At the end of the semester, a final grade will be assigned to each student based on the above criteria. ***All written work will be turned into Sally Vahle at the scheduled post mortem.

Your grade will be based on the following criteria:

- 1. Commitment to the artistic process of Landscape of the Body.
- 2. Your creative/artistic growth.
- 3. Your professionalism from the first day of rehearsal to your participation in the post-mortem discussion of the play.
- 4. Pre and Post show analyses.
 - **Pre-show analysis**: This should simply state what your goals are as you begin to work on this play? Why are you investing in these goals?
 - **Final Self-Evaluation**: This written analysis will consist of a self-evaluation of your work as an actor on this play. Did you achieve your goals? What did you learn about yourself as a performer? What will you take away with you from this experience and use again? What will you do differently next time and why?
 - Overview Analysis: This analysis will more broadly detail your experiences working on this show. In this analysis you will explore ideas you would likely be willing to verbally share at the post-mortem discussion.
