Course Description

Every organization in both the public and private sector is in varying degrees dependent on materials and services supplied by other organizations. No organization is self-sufficient. Purchasing and supply management is, therefore, one of the key business processes in every organization. This course is designed to provide an introduction to the field of purchasing and supply management. It covers topics such as how supply is organized within organizations, the standard acquisition process, purchasing-related information systems, cost management tools, negotiation strategies, supplier selection, metrics, purchasing capital goods, purchasing services, outsourcing, buyer-supplier relationships, and purchasing strategies.

Course Structure

OPSM 4810-001 is a face-to-face course. The course materials will be covered in approximately 16 weeks from August 19, 2024 to December 13, 2024. A mid-term exam is scheduled on Monday, October 7, 2023. A final exam (not comprehensive) is scheduled on Monday, December 9, 2024.

Course Prerequisites or Other Restrictions

While there are no prerequisites for this course, it is a senior-level course. As such, you are expected to have a working knowledge of the topics covered in the freshman and sophomore level courses. This prerequisite material includes statistics, forecasting, and regression. We will not address material already covered in those courses. Additionally, you should have a working knowledge of the internet, Canvas LMS, McGraw-Hill Connect, Microsoft Office, Zoom, and the Respondus Lockdown browser.

Course Objectives

The main goal of the course is to provide students in business and other relevant disciplines with an in-depth understanding of the key activities involved in buying and utilizing materials as well as their impact on an organization's performance. The secondary objective is to develop the students' skills in communication, teamwork, and critical thinking through classroom discussions and group projects.

Use of Artificial Intelligence in this Class

By including the questions or queries posed to AI, students demonstrate transparency in their research process and allow for the evaluation of their engagement with AI technologies as part of their academic endeavors.

It is important to remember that while AI can augment learning experiences, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills, it is not a substitute for independent thought and analysis. As such, students are encouraged to engage critically with AI-generated content and to exercise discernment in interpreting and utilizing AI-generated insights within their academic work.

Any instances of plagiarism or unethical use of AI technologies will be subject to the university's academic integrity policies and may result in disciplinary action. As responsible scholars, we uphold the principles of honesty, integrity, and respect for intellectual property in all academic endeavors, including the use of AI tools.

Teaching Philosophy

Copying or using material from any source prepared by or previously submitted by others, at UNT or other institutions, or downloaded from the Internet, is plagiarism. Unless directed otherwise in an assignment, large scale "cutting and pasting" from other sources, even if properly footnoted, is not appropriate. You should synthesize this material in your own words and provide a footnote.

Your instructor will specify what materials, if any, may be used on the tests and exams. Using materials other than those permitted, talking with other individuals during the exam, individuals exchanging information about an exam when one has taken the exam and the other has not, or copying or using material from another individual's exam is academic dishonesty and will result in a meeting to discuss academic integrity violations and potentially issue sanctions mentioned above, and may result in ineligibility for academic scholarships. The use of online assistance, such as sites commonly used for finding homework solutions, group chat, cell phones, smart watches, and similar tools during exams is not allowed for any reason unless specifically permitted. No portion of an exam may be copied or photographed without permission.

Students are expected to conduct themselves in a manner consistent with the University's status as an institution of higher education. A student is responsible for responding to a request to discuss suspected academic dishonesty when issued by an instructor or other University official. If a student fails to respond after a proper attempt at notification has been made, the University may take appropriate academic actions in the absence of the student's participation.

Federal Regulation

To read detailed Immigration and Customs Enforcement regulations for F-1 students taking online courses, please go to the <u>Electronic Code of Federal Regulations website</u> (http://www.ecfr.gov/). The specific portion concerning distance education courses is located at Title 8 CFR 214.2 Paragraph (f)(6)(i)(G).

The paragraph reads:

(G) For F-1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken on-line or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination or other purposes integral to completion of the class. An on-line or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F-1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no on-line or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experience integral to the completion of this course.

If such an on-campus activity is required, it is the student's responsibility to do the following:

- (1) Submit a written request to the instructor for an on-campus experiential component within one week of the start of the course.

A student owns the copyright for all work (e.g. software, photographs, reports, presentations, and email postings) he or she creates within a class and the University is not entitled to use any student work without the student's permission unless all of the following criteria are met:

- The work is used only once.
- The work is not used in its entirety.
- Use of the work does not affect any potential profits from the work.
- The student is not identified.
- The work is identified as student work.

If the use of the work does not meet all of the above criteria, then the University office or department using the work must obtain the student's written permission.

Transmission and Recording of Student Images in Electronically-Delivered Courses

- 1. No permission is needed from a student for his or her image or voice to be transmitted live via videoconference or streaming media, but all students should be informed when courses are to be conducted using either method of delivery.
- 2. In the event an instructor records student presentations, he or she must obtain permission from the student using a signed release in order to use the recording for future classes in accordance with the Use of Student-Created Work guidelines above.
- 3. Instructors who video-record their class lectures with the intention of re-using some or all of recordings for future class offerings must notify students on the course syllabus if students' images may appear on video. Instructors are also advised to provide accommodation for students who do not wish to appear in class recordings.

Example: This course employs lecture capture technology to record class sessions. Students may occasionally appear on video. The lecture recordings will be available to you for study purposes and may also be reused in future course offerings.

No notification is needed if only audio and slide capture is used or if the video only records the instructor's image. However, the instructor is encouraged to let students know the recordings will be available to them for study purposes.
