DESCRIPTION

In this course, we will get to learn the basic concepts as well as practical skills and the conceptual framework in phonetics and phonology. We will talk about the production and perception of speech sounds and discuss their physiological and acoustic aspects. Among other things, we will learn how different languages of the world can be written and read with the help of the International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA). We will learn how to transcribe languages that we do not speak or understand. The class will look at data from a broad sample of languages. We will study the basic principles governing the behavior of sounds in different languages. Taking a broad typological view in our approach, we will look at how the sound patterns of individual languages are similar, and how they vary across different languages.

The final grade for the course will be based on:

Homework assignments/problem solving: 50% (a total of 10)

Student-led reading presentations (graduates only) and summaries: 10% (2 selected readings each)
