# **Course Description & Objectives:**

Intermediate Japanese is a continuation of modern Japanese beyond the first year of study. All four language skills (reading, writing, speaking, and listening) will be developed. The course follows a functional syllabus, focusing on practical things you will be able to accomplish in Japanese. Cultural points will be integrated throughout the course as well.

At the end of JAPN 2050 you will be able to:

- Read 80 new kanji characters (320 total)
- Speak with extra politeness, using honorific and humble expressions
- > Ask and give directions
- Describe negative experiences
- Express things you want other people to do
- Talk about your childhood and memories
- Give opinions regarding education
- > Explain how to do something

# **Course Eligibility:**

This course is designed for students who have three semesters of college-level Japanese credit. Students who have studied Japanese informally or in high school may test into this level and receive credit for courses skipped by taking the placement test. #### Homework Assignments

You can expect to spend at least 6 hours per week studying outside of class. Homework assignments are listed in the attached schedule. Answer keys for the homework will be posted on Canvas. Check your answers as follows:

- Use a colored pen and make the necessary corrections to your answers
- If all items in the section are correct, make a large circle over the section

The homework is important practice and should display your effort and learning by showing your attempts and your corrections. Please use the answer key as a learning tool, not as a way to get out of doing your homework! (Remember that plagiarism and cheating are serious offenses.) Free-answer sections will be checked by your instructor. Homework will be graded on completeness and how thoroughly you checked your answers. If you only complete the sections that are in the answer key, we reserve the right to deny credit for the entire assignment.

#### Late homework:

We will accept late homework <u>three times</u> with full credit. After that, late homework will receive a maximum of 50% credit. Late homework must be submitted by the day of the chapter test.

#### Reading

You will be assigned short reading assignments from either KLL reading pages or Genki 2 texbook reading materials. The reading assignments will have read-aloud practice to be able to connect reading, listening, and speaking elements. You are expected to practice reading with audio before posting your submitting your recording.

#### Writing

You will write short writing assignments reflecting the 2050 material. This will relate to the writing for your final project process. They will be graded on content, accuracy, and communication/organization,

# Speaking Task & Conversation Exchanges/ reflections

You will be assigned to record your speaking tasks. The speaking tasks will be graded on performance (requirement, communication, and effort). Also, you will have weekly conversation exchanges with Japanese students learning English. You will have a couple of assigned groups and communicate with them on your own to decide your schedules. Each time, you will have time for Japanese and English conversation for 20 minutes each. You will write a short reflection on the

exchanges and submit weekly. The conversation exchanges will be only accountable when you give reflections over the experience and give thoughts on how you could make progress in communication in Japanese with native speakers. Having the opportunity to communicate with Japanese native speakers throughout the course, your speaking practices will make progress in terms of natural greeting exchanges, negotiating meanings, and understanding others effort in speaking the foreign language. Your learning will be beyond the level of speaking practice; you will experience the real interaction in helping each other and will explore your ways to communication better.

# **Class Participation**

Class attendance is mandatory and absolutely essential to your success in learning Japanese. Full participation credit (10 points per class hour) will be given to those who are:

- present for the entire class period
- prepared for class
- fully participating in all class activities
- using Japanese whenever possible

Partial attendance or lack of participation will result in deduction of points. You will get <u>30 free</u> <u>attendance points</u> for class (the equivalent of three-hour absences). After that, absences will only be excused in the case of attending major related university events, observing religious holidays, or extended illness with documentation. For other absences, it is not necessary to provide excuses.

TAMS students: If you are absent for any reason, you are required to file an absence report with Dr. Allen of the TAMS Academic Office. You must complete the "Absence Form" on the TAMS Academic Website. In addition, your instructor will send periodic attendance reports to the TAMS Academic Office. TAMS students are not allowed the use of computers in the classroom.

# Quizzes

There will be two vocabulary quizzes, one grammar check quiz, and one kanji quiz per chapter. Your lowest quiz score will be dropped from each type. There is no make up.

# Chapter Tests

There will be 5 small chapter tests, one over each chapter for Ch. 19 - 23. Chapter tests focus on the grammar of that chapter, but also include both new and review vocabulary and characters. Your lowest chapter test score will be dropped. There is no make up.

#### **Final Project**

There will be a final project presentation at the end of the course with integrating your learning from Ch. 19-23.

#### Quiz and Chapter Test Make-up Policy

There are **no make-ups** for quizzes or chapter tests. Your lowest scores from each category will be dropped to allow for a few missed tests with no penalty to your grade.

#### Keeping Records

Students should keep all graded materials until the end of the semester. In the case of a grade discrepancy, it is the student's responsibility to resubmit the graded materials.
