SYLLABUS

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An introduction to the principles and techniques of performing texts in English and Spanish, with emphasis on:

- 1) aural skills (developing the ability to listen in an informed and active way to spoken and sung English and Spanish);
- 2) reading and writing skills in English and Spanish and in the International Phonetic Alphabet; and
- 3) *oral/vocal skills* (speaking, intoning, and singing English- and Spanish-language texts and phrases).

COURSE MATERIALS

There are no required textbooks for this course. Class materials will be on Canvas. You are expected to have complete access to all class materials on Canvas for every class period.

The following three books are highly recommended for you, but you are not required to purchase them or bring them to class:

- 1) Kathryn LaBouff, Singing and Communicating in English: A Singer's Guide to English Diction, Oxford University Press, 2007.
- 2) Kristin Linklater, Freeing the Natural Voice, Drama Publishers, 2006.
- 3) Nico Castel, A Singer's Manual of Spanish Lyric Diction, Excalibur/Leyerle, 1994.

Your **final grade** will be computed as follows:

1. Performance 70%

There are 14 performance assignments; see p. 3 for a description of each. For each assignment, you will be graded on the quality of your preparation and performance, on how easily you absorb instruction, and on your overall improvement throughout the semester. Note that you will continue to have opportunities until the end of the semester to repeat performances for a higher grade. I will also be completely available to coach you individually at your convenience.

2. Written Assignments 15%

There will be 11 written assignments; see p. 4 for a description of each. All written assignments are due at 11:59 pm on the date listed in the Class Schedule. Assignments must be submitted by their due date and time in order to receive full credit. Late assignments will receive a *maximum* grade of 50%. Please submit early if possible! You may submit a written assignment in Canvas or by emailing it to me. Please type; handwritten assignments will not be accepted.

3. Class Participation + Attendance 15%

This portion of your grade reflects your contribution to the life of the class. You must participate actively in class discussions, and your participation should have a positive effect on the overall flow of each class period. This portion of your grade also reflects your attendance. The course attendance policy is as follows: you are allowed *one unexcused absence* in the semester. Additional absences—and tardiness—will result in a substantial lowering of this portion of your final grade.

- P5 Perform Langston Hughes' "I, Too" from memory
- P6 Perform José Martí's "Cultivo una rosa blanca"
- P7 Perform Emily Dickinson's "Will there really be a Morning" from memory
- P8 Perform Gabriela Mistral's "Apegado a mí"
- P9 Perform (speak and sing) Leonard Bernstein's "Make Our Garden Grow" from memory
- P10 Perform (speak and sing) José Calderón's "Eres tú" from memory
- P11 Perform (speak and sing) your first selection [English] from memory
- P12 Perform (speak and sing) your second selection [Spanish] from memory
- P13 Perform (speak and sing) your third selection [English] from memory
- P14 Perform (speak and sing) your fourth selection [Spanish] from memory

The performance assignments are intended to provide benchmarks for your growth in the field of English- and Spanish-language public speaking and singing. Please note the following:

- a) Always begin with meaning. The sounds themselves will never be right if you don't know what the words mean...And the inflections, flow, dramatic integrity? No way! If you don't know what you're saying, none of that is possible—only some very impressive fakery!
- b) Practice efficiently and effectively—and patiently! Be sure to speak *out loud* as much as possible. Repetition is incredibly important...but be sure you are repeating the material with awareness and intelligence. Record yourself; use a mirror when possible; avoid physical tension.
- c) Your preparation and my guidance should result in a substantial improvement in your *ear* and *eye*: how you process both verbal information *and* written information.
- d) The performance focus in this class will be on delivery of the text, not on vocal technique.
- e) I will gladly provide you with recordings of the piano parts for any of your selections. Feel free to experiment with a variety of keys, etc.
- f) Every time you undertake a performance assignment, I will give you feedback that will include specific comments and a number grade. As stated on p. 1, you will have until the end of the semester to "lock in" your grade for each performance assignment.
- g) I intend to be *always* available to you to answer any question or concern and for individual coaching on any performance assignment. Please take advantage of this offer. Regardless of the level of your experience and comfort with the material, I am absolutely confident that you can succeed in this course. But the key to this, I'm convinced, is patient encouragement and personalized attention. My goal is to do all I can to create a positive and affirming atmosphere in class and in individual sessions.

WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS 15% of final grade

PLEASE NOTE: no hand-written assignments will be accepted

W1: Questionnaire — see sample on pp. 5-6

Your answers to these questions will help me get to know you better as I prepare to coach you on English diction. I will share no part of your questionnaire with anybody else. My intent is to be able to help you more thoroughly and specifically. At no time should you feel any pressure to answer or share more than you feel comfortable with. This means that you have absolute freedom to leave questions blank as you see fit and/or to give incomplete or partial answers.

W2: Recording of your singing

Submit (on Canvas or by email) a recording of your singing [in any language—audio or (preferably) video]. This will help me as I make repertoire suggestions.

W3, W5, W6: Reading Quizzes A, B, and C

Submit a guiz on an assigned reading. More importantly, please read patiently and carefully.

W4: Your Selections — see sample on p. 7

After consulting with your voice teacher, please submit a list of your selections 1-4 (P11-P14). For each selection, be sure to include: title of selection, title of larger musical work (if applicable), name of composer, name of poet/librettist, title and author of literary work on which the musical work is based (if applicable), and name of character if the musical work is a dramatic one.

W7, W8, W9, W10: Papers on P11, P12, P13, and P14

Discuss the text of each of your four selections. Please let the tone be personal rather than academic. Maximum length: 1.5 pages.

W11: Final Paper

Discuss one or more topics in relation to this course. Maximum length: 1.5 pages. Please be adventurous in selecting the paper's structure and tone. Humor and creativity are encouraged. *Papers may not be boring!*
