-person and online teaching for organic chemistry courses.
2. Correlate Structure-property relationships for physical properties
3. Correlate Structure-property relationships for chemical properties (including chemical reactions)
4. Name chemical structures (i.e. naming compounds)
5. Design synthesis of organic compounds
6. Draw reaction mechanisms using curved arrows
7. Recall reactions of different functional groups
8. Applying basic reactions of functional groups in new reaction designs

In addition to materials on Canvas, perfecting questions from the Solomons Textbook will be the next best thing and is a highly recommended activity for mastering the concepts.

Teaching Philosophy

The course covers basic and moderate concepts of organic chemistry. The main objective of the course is to cement the knowledge and understanding of basic organic chemistry concepts. My strong belief is true teaching is evident only if students can learn, understand, and finally be in a position to apply their knowledge for the benefit of their own lives and the betterment of society. The teaching or learning process will not have any impact if the teaching process becomes a process of accumulation of information that can be obtained from various resources easily. I believe a good teaching classroom should be safe, friendly, and accommodative, and provide the opportunity to every student. All students have the right to learn and should be allowed to expand their knowledge and advance beyond their socioeconomic limitations. I will do my best as the instructor of this class to provide information, resources, and experience to the students so the course objectives are met at the end of the semester.

Practice Exams: Practice exams will be posted 1-2 days before the actual exam, NOT GRADED AND NOT MANDATORY. The key will not be released for practice exams because some questions from the practice exam are expected to show up in the actual exam(s).

Bonus Points Note: A total of 25-30 points are bonus questions are planned for this semester, made available through Canvas Announcements. Students are required to send the answers to the instructor and TA within the timeline as mentioned in the recording. Because of the nature of points (bonus), no additional time will be granted. The answers need to be clear with structures and reactions as required for full points.

Bonus questions from online lectures are NOT CURRENT, new bonus questions will be posted through Canvas announcements.

Individual Chapter Quizzes – Open book, 5 points for each chapter, questions are based on fundamentals and background concepts of that chapter to evaluate students' readiness for that chapter.

Chapter Problems (graded) – Open book, 20 points for each chapter. Questions are easy to moderate level of difficulty.

Practice Problems – Two types of practice problems, Graded and Non-Graded. Two graded practice problem assignments will be available for the entire semester. While each chapter will contain a non-graded assignment. Non-graded and graded practice problem assignments are Open book.

Discussion topics - will be streamed on Canvas. Discussion posting must strictly relate to the topic posted, and postings and responses must strictly adhere to "Rules of Engagement". Any out-of-limits postings will be deleted and the student will be penalized accordingly.

Zoom Recordings – Full lecture recordings are available for every chapter, DISREGARD THE DUE DATES, BONUS QUESTIONS, EXAM KEY DISCUSSIONS, AND OTHER DISCUSSIONS about THE PREVIOUS SEMESTER IN THESE RECORDINGS. ASK the TA or the instructor if there is any confusion.

Submission – All submissions are online (Canvas). Please submit assignments within the given timeline, do not ask for an extension unless there is an emergency or DOS note available. Please check the course guide for a tentative timeline. If required, the timeline will be modified based on progress made every week.

Examinations Policy - Exams are fully online, available through Respondus LockDown Browser. Students are required to have an ID while taking the exam. Mid-term exams are made available on a Saturday for 24 hours, while the Final exam will be made available following the UNT Final Exam Schedule. Students need to be prepared with the required technology.

FINAL Grade Policy - At the end of the semester, the student's final grade will be calculated based on 500 or 550 points, depending on whether one of the mid-terms is dropped or not. One of the lower mid-terms will be dropped for a higher final. The final exam will not be replaced.

Exam rules:

- Semester exams (not including the final) are 90-120 minutes in length and will cover the most recent material, 20-30 questions.
- The final exam will be comprehensive covering 1-10 chapters and will be 90-120 minutes in length (30-45 questions)
- Modeling kits are allowed during the exams.
- No extra time will be provided for tardiness.
- Questions will be multiple choice mostly. Be prepared for both multiple-point questions and short-answer questions during the mid-term and final exams.
- Exams are done under the lockdown browser (**LDB**). Please be prepared for that(download/install)
- Cell phones are not permitted (may not use cell phones as calculators) and TI Nspire or any other electronic devices are not permitted
- Cheating will result in a zero.
- No one is permitted to leave the room and return during the exams
- Students are required to explain any red flags on LDB during the exam, if not, the grade will be upheld until the red flag is cleared or explained.
- Exams must be completed online. LockDown Browser(LDB) with a webcam is required to take the exams and quizzes. LDB is like any other browser, the only difference is that LDB will not let you open additional pages while you are working in Canvas. Please notice that LDB is not available for Chromebooks. Installation information will be uploaded as a separate document into CANVAS.
- Note: The lowest of the mid-term exams can be dropped for a higher final. Students are **required** to take all midterm exams, with no exceptions. An absent exam will not be dropped, in this case, all 3 exams (including the absent exam) will be considered towards the final grade. The absent exam will be counted as a zero.

A student owns the copyright for all work (e.g. software, photographs, reports, presentations, and email postings) he or she creates within a class and the University is not entitled to use any student work without the student's permission unless all of the following criteria are met:

- The work is used only once.
- The work is not used in its entirety.
- Use of the work does not affect any potential profits from the work.
- The student is not identified.
- The work is identified as student work.

If the use of the work does not meet all of the above criteria, then the University office or department using the work must obtain the student's written permission.

Transmission and Recording of Student Images in Electronically-Delivered Courses

1. No permission is needed from a student for his or her image or voice to be transmitted live via videoconference or streaming media, but all students should be informed when courses are to be conducted using either method of delivery.
2. In the event an instructor records student presentations, he or she must obtain permission from the student using a signed release to use the recording for future classes following the Use of Student-Created Work guidelines above.
3. Instructors who video-record their class lectures intending to re-use some or all of the recordings for future class offerings must notify students on the course syllabus if students' images may appear on the video. Instructors are also advised to provide accommodation for students who do not wish to appear in class recordings.

Example: This course employs lecture capture technology to record class sessions. Students may occasionally appear on video. The lecture recordings will be available to you for study purposes and may also be reused in future course offerings.

No notification is needed if only audio and slide capture are used or if the video only records the instructor's image. However, the instructor is encouraged to let students know the recordings will be available to them for study purposes.

Class Recordings & Student Likenesses

Asynchronous sessions/Zoom lectures in this course will be recorded for students enrolled in this class section to refer to throughout the semester. Class recordings are the intellectual property of the university or instructor and are reserved for use only by students in this class and only for educational purposes. Students may not post or otherwise share the recordings outside the class, or outside the Canvas Learning Management System, in any form. Failing to follow this restriction is a violation of the UNT Code of Student Conduct and could lead to disciplinary action.
