

#### THE FIRST LESSON Acts 8:26-40

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like

a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth." The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.



#### THE SECOND LESSON 1 John 4:7-21

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

# About the music at today's service

Tomás Luis de Victoria was born in 1548 in Avila (as was St. Theresa). He was trained as a chorister at the Cathedral there, and was sent to Rome at the age of seventeen to study at the Jesuit Collegium Germanicum (founded by Ignatius Loyola to combat Lutheranism) under the patronage both of the church and of King Philip II. Victoria's years in Rome were very successful and he published several volumes of music. In about 1586 he returned to Spain as Chaplain to the Dowager Empress Maria at the Monasterio de las Descalzas de S. Clara in Madrid. This accords with the image we have inherited of Victoria, reinforced by the intensity of much of his music, as a retiring mystic and contemplative. Spain at this period was the spiritual center of the Counter-Reformation. Victoria's training under the Jesuits is unlikely to have been without effect on him, and it is significant that he composed no secular music at all.

William Byrd's birthplace remains unknown, though it may have been Lincoln, where he received his first appointment. He later studied in London under Thomas Tallis and was a Gentleman of the Chapel Royal there from 1570 to 1593, when he moved to Essex. Described by scholar Joseph Kerman as "an exceedingly tough-minded individual," Byrd exhibited great boldness not only in his music but also in his career. Not the least of his impressive achievements is that he remained steadfastly Catholic during Elizabeth's reign, when to do so was considered a criminal act.

Under James I's more lenient policies, Byrd actually dared to publish Latin sacred music. His *Gradualia* of 1605 and 1607 contain music for the propers of the entire church year. *Pascha nostrum* is the Communion for Easter Day.

All of Byrd's music is notable for its wonderful flow and for its richly colored harmonies. *Christ rising again/Christ is risen* is an excellent example of Byrd's abilities at setting English text, this in the form of a "verse anthem". The work alternates "verses" for solo voices (in this case two sopranos) and the full choir, accompanied by organ.

During his lifetime, Cristóbal de Morales (c.1500-1553) received more praise for the quality of his compositions and for his singing voice than any other Spanish musician of the 16th century. The theorist Juan Bermudo called him "the light of Spain in music." Later composers, some of whom Morales taught personally, and all of whom he influenced, echoed Bermudo's judgment. It was not until the 18th century that another Spanish composer, Tomás Luis de Victoria was elevated by critics and musicians to the same high level.

Proudly self-aware of his Spanish heritage, the composer almost invariably appended the descriptive adjective "Hyspalensis" (or a variant) to his name. Born and educated in Seville, Morales achieved prominence in his native Spain before traveling to Rome in 1535 and joining the Papal Chapel under Pope Paul III, in the same year incidentally that Michelangelo was commissioned to paint his fresco The Last Judgment. After 10 years with that pre-eminent institution, Morales returned to Spain where he held positions at the cathedrals of Toledo and Malaga. An unusually pious man, Morales remained in the service of the church his entire professional life; his surviving output consists almost entirely of sacred music, unlike that of his contemporaries Gombert, Arcadelt and Crecquillon. In addition to over 80 motets and a celebrated cycle of Magnificat settings, Gombert composed at least 21 masses, more than any other composer of his generation.

François Couperin was a leading composer of the French Classical school at the end of the seventeenth century. He was part of a family dynasty which presided at the organ console of St. Gervais in Paris for many years. Couperin composed two organ masses, his only publications for the organ. The Messe pour les Convents was, as the title suggests, meant for use in convents. The mass consists of versets employing a wide variety of colors intended to alternate with verses of the plainsong ordinary. Versets from the Gloria in exclesis form today's prelude.

# Adult Education: Anti-Racism Ministry

Our nation continues to grapple with systemic racism just as it has since the civil war and reconstruction. Adult Education: Anti-Racism Ministry is a discussion series designed to identify and discuss contemporary and historical issues of race, color, and ethnicity and their impact on our society in order to enable change in perspective, both individually and collectively, to encourage anti-racism in the broader community. It is a safe place for members of our parish and community to gain a deeper understanding of how racism affects our lives.

For the last 200 years, the St. Luke's community has cared for the needs of our neighborhood and city with hospitality and imagination.

Food insecurity has remained a permanent concern for our city. Since the COVID pandemic, the numbers of people in line at food pantries and community kitchens has skyrocketed. "It's never been this tragic for such a sustained period of time," said Rosanna Robbins, director of food access and capacity at City Harvest. "We expect there to be a real need for free food for a very long time." In New York City, an estimated 2 million residents are now facing food insecurity – a number which has nearly doubled during the pandemic.

Faced with a consistent stream of folks these last six months asking for help securing their next meal, we made a decision: Instead of waiting for folks to find us, we'll go to them.

On Tuesday and Thursday mornings, we will gather to make and distribute meals and hygiene supplies along routes in our neighborhoods where we believe we'll encounter the folks who will need them.
