REQUIRED:

Students must be previously approved as participants in the Study Abroad experience and have received and accepted an internship work experience to enroll in this course.

Students will be enrolled in BUSI 4900.XXX & one of the above Internship courses as well as an online course offered through Fairfield University that will be transcribed as part of the study abroad experience.

Course is taught in Dublin, Ireland. Students will work a FULL-TIME position for 8 weeks at a corporate location in Dublin, Ireland.

Required Readings:

There are no books or materials that will need to be purchased for this course. Required readings and videos are included in individual modules.

COURSE OVERVIEW & OBJECTIVES:

This course is composed of 80 hours of work in a firm in Dublin, Ireland (in conjunction with the internship student is also completing). Course requirements will require the student to reflect on his/her work experience in the co-requisite Internship as well as on required readings. There are two separate Canvas Pages for the two courses. I understand this can be confusing for you to follow. Just make a point to log in to both the check the requirements and activities.

This is an applied AND reflective learning experience that asks students to apply knowledge learned in the classroom to the work experience and then to reflect and critically analyze both their understanding of the academic information, the work environment, and their personal growth and development.

At the completion of the program, students will be able to:

COURSE ORGANIZATION:

This course will utilize a combination of formal work (80 hours), online content, discussions (synchronous and asynchronous), reflective journal entries, two short papers that require application of content to experience, and a final paper. Course evaluation will be facilitated through a Canvas course dedicated to the course.

Your faculty instructor will travel to Dublin and remain with the group for the first two weeks of the experience and will meet with employers and students during that time period. Faculty contact following the first two weeks will be facilitated through the Canvas site. It is the student's responsibility to access online materials and complete course requirements as assigned in the course schedule provided in the syllabus.

BE SURE THAT YOU ARE USING A RELIABLE COMPUTER AND INTERNET CONNECTION! IT IS ALSO BEST NOT TO WAIT UNTIL THE LAST MINUTE TO COMPLETE AN ASSIGNMENT.

Please note that your instructor is not equipped to deal with any technical problems students may have with the Canvas system. If you experience technical problems, students must first contact the Help Desk at 940-565-2324 or helpdesk@unt.edu. Remember that there is a time difference of 6 hours between Dublin and Denton.

COURSE ASSESSMENTS:

All assignments should be submitted to the instructor through Canvas by close of business (Ireland) on the due date.

Assignments should be uploaded into Canvas (typically should be .pdf) and should be in 12 pt font, single OR double spaced.

Work experience time log: This will be submitted through your internship requirements. The first week and last week of your work assignment will constitute the log for THIS course.

Journal Entries:

These submissions are intended to be reflective in nature, and often combine a reading and your personal experience on location. A successful journal entry has a minimum of 350 words (about a page), few spelling / grammatical errors, and helps the instructor assess your observations of your host city and your own internship experience.

- Journal 1: General Business Culture Observations Respond to the Forbes article, "How to Succeed in a Cross-Cultural Workplace," linked below, and comment on your own experience in relation to the article.

- Journal 2: Reflecting on Your Strengths. Have you thought about your top five Strengths, as defined by Gallup? It has been a long time since your coaching call, but now is the time to reflect. Are you using your Strengths in your daily work? Which ones? How are you using them? Choose a recent blog from Gallup at the link below to add to your reflection, and understanding of your Strengths.

- Journal 3: Industry Specific Expectations. Research and respond to an industry specific article relative to your Internship responsibilities. How do you spend your day? What sort of tasks are you doing, or what kind of platforms are you learning? Has your perception of the industry been solidified or changed through the internship experience? Be sure to cite the article for reference.
- Journal 4: Workplace Spotlight. Consider a current project you're working on, or a platform you use in your office. Do you see the utility in your field? Have you worked with this before or is this a new skill for you? Share your progress on your project or platform and address the benefits and challenges of the work. Feel free to include an article on the topic to support your entry.
- Journal 5: What have I learned about me? Utilizing internship experience, Clifton Strengths results, and the in-country experience, consider what you've learned about your professional and personal self. How does this contribute toward your future goals?

Paper Assignments

Module 5: Applied Product Development, Placement and Marketing. Plan for this to be about 500 words.

Module 7: Applied Industry. Plan for this to be about 500 words.

Module 8: Final Reflection

Please be sure to include all four components below.

- The paper is to be between 750 and 1,00 words.
- Cite references and sources.
- Your final paper should address the following:
 - How did your university learning prepare you for the internship experience in your host city?
 - What professional skills were you able to develop and/or enhance in the course of the internship?
 - Research and reference in your paper two articles or book chapters that help you gain insight into cultural dimensions of organizational behavior in your host country. You may decide to compare interpersonal interactions vis-à-vis team

- work, or address ethical issues in work environment, or any other facets of local work culture that were particularly relevant to your internship experience.
- Reflect on the development of your intercultural skills.
- How does this internship experience inform your career development and lifelong learning?

Discussions

Each week your instructor will post a question on the Canvas discussion board. You will be expected to participate in those discussions weekly.
