Mentorship Journey

Introduction

Calvary Church is committed to making fully devoted disciples of Jesus Christ. This discipleship journey is not for the solo traveler. Discipleship is a voyage that requires intentional relationships with other believers. It's through purposeful close-knit-bonds that we grow in Christ, as we're encouraged and challenged. Mentorship provides a road map for the journey.

The Mentorship curriculum is for use by mentors and mentees over the course of six months. This curriculum encourages both parties to develop actionable next steps around Calvary Church's six signposts of discipleship (see next page). This is not just another group or class that you are asked to be part of; rather, it's a short-term discipleship training period to determine the next steps in the discipleship process.

Randy Pope argues that for a discipleship relationship to be truly effective it needs to have a focus on the "head," "heart," and "hands." 1

HEAD

These mentor/mentee relationships have a concentration on learning good biblical theology. Growing in knowledge of the Scriptures and basic Christian doctrine is an important part of the discipleship journey.

HEART

There's also a focus on fostering a love for Jesus Christ and genuine Christian love for one another. An emphasis placed on one-on-one relationships fosters openness and transparency.

HANDS

Finally there's an emphasis on life transformation and mission. The intentional discipleship plan that every mentor and mentee will develop will include actionable next steps. This might mean serving at Calvary, asking a neighbor who does not know Christ to share coffee, going on a short-term Impact trip, or serving at a local parachurch ministry. The goal is to incorporate practices that will become a regular part of life.

As you embark on this journey, our prayer is that you would foster a greater love for Jesus Christ, a greater love for others, and experience transformation in your life.

Discipleship at Calvary Church

Building relationships, seeing Jesus transform lives.

Calvary Church's mission statement encapsulates the three core tenets of discipleship—it's relational, Jesus-focused, and transformational.

To understand whole-life discipleship, it's helpful to begin with a definition.

DISCIPLESHIP IS RELATIONAL—it requires a relationship with God and others.

As a response to God's grace we form relationships with other believers to encourage and challenge each other to grow in Christ.

DISCIPLESHIP IS JESUS-FOCUSED—it encourages us to become life-long students of Christ.

Discipleship begins when you respond to Jesus' call to follow Him. Desire to study the Bible and live in obedience is a natural next step after accepting Christ into your life.

DISCIPLESHIP IS TRANSFORMATIONAL—it leads to whole-life transformation.

Imitating Jesus Christ in every sphere of life through the power of the Holy Spirit leads to transformation. A life that imitates Christ is a powerful witness for the kingdom of God.

How do I know if I'm growing as a disciple?

Being in relationship with other believers, like a mentoring relationship provides the opportunity for spiritual growth. The six categories below are key signposts to assess your growth as a disciple of Jesus Christ and facilitate conversation in your Small Group. These have been adapted from Klaus Issler's "Six themes from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount" in his book, Living into the Life of Jesus.2 Maturity in the pursuit of Jesus Christ is a life-long journey and we won't 'arrive' until we're in the presence of Jesus Christ Himself (Ephesians 4:13).

Signpost 1 LOVE FOR GOD

Growing in love for God and recognition of the need for His grace.

Indicators: deep seated trust in God / unwavering faith in the midst of trial / understanding that salvation is by God's grace alone through faith in Jesus Christ alone / growing sense of joy in worship

Signpost 2 LOVE FOR OTHERS

Growing understanding of the church as family.

Indicators; demonstrates sacrificial care and commitment to those within the church and the wider world

Signpost 3 | BIBLE ENGAGEMENT

Growing hunger to know the Bible and engage in the spiritual disciplines.

Indicators: study, meditation, memory, and application of Scripture / life is shaped by the grand story of the Bible / growing dependency on prayer, fasting, and confession

Signpost 4 | STUDENT OF JESUS

Growing desire to be with Jesus and like Jesus.

Indicators: understands that your primary identity is being a Jesus-follower / progressively demonstrating the fruit of the Spirit in your life (Galatians 5:22-23)

Signpost 5 KINGDOM PRIORITIES

Growing desire to live out the kingdom of God in day-to-day life as a servant of Christ and others and invite others to be part of his kingdom.

Indicators: seeks holistic gospel-shaped change in individual lives, workplaces, families, etc. through the Holy Spirit in both word and deed / active participant in the local church

Signpost 6 KINGDOM WISDOM

Growing discernment of the life-giving ways of God's kingdom by daily submitting to the **Holy Spirit.**

Indicators: able to discern truth and falsehood according to the standard of Scripture / display kingdom stewardship, generosity, and love for others

Mentorship Basics

Mentorship is a mentoring relationship curriculm with a focus on growing in the six signposts of discipleship (page 5). Bill Hull defines mentoring as helping another "make sense of their lives." In other words mentors come alongside mentees to guide, challenge, and encourage them towards a particular goal. Discipleship-based mentoring focuses on making a serious investment in someone else for the kingdom of God.

This might sound a bit daunting, but a mentor is someone who is only one step ahead of the mentee spiritually. While the mentor is often older than the mentee, in a discipleship-focused mentoring relationship, this is isn't always the case. Within the mentoring relationship, mentors and mentees will work through each discipleship signpost and develop actionable plans for growth in each category. One signpost will be focused on each month.

HOW ARE MENTORS AND MENTEES PAIRED?

Option 1

Mentors and mentees each fill out an application and are paired based on various criteria such as location, common interests, common goals, etc.

Option 2

Mentors and mentees can also form relationships more organically without filling out an application.

HOW OFTEN DO GROUPS MEET?

Mentors and mentees meet twice a month for six months. They can discuss a time and place that works best for them. Each month a new signpost of discipleship will be discussed.

WHAT DOES A TYPICAL GROUP MEETING LOOK LIKE?

Mentors and mentees have the flexibility to decide what they want the relationship to look like. This Mentorship curriculum provides a framework, but the mentor and mentee have the freedom to determine what they would like the relationship to look like. The framework is composed of four key activities:

- · Study of the relevant Bible passage
- · Supplemental reading
- Development of Personalized Discipleship Plan
- · Other spiritual discipline activities

These four components of the mentoring relationship will be discussed in more detail below. A suggested meeting schedule is provided, but feel free to choose what will work best for you.

The Four Foundations of Calvary Church Mentoring

1. BIBLE STUDY METHOD

Mentors and mentees study the Bible together.

The primary foundation of the mentoring relationship is Bible engagement. For each signpost, key scripture passages are provided to guide the mentoring relationship. A helpful method for doing Bible study utilizes the acronym, S.O.A.P.

S | Scripture

Read the passage of Scripture and pay attention to the surrounding context. Read the chapters before and after and even the entire book in the Bible if time permits.

O | Observation and Interpretation

After reading the passage, jot down a few observations. Some helpful questions to get started are:

- Who is speaking?
- Who is the audience?
- · Where is the scene taking place?
- · Who are the people involved?
- Are there key words to look up?

After jotting down your observations, write out the big idea in just a few sentences. In the interpretation stage you are asking the question, "What is this passage about?"

A | Application

Only after properly interpreting the text can you make an appropriate application to your life. Ask the question, "How does this passage challenge the way I think about _____?"

P | Prayer

Timothy Keller in his book, Prayer: Experiencing Awe and Intimacy with God, suggests that there are three questions we should ask ourselves to guide our prayer time:

- "How does this truth help me praise God?"
- "How does it show me a sin to confess?"
- "How does it show me something to ask God for?"

2. SUPPLEMENTAL READING

Mentors and mentees think through the bigger picture together.

There are two options for how to incorporate supplemental reading into the mentoring relationship. Mentors and mentees can choose what will work best for them.

Option 1: Understand your role in the larger biblical story

One of the goals of the mentoring relationship is to understand where one finds themselves in the larger story of the Bible. Mentors and mentees are encouraged to read, The True Story of the Whole World: Finding Your Place in the Biblical Drama, by Craig Bartholomew and Michael Goheen.

Option 2: Dig into an aspect of discipleship

If you prefer to go deeper in one of the three main components of discipleship, supplemental resources are suggested for each month. Mentors and mentees can decide which approach they prefer.

3. PERSONALIZED DISCIPLESHIP PLAN

Mentors and mentees think through life together.

Discussion around the six signposts is what frames the mentoring relationship. The mentor should ask direct questions regarding the particular signpost. For instance, "Are you growing in your love for God and recognition of your need for his grace?" Mentees and mentors will both develop a Personalized Discipleship Plan for each signpost. These Personalized Discipleship Plans should aim for specific action steps to help the mentor and mentee grow in the discipleship process.

Hopefully, through the Personalized Discipleship Plans, the relationship will move from your "head" to your "heart". These PDPs provide an opportunity to ask some direct questions about spiritual growth, but also provide direction for the conversation.

4. OTHER SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINE ACTIVITIES

Mentors and mentees grow in maturity together.

Over the course of the mentoring relationship, the mentor and mentee should engage in other activities such as attending the "Open Up the Book" course, or taking Calvary Church's online spiritual gift assessment calvarychurch.us/connect/serve/how-to-start. These activities will be highlighted below.

TRAINING AND RESOURCES FOR MENTORS

Resource Library

Since discipleship involves becoming a student of Jesus, we need resources for the journey. You can access an online digital library of resources at calvarychurch.us/media/resources.

Leader Training

Calvary Church offers periodic mentor training. This training is designed to help all current mentors. Stay tuned for announcements regarding when these trainings will take place. These will be great times for you to brush up on your skills and discover new resources that will make for an even richer experience.

Open Up the Book

Once a month, Calvary Church offers a course in biblical interpretation. All mentors and mentees are encouraged to attend this course together once a year. Visit calvarychurch.us/connect/adults/mid**size-groups** for more information about this course.

1 Minute Small Group

To help you be a better leader, Calvary Church offers 1 Minute Small Group. This video resource will be regularly uploaded to Right Now Media to give you brief training tips and advice to make your mentoring relationship more successful. While these videos are specifically designed for Small Group facilitators, much of the training still applies to mentoring relationships.

OUTCOMES OF THE MENTORING RELATIONSHIP

Calvary Church has identified a number of goals for the mentee to help them become a more devoted follower of Jesus Christ:

1. Bible Study Method

Gain skills in interpreting and appropriately applying the Scripture to one's life.

2. Supplemental Reading

Grow in understanding of the Bible's grand story and/or a bigger picture of discipleship.

3. Personalized Discipleship Plan

Identify concrete steps for growing in the discipleship process.

4. Other Activities

Develop a life-long love for spiritual disciplines.

Mentoring Agreement

To get the most out of your mentoring experience, use this agreement to discuss the expectations and goals for the mentor and mentee.

AGREE ON EXPECTATIONS

- How will the relationship work?
- · Where will we meet?
- How often will we meet (minimum of twice a month)?
- · What is the preferred method of communication?
- · What is the best time to reach each other?
- · If an email or voice mail is received, we will respond to our partner within an agreed upon time frame.
- · If we can't make an expected meeting, how will we get in touch?
- · When will we meet or talk next?

AGREE ON GOALS

- What do you hope to gain from the relationship?
- · What are the mentee's goals for this relationship? Is there any clarification needed?
- · What are the mentor's goals for this relationship?
- · What actions can both the mentor and mentee take to achieve the goals?

Being part of a mentoring relationship is a big commitment. A successful mentoring relationship will require agreement on a set of expectations that are outlined below. During the first meeting, the mentor and mentee should look over these expectations before entering into this purposeful relationship.

- I agree to attend all meetings unless there are extenuating circumstance (i.e. medical reason, family emergency, etc.). In such cases I will notify the mentor/mentee that I will be absent.
- · I agree to complete all reading, journaling, and Personalized Discipleship Plans by the agreed upon date.
- I am pursuing a morally upright life consistent with the ethics of Jesus.
- I commit to contributing to discussion.
- I commit to praying for my mentor/mentee.
- I commit to regularly engage in corporate worship at Calvary Church while being part of a mentoring relationship.

APPENDIX 1

Tips for a Successful Mentoring Relationship

First Meeting

Set aside the first meeting to get to know one another. At this initial meeting, take some time to go through the "Mentoring Agreement" to ensure that everyone is on the same page.

Review Meeting

After the first month take a moment to review the process together. This would be a good opportunity to review goals, the overall mentoring process, and any expectations.

Last Meeting

One of the hardest things about mentoring is knowing when to end a mentoring relationship. Be sure to set the duration of the relationship at the first meeting. This mentoring material is intentionally structured to be a 6 month process so that the mentor and mentee can evaluate the relationship. Mentors and mentees have the option of continuing meeting, but it's also important to recognize that mentoring relationships may only last a season.

Touch Base Regularly

It's important to touch base regularly to establish a mentor/mentee relationship. Some suggestions for the mentor include:

- · Sending a letter/email to your mentee on occasion
- · Periodically check-in by calling
- · Share a meal together
- Serve together in some way
- · Sit with each other at church

APPENDIX 2

APPENDIX 3

Core Values of Mentoring

The following core values have been taken from Bill Hull's comprehensive book, The Complete Book of Discipleship: On Being and Making Followers of Christ. The following four values are essential in any biblical community: trust, grace, humility, and affirmation.5

Trust

The mentor-mentee relationship requires a high value to be placed on trust as it is essential to foster openness. The mentor and mentee need to be intentional in establishing trust from the first meeting.

Grace

Mentors and mentees are committed to extending grace as a result of the grace that God has shown in Jesus Christ.

Humility

The mentoring relationship places a high value on humility as it is one of the hallmarks of following Jesus. Humility recognizes that each person is at a different spot on the path of discipleship.

Affirmation

Mentors and mentees see affirmation as a tool to encourage each other in your faith and in the pursuit of a relationship with Jesus Christ.
