Goals

The three major goals of this course are:

- 1. to become familiarized with the most often requested orchestral excerpts for bass and tenor trombone.
- 2. to receive guidance in the correct technical, stylistic and musical preparation of these excerpts.
- 3. to become informed the of musical and pedagogical sources of trombone excerpt material.

Class Format and Expectations

Students will participate in class by preparing and performing the required excerpts and offering constructive feedback on the in-class performance of their peers when prompted to do so. Instruction will consist of lectures, demonstrations and class discussions. **Attendance is required. Each unexcused absence will result in the lowering of the final letter grade by one letter.** The final exam for this class will be a mock audition at the end of the semester. The date for this exam will be finalized near the end of the semester

Assignments and Papers
