Course Description and Objectives

This is an introductory course in US Political Behavior and Policy. It explores how individuals, like you, form political opinions and engage in action to form the political American landscape. In other words, this course will familiarize you with some of the fundamental building blocks of American politics. In addition to its focus on "regular individuals," the course will also consider the political behavior of other relevant actors like political parties and interest groups. Finally, the course will investigate the formation and realization of public policies - both domestic and foreign. While this is an introductory course in American politics, it will also familiarize you with the toolkit, both conceptual and methodological, of modern political science, providing an important stepping stone to other courses in the major (as well as in other disciplines).

Course Delivery: Online through Canvas, **no** in-person meetings and **no** Zoom lectures. The course is asynchronous, meaning there are no scheduled class meeting times.

Required Materials

There is one required text (webtext) for this course:

*U.S. and Texas Politics with 2305 Workbook (UNT 2305 Department Bundle),
Soomo Publishing.*

You must obtain this textbook before the class sessions begin. If you have trouble accessing the material, please contact your TA. There are two ways to purchase this textbook:

1. You can purchase the textbook directly from the publisher via a link in our Canvas shell (more affordable).
2. You can purchase an access code from the UNT Bookstore (either in person or online).

Course Format

This is an **online, asynchronous** class—that means there are **no** regularly scheduled classes or lectures. All of the required class material—readings and assignments—are accessible through the class Canvas page. To access the class materials, you can click on either the "Home" or "Modules" links on the left-hand side of the Canvas page. Besides exams, all necessary class materials take the form of the above-mentioned webtext.

For each module, you will complete the following tasks:

1. Read the assigned chapter from the webtext and answer the questions embedded within the chapter.
2. Consolidate, synthesize, and rewrite your notes on the material.
3. Review your notes and complete the **Investigation** and **Workbook** assignments.

Canvas

This course has a Canvas site accessible at <https://canvas.unt.edu>. The site includes administrative details, assignments, and student grades. I encourage you to check it regularly.

Course Expectation

This course is an intensive, online 5-week summer session. To be successful in this class, you must complete the assigned readings and coursework on time. As the instructor, I am responsible for providing clear, well-structured course materials to help you meet the learning objectives. As a student, you are responsible for completing the assigned readings and assignments. Please keep in mind that the pace of a summer course is very fast; missing even one or two days can result in late work, and I do not accept late work.

Assignments & Grading Policy

Grades will be weighted in the following way: Each of the webtext assignments —readings, investigations, and workbooks—is worth 100 points. Each exam is worth 400 points. In total there are 2600 points you can earn in this course. Your final grade will be calculated by dividing the number of points you have earned by 2600, and translating that percentage to a letter grade following the scale below.

Exams consist of 50 multiple-choice questions. You will have 75 minutes to complete the exam. If you have accommodations for extra time, this will automatically be reflected in the time you have to complete the exam. If this is not the case, please contact me immediately. Once you open the

exam, you cannot return to it at a later time. You can only attempt each exam once. You may not consult with other people while taking this test. Violating this rule will result in a grade of "F" for the course. You can, however, refer to your text and/or notes.

Grading Scale

Late Assignments

Late assignments will NOT be accepted. All course work must be taken at the scheduled time. Students who do not submit assignments on time will receive an automatic score of 0. No make-up exams or extensions will be granted.

In the event of extenuating circumstances (e.g., a family emergency, hospitalization), students may be eligible for a short extension. All such requests must be processed through the Dean of Students' Office (<https://studentaffairs.unt.edu/dean-of-students/contact.html>). Since this is an online, asynchronous course without lectures, the assignments are the core of the learning experience and cannot be submitted late. For this reason, it is essential that you purchase the required course materials on **day 1** of the summer session.
