## Course Description and Objectives

This course introduces students to the political institutions, structures, and processes of American government, with particular emphasis on the Texas government. Course materials cover the U.S. and Texas Constitutions, the three branches of government, the separation of powers, federalism, and the protection of civil rights and civil liberties. In addition to learning how government functions, students will explore the importance of institutional rules and how public policy influences the issues and values they care about. By the end of the course, students will be equipped with analytical tools to understand better and actively engage with the political systems that shape their daily lives. This course fulfills the state's legislative requirement for instruction on the Texas Constitution.

# Required Materials

This course will use an online textbook that combines both the textbook and workbook into one.

• U.S. and Texas Politics with 2306 Workbook (UNT 2306 Department Bundle), Soomo Publishing.

You must obtain this textbook **before August 20**, the second session of this class. There are two ways to purchase this textbook:

- You can purchase the textbook directly from the publisher via a link in our Canvas shell (recommended).
- You can purchase an access code from the UNT Bookstore (either in person or online).

## Course Format

For each week, you will complete the following tasks:

- 1. Read the assigned chapter from the webtext and answer the questions embedded within the chapter.
- 2. Consolidate, synthesize, and rewrite your notes on the material.
- 3. Review your notes and complete the Investigation and Workbook assignments.

This course has a Canvas site accessible at https://canvas.unt.edu. The site includes administrative details, assignments, and student grades. I encourage you to check it regularly.

### Course Expectation

To be successful in this class, you must complete the assigned readings and coursework on time. As the instructor, I am responsible for providing clear, well-structured course materials to help you meet the learning objectives. As a student, you are responsible for completing the assigned readings and assignments.

# Assignments & Grading Policy

Grades will be weighted in the following way:

#### • 10% Multiple Choice Homework Assignments

The webtext chapters include questions embedded within the text, which will appear as "2 Multiple-Choice Questions." Be sure to answer these questions as you read through the textbook. Notably, you can attempt these questions multiple times until you get them all correct, so your goal should be to score 100% on the multiple-choice questions in all assigned chapters.

#### • 15% Investigation Assignments

- In the webtext, most chapters include a section labeled "Investigation". Investigation assignments give students the opportunity to engage with the course material at a higher level through analysis and explanation. At the bottom of the Investigation section, there are also multiple-choice questions that you are required to submit. Investigation questions can only be submitted once.

#### • 15% Workbook Assignments

- Each workbook chapter is structured around the four core learning objectives established by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board: critical thinking, communication, personal responsibility, and social responsibility. Each chapter contains four essays that explore key course concepts and allow students to apply them. Students must complete the accompanying multiple-choice questions, which can be attempted multiple times until all answers are correct. Aim for a perfect score - 100% should be your goal.

#### • 60% Exams

- There will be three exams in this course: a Exam 1 (20%), Exam 2 (20%), and a non-cumulative Exam 3 (20%). Exams will be based on content from the main chapters and consist of multiple-choice questions randomly selected from a test bank.
- Exams will be held in person in the classroom.

## Late Assignments

Assignments must be submitted on time. Work turned in late without prior notice will incur a penalty of 5 points per day. For example, if an assignment is due on August 18 but submitted on August 20, 10 points will be deducted.

In the event of extenuating circumstances (e.g., a family emergency, hospitalization), students may be eligible for a short extension. All such requests must be processed through the Dean of Students' Office (https://studentaffairs.unt.edu/dean-of-students/contact.html). That office is responsible for verifying the nature of the circumstances and will communicate directly with me if accommodations are warranted. I do not grant extensions or make-up opportunities unless I receive official notification from the Dean of Students.

I will drop the lowest grade from one of the following categories: multiple choice, investigation assignments, or workbook activities. This means that if you miss an assignment, it should not significantly impact your overall grade. Please follow the module structure in Canvas or refer to the assignment list in the syllabus to stay on track. You are expected to complete all assignments by their posted deadlines.

Using GenAI to complete any part of an assignment, exam, or coursework will be considered a violation of academic integrity, as it prevents the development of your own skills, and will be addressed according to the Student Academic Integrity policy.

Additionally, tools like ChatGPT are not allowed as they blur authorship and misrepresent your independent work. All work must be your own.
