Number of Credits: 3

Course Description:

This course will discuss the chemistry of biologically significant compounds such as proteins, carbohydrates and lipids. Enzymes are introduced; bioenergetics and the most central topics of metabolism are outlined.

Course Objectives: By the end of this course, all students should be able to:

- Apply principles of mechanistic organic chemistry to enzyme and chemical reactions used in biochemistry.
- Identify functional groups in biomolecules
- Understand properties of functional groups within the context of biochemical reactions
- Interpret binding affinities and stability of complexes in biochemical systems on the basis of an understanding of the underlying molecular interactions of which they are comprised.
- Categorize amino acidside---chain structures on the basis of their physical properties.
- Understand how differences in physical properties of biochemical molecules serve as the basis for how biochemical molecules are resolved by (a) centrifugation, (b) chromatography, and (c) electrophoresis.
- Understand how to mathematically and conceptually describe chemical equilibria, and to evaluate how perturbations of equilibrium will affect the relative component concentrations in biochemical and ionization reactions. Determine how the concentrations of reaction component will affect spontaneity of a biochemical reaction and pathway.
- Interpret graphs to understand (a) substrate:enzyme or inhibitor:enzyme interactions; (b) binding of oxygen to oxygen---binding proteins; (c) the effects of regulatory molecules on protein function.
- Draw primary structural features of carbohydrates, proteins and lipids, and understand how higher-level structural features are represented.
- •Understand the overall purpose, reactions, enzymes, and the integrated regulation of the metabolic pathways

Attendance: Attendance is mandatory for all exams. If a student is aware they will miss an exam due to an excused absence recognized by the University of North Texas, (observation of religious holiday, military service or wherein a student is representing the university in an official capacity, such as athletics or band), prior arrangements must be made to take the test **early**.

To read detailed Immigration and Customs Enforcement regulations for F-1 students taking online courses, please go to the <u>Electronic Code of Federal Regulations website</u> (http://www.ecfr.gov/). The specific portion concerning distance education courses is located at Title 8 CFR 214.2 Paragraph (f)(6)(i)(G).

The paragraph reads:

(G) For F-1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken on-line or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination or other purposes integral to completion of the class. An on-line or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F-1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no on-line or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experience integral to the completion of this course.

If such an on-campus activity is required, it is the student's responsibility to do the following:

- (1) Submit a written request to the instructor for an on-campus experiential component within one week of the start of the course.
- (2) Ensure that the activity on campus takes place and the instructor documents it in writing with a notice sent to the International Student and Scholar Services Office. ISSS has a form available that you may use for this purpose.
