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All cultures have some form of ritual music. According to Bruno Nettl, it may be one of the true universals of music culture. Making music together, in fact, may be the Ur-ritual where the *Mitsein* (being-with) of human comportment was forged. From its possible proto-musical origins in our hominid ancestors, to current iterations in both sacred and secular contexts, the music/ritual nexus will be explored from an ontomusicological perspective, an approach that questions music *as* ritual and ritual *as* music.

Class Structure:

Each week a member of the seminar will present a 1-2 page protocol that summarizes the previous week's discussion and poses a series of questions that carries issues and concerns forward.

Grade Assessment:

Seminar paper (15-20 pages), assignments, and class participation. Class participation encompasses several measures of engagement with the class, including effectiveness of protocol presentations and general level of contribution to class discussions.

A paper proposal (roughly two pages) is due the 6^{th} week of class. An annotated bibliography is due the 8^{th} week of class.

Requirements:

- Ability to conduct independent research
- Writing skills commensurate with a graduate seminar
- Engagement in class discussion
