When the clock strikes midnight for January 1 in Spain, people waiting in earnest hold twelve grapes in their hand. At each tolling of the hour, they pop a grape into their mouth and if they successfully eat all twelve grapes by the twelfth toll, they are promised twelve months of good luck.

Nochevieja, literally "Old Night", has held this tradition for at least a hundred years in Spain. The origins aren't easy to pinpoint, but in 2012 an NPR journalist named Jeff Koehler was living in Spain and found newspaper articles from the 1880's. The article described grape sales around New Year's increasing as middle-lower class Spaniards found their own way to join the French champagne toast. Whenever it started, it caught on. Grapes are now a national tradition, a clinging to fortune and luck for at least a year's time.



I often find myself, too, seeking ways at New Year's to claim good luck. There's something beautiful about traditions that hold meaning, and there's something even more special about that meaning itself. What is it about good luck?

Whenever we or someone we know embarks on a new journey, the wish is for good luck. In its simplicity, that wish holds us in our embarkation. It's a wish of encouragement that leads us to feeling more empowered and braver to take on whatever journey is ahead of us. It sets our mind to be more positive and open to whatever will be in our favor. Whether or not luck has anything to do with it, for these reasons it is good.

As we journey into a moment of new, new year, new time, new season, new life, may we hold each other in this wish. Let it be our prayer. Good luck. Good luck to you as you embark. Good luck to you as you brave what is before you. Good luck to you as you open yourself to what is in your favor. May the journey be blessed and may you feel empowered by our wish for you.

Why do we sing in worship?

Many of us accept that music in worship is just "what we do." Surely, there must be more...

Scripture tells us many times to sing "psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs." One translation of Ephesians 5 says to "make melody with your heart to the Lord." What a beautiful image!

Knowing that the Bible admonishes us to sing, the primary function of doing so in worship is to add a deeper dimension of participation. To quote St. Augustine, "whoever sings once prays twice," as music is more expressive than ordinary speech. Music allows us to access our faith and to connect with the Christian community, spanning back generations.

Our corporate song binds us together in a way that is felt very deeply, a social glue like no other. An example of this can be found in an extraordinary scientific fact: when a choir sings together, it can reach a point where all of its members' heartbeats synchronize. This is due to the singers inhaling and expelling air at the same time and rate. It's an incredible symbol of the power of song.

The singing of hymns is something that follows us all our lives. As children, we hear our parents and grandparents singing hymns, and these hymns walk with us on our faith

journey. They speak to us in different ways during different times of our lives: following the birth of a child, after the loss of a parent, during the holiday season, as we reach periods of great change or great joy or great sorrow, the melodies and poetry of our congregational song accompany our living, both as individuals and as a community of faith.

The way that music follows us for our entire life—whether you're a professional musician, an amateur member of a volunteer choir, or just someone that likes to sing in the shower—is why children singing is of paramount importance. Of all the things our children do, singing is something that cannot be lost with age. Anyone can sing, and singing will remain with our children, informing their lives and faith—lending comfort and energy and solace and encouragement—for years to come. Learning to sing is learning to express, to connect, to listen, to empathize, to love. As our community walks together during this new year, it is my prayer that we will each consider what music means to us. If you've never thought of such a thing, take the first step by opening the hymnal on a Sunday morning and really pondering the words of one of our hymns. What stands out to you? What does this teach you? Is there a special memory attached to the specific hymn, or to any particular words and phrases?



On Sunday, December 11th we had our first multi-generational led worship which was aptly titled "One Church Together." Many voices shared in praising our God through song, Scripture reading and participating in every aspect of worship. It was very refreshing to see various generations coming together in a true act of worship. We know this is not the last.

If you would like to raise your voice for our next "One Church Together" worship service, please let us know.



### SAVE A LIFE WITH YOUR DONATION NOW

One of our Food Pantry volunteers has Polycystic Kidney Disease (PKD), a dominant genetic disorder that runs in her family. Her kidney function has been dropping for years and despite taking meticulous care of her health, she is now in need of a kidney transplant. The wait for a cadaver donor is years long leading to health deterioration and sometimes death. A living donor transplant greatly increases the chance of survival.

Donating a kidney may not be right for everyone, or it simply might not be the right time. But there could be someone within your circle of family and friends who may be able to help. Our food panty volunteer needs an "O" blood type donor.

Transplant will be performed at St. Barnabas Hospital in Livingston, NJ. To learn more about kidney donation, you can visit rwjbh.org and look for "The Living Donor Institute - New Jersey Health System" or call (973) 322-5346.

Living organ donors are angels on earth. While not everyone is a candidate for kidney donation, the Living Kidney Donor team at St. Barnabas can answer any and all questions. All inquiries are confidential and the care and advice they provide to any potential donor is exceptional.

Our very own FPC member, Caitlin Mollison shares her experience and we hope her story inspires you to act now. In 2017, I donated a kidney to my husband (Dave Kozo's) cousin. I began by getting medical testing done to make sure I was a match. After we learned that I was a match, I received tests to ensure I was healthy enough to be a donor and some counseling to make sure that I had enough support to go through with the surgery. The kidney transplant surgery was done at St. Barnabas. All the tests, surgery, hospital costs, and follow-up visits were done free of charge for me. I recovered quickly, and so did Dave's cousin, who is a school teacher and has two kids. She is living a great life now! Kidney donation had zero impact on my health, and if I were to need a kidney donation down the road (not anticipated, as I am in good health), I would go to the head of the line for a transplant because of my donor status. Please consider getting tested to see if you are a match for our volunteer in need. Kidney donation is both life-changing and potentially life-saving!
