About the music at today's service

Jean Langlais (1907-1991) was one of several notable twentieth-century organist-composers to have been strongly associated with prominent Paris churches. In Langlais's case, the church was the Basilica of Sainte-Clotilde where in 1945 he followed in the footsteps of César Franck (1822-1890) and Charles Tournemire (1870-1939) being named organiste titulaire, a title he retained until 1988. Langlais, who lost his sight to glaucoma at age two, began organ study with André Marchal (1894-1980), a prominent Paris organist and teacher who was also blind. He later was a prizewinning student at the Paris Conservatory where his studies included composition with Paul Dukas (1865-1935) and Marcel Dupré (1886-1971). Langlais also had a distinguished teaching career at the Schola Cantorum in Paris, where he taught from 1961 to 1976. In addition he toured widely in Europe and the United States as a concert organist and composed extensively for the organ.

His choral and organ compositions frequently have chant references or other neo-medieval characteristics. Langlais's *Messe en style ancien*, Opus 75, dates from 1952 and was scored for mixed choir of four voices with or without organ. The *Gloria* of this setting declaims the text with great clarity; voice parts singing syllables in rhythmic unison throughout in chordal fashion. In contrast, the voices enter individually and move more independently in the *Sanctus* and *Agnus Dei* of this Mass. The harmonic palette is restrained throughout, reflecting the modal character of earlier choral music, yet Langlais's setting is clearly a work of his time and place.

His organ works characteristically incorporate plainsong themes. His *Suite Médiévale* is in the form of an organ mass for a Low Mass, with movements for the entrance, offertory, elevation, communion, and dismissal. The dismissal piece, "*Christus vincit*" ("*Christ reigns triumphantly*") is traditional to this season of the church year.

Josquin Desprez (c.1440-1521) was one of the most influential and widely regarded composers in the history of Western music, so famous that he is known merely by his first name. Josquin was apparently born in the Duchy of Burgundy, in modern Belgium. He spent a large portion of his middle years in various Italian cities as a highly sought master of music, and then retired to Conde (in Northeast France) late in his life. Josquin's extended sojourns in Italy allowed him not only to spread the Northern polyphonic style there, but to pick up some of the Southern vitality noticeable in many of his secular works. However, his extended works are always marked by a subtlety and serenity characteristic of the Franco-Flemish school.

Josquin's surviving musical output includes 18 completed masses, nearly 100 motets, and dozens of secular pieces, both French and Italian. His style is marked by the technique of pervasive imitation, in which different vocal lines share material in a subtle interlocking manner. Most of his compositions are for four voices, though larger textures are not uncommon. Typically, Josquin utilizes pair-wise imitation between voices - such that the texture is divided into pairs of voices which interchange material in canon. This technique deliberately eschews the longer lines of the previous generation to concentrate on shorter motifs which lend themselves to various combinations of melody and harmony.

Josquin's motets contain some of his most varied and highly respected output, and it is here that his combination of piety, technical mastery, and individual discretion makes its surest showing. *Dominus regnavit* is a setting of the Vulgate text of Psalm 93 (then numbered 92). It's materials are of a simplicity and simplemindedness only attempted by the best composers. It is principally a set of canons at the fifth, each shaped to its line of text, internally exact such that the soprano and tenors are actually singing in a different key from the basses and altos. However this is a secondary, unremarkable aural feature, serving mainly to make many elegant phrase-ends. The main impression is of naturalness and freshness –masking a highly polished technical command.

For the last 200 years, the St. Luke's community has cared for the needs of our neighborhood and city with hospitality and imagination.

Food insecurity has remained a permanent concern for our city. Since the COVID pandemic, the numbers of people in line at food pantries and community kitchens has skyrocketed. "It's never been this tragic for such a sustained period of time," said Rosanna Robbins, director of food access and capacity at City Harvest. "We expect there to be a real need for free food for a very long time." In New York City, an estimated 2 million residents are now facing food insecurity – a number which has nearly doubled during the pandemic.

Faced with a consistent stream of folks these last six months asking for help securing their next meal, we made a decision: Instead of waiting for folks to find us, we'll go to them.

On Tuesday and Thursday mornings, we will gather to make and distribute meals and hygiene supplies along routes in our neighborhoods where we believe we'll encounter the folks who will need them. You can sign up for a slot: *bit.ly/inourfields* or write Simone at *srichmond@stlukeinthefields.org* with any questions or suggestions – especially of any places you may know about nearby that could inform potential new routes for us. In addition to meals, masks, hygiene kits, and resource lists, we will provide a supplemental pantry bag with grab-and-go items appropriate for those without access to a kitchen.
