This course is designed to introduce students to various topics in inorganic chemistry. Emphasis will be placed on fundamental concepts and recent progress in the field. Topics to be covered are given below.

 - b. Multiple Bonding in the Main Group
 - c. Inert Pair Effect
- D. Acid-Base Chemistry
 - a. HSAB Theory
 - b. E&C Theory

Course Objectives:

By the end of the course, you should be able to:

- Apply key theories in inorganic chemistry
- Critically evaluate papers in inorganic chemistry
- Develop and defend (i.e., orally and written) research ideas in inorganic chemistry, succinctly and clearly
- Have an increased awareness of the potential applications of inorganic chemistry principles to your graduate research area

Course Requirements:

Attendance – Attendance is mandatory.

Exams:

- There will be either one (1) or two (2) {depending on class progress and thus available time} hourlong exams at dates to be determined. Class exams will be announced well in advance.
- There will <u>also</u> be a **comprehensive** final exam. You <u>must</u> take the final to pass the class.
