COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will offer students the opportunity to explore ethical issues in public health. Students will become familiar with key ethical frameworks and their application to public health practice. We will discuss the ties between public health and medical ethics. We will explore ethical issues related to public health interventions, distributive justice, fair treatment, government duty and authority, surveillance, screening, disease containment, immunizations, individual rights, environmental health, health communication, and more.

TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS

Participation

Case Studies

Students are required to complete two Case Studies for this course. Each case study will involve the application of the material presented in the course. Students are also required to comment on another student's work. Details will be posted in Canvas.

Final Paper

Students will compose a paper related to a topic of their choice. Specific details will be posted on Canvas later this semester.

(G) For F-1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken online or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination or other purposes integral to the completion of the class. An online or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F-1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no online or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experience integral to the completion of this course.
