Course Objectives:

This course begins to develop both the "hearing eye" and the "seeing ear." Singing activities will include prepared melodies, sight singing, and ensemble singing. Dictation exercises will focus on melody, rhythm, and harmony. Keyboard assignments reinforce the basic building blocks of tonal theory: intervals, chords, and simple diatonic progressions. By the end of the course, students will be able to sing and identify the following:

- 1. Diatonic melodies in major and minor using bass and treble clef (using movable do and letter names)
- 2. Intervals (up through an octave)
- 3. Triads (major, minor, diminished), and the dominant seventh chord
- 4. Cadences
- 5. Harmonic vocabulary commensurate with MUTH1400 (the phrase model and its basic expansions)
- 6. Simple and compound meter (combined with conducting patterns in 2, 3, and 4)

Required Materials:

- Music for Sight Singing, 10th edition by Nancy Rogers and Robert W. Ottman (Pearson 2013)
- Manuscript paper and pencils with erasers!!!

Assignment Policy:

All work must be done legibly in pencil. Assignments are due 11:59PM. If you do not understand how to complete an assignment or need more time because of some unplanned situations, please contact me <u>before</u> the assignment is due. Otherwise, <u>No late work will be accepted.</u>

Examination Policy:

Failure to attend a test without prior notice or an approved excuse will result in a 30% grade deduction for that assessment. One make-up opportunity will be granted; however, failure to appear for the make-up test without prior notice will result in a grade of zero for that test, with no further make-up opportunities permitted.

Attendance:

Because this is a skills-based course, attendance is absolutely vital to your success; it is impossible to make up for missed class time. You are responsible for knowing any new material missed.

Because most in-class performances and assignments will be graded at the very beginning of class, it is to your benefit to get to class on time; you will not be permitted to make up the performance after it is over. Arriving later than five minutes after the start of class will result in a tardy, and three tardies will result in an unexcused absence. Arriving to class more than 15 minutes late will count as an unexcused absence. Likewise, leaving class early at any time or showing an unwillingness to participate will result in an unexcused absence. Most issues and concerns can be resolved easily if brought to my attention before class! Penalties for unexcused absences are as follows:

4 unexcused absences: final grade lowered by 10% (for example: 85% - 10%= 75%) 5 unexcused absences: final grade lowered by 20% (for example: 85% - 20%= 65%) automatic failure of course

Excused absences will not negatively impact your grade if you notify me before the absence. Excused absences include: medical emergencies, religious holidays, and documented illness. (That is, you <u>must</u> show me a doctor's note or note from the Dean of Students Office.) Official School of Music activities will be judged on a case-by-case basis, although **lessons are not excused absences**. If you plan to be absent for a long period of time, contact the **Dean**

of Students Office. Likewise, if you have a condition that might inhibit your attendance, look into the Office of Disability Accommodations and notify me of any special circumstances.

If any student wishes to dispute an absence as "excused" instead of "unexcused" with the instructor (or the Aural Skills Coordinator, Dr. Graf), he/she must do so within 48 hours of the last class period he/she missed. After that time period, the student will have to go through the Dean of Students Office (Maureen "Moe" McGuinness, Union 409) to obtain an excuse note on UNT letterhead in order to request absences to be changed from "unexcused" to "excused."
