




THE SECOND LESSON Romans 13:8-14

John Blow

About the music at today's service

When William III succeeded James II to the English throne, this austere Calvinist was greatly surprised to find that the very people who had dared to take up arms against their king in order to drive Catholicism from the land were such unenthusiastic churchgoers. Since the Restoration, the Anglican Church, deprived of most of its power, was no longer invested with more than a conservative mission.

Henry Purcell, Composer in Ordinary to the King and Organist of Westminster Abbey, did not compose for the parochial church but for two of the nation's greatest institutions, whose pageantry had been restored and whose congregation was aristocratic and cultivated. At the cross-roads of the great English polyphonic tradition and the new dramatic, *monodic* and *concertante* style imported from Italy, Purcell succeeded in establishing his own manner and in serving the two styles with equal inspiration. He indefatigably placed his rich harmonic vocabulary and his melodic gift at the service of the English text, which he invested with the energy and the power to arouse human passions.

What makes the post-Restoration period 'the most picturesque in the history of English church music' is its verse and symphony anthems. The verse-anthem genre, invented by William Byrd, flourished before 1600. However, after 1600 it underwent a transformation: the musical language adopted a wide variety of new dialects, ranging from pure declamation to lyrical airs and dance measures; the spectrum of colors was greatly enlarged, with voices in new relationships to one another; and, the mannered, word-centered style of the madrigal had a great effect on the style of these anthems. (A "verse anthem" alternates sections for soloists and sections for the full choir – as opposed to a "full anthem", which, as the name suggests, is sung by the full choir throughout.)

Purcell's verse anthem *Thy word is a lantern* is probably an early work, composed no later than 1687. The anthem appears in many manuscripts copied during the twenty years after Purcell's death, suggesting that it was

an especially popular piece in English cathedrals.

John Blow is one of the greatest of not-quite-forgotten English composers. Conscripted as a choirboy from Newark Parish Church to the Chapel Royal of Charles II by the redoubtable Captain Henry Cook - a royalist hero in the civil war, and one of the leading choir-trainers in his period - Blow rose to become a Gentleman (adult singer) of the Chapel and one of its three organists, and by his mid-twenties royal choirmaster.

He was a famous teacher of composition, and specifically of old-fashioned counterpoint, a severe but hugely valuable discipline. He also became organist of Westminster Abbey - generously yielding the post in 1679 to his pupil Henry Purcell, whose brilliance urgently demanded that he be kept in London, and whose then impending marriage might have forced him to accept a provincial appointment. The lives and careers of the two men were thereafter closely intertwined, and they remained close friends until Purcell's early death. After that Blow resumed his tenure at the Abbey, also serving as organist and choirmaster at Wren's new St Paul's Cathedral, consecrated in 1697 - a post which he later relinquished in favor of another brilliant pupil, Jeremiah Clarke.

So busy a pluralist must have found time for composition frustratingly limited. Yet Blow became the leading composer of music, secular and sacred alike, for the court (though he held no official post as composer until 1700, fifteen years after Charles's death). His huge output includes well over a hundred anthems, ten services, forty odes, most of them for the court, more than 120 secular and devotional songs, the earliest all-sung English opera, *Venus and Adonis* (the model for Purcell's *Dido and Aeneas*), and numerous works for the keyboard.

The hymn tune *Westminster Abbey* (today's Entrance Hymn) is derived from the concluding section of Henry Purcell's verse anthem O God, thou art my God.
