# About the music at today's service

Claudio Monteverdi, *maestro di cappella* of the Basilica of San Marco in Venice from 1612 until his death in 1643, was one of the most important composers of sacred music in the seventeenth century. He must have written more than the three settings of the Mass ordinary which have survived, given the demands of his position. It is quite likely that his music specifically for San Marco has disappeared; quite possibly it was of such an elaborate nature that there would have been little call for publication.

Monteverdi's first mass, composed in 1610, was a sixvoice parody of a motet by Gombert, and the second a part of the 1641 Selve morale collection, perhaps composed as much as a decade before publication. In 1651, after Monteverdi's death, the publisher Alessandro Vincenti collected "the sacred relics of the works of the most excellent Monteverdi", beginning his volume with a Messa a 4 voci da cappella. It was common for composers of the seventeenth century to compose mass ordinaries in the stile antico, or "old style," the style of Palestrina. But Monteverdi was thoroughly a Baroque composer. While he retains the modal system of tonality found in earlier polyphony, elements of this new style, such as sequence, madrigalian part writing and dramatic text-based contrasts, abound in the mass. Hence, this mass is in the style of Palestrina, but viewed through glasses of the early Baroque.

Born in Casalmagiore near Parma in about 1575, Ignazio Donati served as *maestro di cappella* in various places in northern Italy: Urbino, Pesaro, Fano and Ferrare, returning to Casalmaggiore, his residence from 1618 to 1623. From there he progressed to similar positions in Novara, Lodi, and finally to the cathedral in Milano, where he served from 1631 until his death in 1638.

Donati's output is almost exclusively church music. He was consistently inventive in all the branches of it that he worked in, but he was especially important as an outstanding pioneer of the small-scale *concertato* motet for a few voices and continuo. He was particularly at home in intimate trio motets such as *Non vos relinquam orphanos*, scored for three equal soprano voices. The motet is in six sections, each of three emotionally contrasting lines of texts being followed by an exuberant "Alleluia."

Virtually nothing is known of the life of Bernardo Storace, other than what is included on the title page of his only surviving publication, a collection of keyboard works that appeared in Venice in 1664. *Ballo della Battaglia* is in the style of Spanish battle music; music based on "battle" themes was used liturgically for feasts such as Easter, St. Michael and All Angels, and of the Holy Cross, in which images of combat and strife abound.

Our nation continues to grapple with systemic racism just as it has since the civil war and reconstruction. Adult Education: Anti-Racism Ministry is a discussion series designed to identify and discuss contemporary and historical issues of race, color, and ethnicity and their impact on our society in order to enable change in perspective, both individually and collectively, to encourage anti-racism in the broader community. It is a safe place for members of our parish and community to gain a deeper understanding of how racism affects our lives.

The series focus is on books, articles, documentaries and films that stimulate discussions on racism. In the past the series has used books such as *How To Be An Antiracist* by Ibram Kendi and *So You Want To Talk About Race* by Ijeoma Oluo to further our collective journeys. Over the course of the summer months, the series will use the book, *Waking Up White*, by Debbie Irving for discussions where we will share our understanding of what the author is teaching us about race.

# Outreach at St. Luke's | In Our Fields Mobile Feeding Program

Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10am to 1pm.

All staff and volunteers will wear a mask and practice social distancing to minimize risk.

For the last 200 years, the St. Luke's community has cared for the needs of our neighborhood and city with hospitality and imagination.

Food insecurity has remained a permanent concern for our city. Since the COVID pandemic, the numbers of people in line at food pantries and community kitchens has skyrocketed. "It's never been this tragic for such a sustained period of time," said Rosanna Robbins, director of food access and capacity at City Harvest. "We expect there to be a real need for free food for a very long time." In New York City, an estimated 2 million residents are now facing food insecurity – a number which has nearly doubled during the pandemic.

Faced with a consistent stream of folks these last six months asking for help securing their next meal, we made a decision: Instead of waiting for folks to find us, we'll go to them.

On Tuesday and Thursday mornings, we will gather to make and distribute meals and hygiene supplies along routes in our neighborhoods where we believe we'll encounter the folks who will need them. In addition to meals, masks, hygiene kits, and resource lists, we will provide a supplemental pantry bag with grab-and-go items appropriate for those without access to a kitchen.
