




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### PASTOR'S PEACE by Rev. Dr. Fred Garry

Just as Advent was unique last year so Lent will be unique this year.

Last year for Lent we were in the midst of the beginning of the pandemic. New York and New Jersey were in full-blown crisis mode and the church was completely virtual. Each part of Lent felt like it was a storm with no end in sight.

Lent begins on February 17th, a month away as I write this. This is the time I am usually finishing the preparations for the season and I have a clear vision of what the seven weeks will entail. At this point last year I was finishing the final edits for a book to be shared with the congregation. The book was the culmination of months and years of thought, many Lenten seasons.

Right now I am not as prepared. My lack of preparation is not a lack of interest or diligence. It is a recognition that everything is ever changing. I feel ridiculous even thinking about Easter on April 4th. The rhythm of the year has been replaced by the routine of the pandemic.

COVID is a daily routine. Protocols, tests, CALI scores, distancing. I will say the wearing of a mask has helped me navigate the year without a cold "so far." Yet, as I prepare for Lent, I am mindful this is the second one we've lived in uncertainty of the virus. It is a routine of uncertainty.

And then, just when I thought we could breathe a bit and focus our attention to the possibility of a vaccine, our democracy came off the rails. 220 years of peaceful transference of power were put aside for a horn wearing shirtless man ranting conspiracies. The events in the Capitol on January 6th, I pray, were an anomaly and will not become a pattern. But that is uncertain.

A week later the president was impeached a second time. Again, I pray this remains a rare course of action, but that too is uncertain. I gave this article to Vicky Lacson to put into our newsletter with the caveat: be prepared to pull it. For what I am about to write next is a hope that could be easily dashed.

I feel hopeful about the vaccine and the potential of recovery and I feel hopeful that truth and decency and civility will prevail and restore a sense of calm. I believe the gaslighting and the delusion of "stop the steal" will fade. At some point, America will want to move on, get back to business, and the juvenile acts of violence as well as the clear acts of sedition will be dealt with by our Justice system. We will move on.

Yet, what I am most hopeful about is that we, as a church, will persist in the path of finding our voice. Recently I had the pleasure to describe how we as a church have gone farther down the path of lifting the fallen, speaking up to injustice, and being honest about our brokenness. America will move on, but I hope and trust we will keep on the path of healing and reconciliation. I live in the hope of the church.

Ash Wednesday will soon be upon us and then Easter will arrive before we know it. Will it be like any other Lenten season before? Not a chance. Will we endure and grow and even gain strength? Of this there is near certainty; this is our path.

### A PERSONAL NOTE

When our son Josh married his wife Jordan in 2009, I had been a pastor for fifteen years. The next year, our daughter Laura married her husband Andrew. As a slow learner it was not until then that I saw the wedding ceremony from the vantage of a family. The event came into focus when I could see from both sides of the aisle. Only then did I truly begin to appreciate the dynamics of a wedding. My focus as a pastor was always on the couple, "this is their big day." And it is! But once I saw my own children in the midst, I could see so much more.

The wedding is a moment of family dynamics, both positive and negative. There is pageantry but also a hefty dose of chaos. Mostly, though, as Shakespeare said, there is a "joining of two houses." Other than the comedic potential of non-dancers dancing, the joining of houses is the real drama. This is the deep end of the pool.

As I flew to Seattle just after Christmas I knew I was in for such an experience. I know hospice, hospitals, and grief; I know what it means to be with families facing sudden loss. And I have faced loss before of family and friends many times, but this was different. To lose your parent is a moment where life shifts.

Helping my mother through this sudden loss was a great challenge. My father went from stomach pains to passing away in two weeks. And, with pandemic restrictions, he did so without his wife beside him or his sons able to gather with him.

We are still less than a month from his passing but already I can see so much change, so much has "shifted." Fate doesn't seem to ask for your permission nor offer any fair warning; life changes. In the midst of this I found myself drawing so much strength from our life together, this church, and the challenges we've faced during the last year. There was no fair warning, but your graciousness and compassion and courage helped me take each step.

I thank you and especially thank the staff and elders who accommodated my absence. I felt cared for and guarded by your prayers. This let me be in "one" place. I could see this loss from both sides of the aisle. Thank you for the grace to step away. It made coming home a great relief.

### AN OPPORTUNITY FOR DEVOTION


When you consider your faith from the vantage of history, the amount of information, the history, and the theology of the church, this can be quite overwhelming. Even just the Bible alone can feel like a sea of images and a jumble of people and places. How can you grow in faith when there seems to be so many ways to go?

I have heard many people say, "I am going to read the Bible this year." And this is great. There are many devotionals that will allow you to do this. Usually there are three to four portions of scripture to read each day. This is to avoid the doldrums of Leviticus or the long list of wicked nations of Isaiah. One can only enjoy so many laws about grain and leprosy before the Bible becomes a drag. Reading the Bible in a year is an "encyclopedic" approach. You get to encounter the book as a whole, from Genesis to Revelation; and the encounter is in a brief, digestible format. But let's be honest, no one is ever seen as sane who says, "I really want to read my encyclopedia set." The Bible, as a place of sacred contemplation, is a misfit when it comes to a quick read. To attend to the Bible and find the voice of the Holy Spirit is more of a deep dive than a skimming of the surface.

That was my thought when I wrote a small book called *The Mean Estate*. This is a daily devotional for Lent where all of the parables of Jesus are considered. The hope is that by the end of Lent a reader can say, "I know the parables of Jesus." And this is a great thing to know.

The parables are a place to go deep into the call to follow Jesus. There are the heart of his teachings. And, most importantly, there are around forty of them. In a few weeks this short book will be available to any who would like one. There is a suggested donation of \$5 to cover the cost of printing.

There are many ways to find a place of devotion during Lent. This is one I have found helpful to me.



The mean estate is where we find the blessing of meekness and the glory of humility.

Consider a parable a day and find their power.

Be ready to ask, "how can I live this?"

Be ready for the answer, "you must be born anew as one who abides in the mean estate."




### **VIRTUAL SUNDAY SCHOOL**

### **THE 2021 FAMINE**



In so many ways, this year's Famine is the same as every other year, but also very different. We will be hosting our Famine on **Saturday**, **February 27th, ONLY!** Certain activities will not take place out of an abundance of caution.

This year's all-too relevant theme is food insecurity in regard to the Covid-19 pandemic. Our goal is to package 20,000 meals and raise money for our ongoing Food Pantry efforts and expansion. Please consider donating financially as we combat food insecurity in our area.

Our 2021 Famine is just a few weeks away. The committee is busy planning, and we are excited to see how God once again works through our Youth this year. This year's Famine is different in many ways. For one, we are not offering an overnight or grocery shopping. Famine, this year, is a one day only event. But for as disappointing as the first change is, our second is truly exciting. We are partnering with the Youth Group at Temple Emanu-El this year. Their Senior High Youth will be joining us throughout the day and participating in our Famine together. We are excited to make this more of an interfaith event focusing on food insecurity as the need is so present.

This year Famine event will focus on how this pandemic has created more and more food insecurity throughout our country and what we can do to change that. All fundraising efforts will go to feeding those in our local communities as well as our FPC Food Pantry expansion.

**WHAT:** For up to 30 hours, we are going hungry to raise funds which will be used to empower local communities in their strive to eliminate poverty and hunger.

WHEN: February 27th, 2021 at 9:00 am

**WHY:** 45 million Americans or 14.5% of our population including many Youth were already food insecure prior to this pandemic.

### Music Ministry

Hymn texts have a way of speaking to what is on our hearts, especially when things are stressful and uncertain. The following text was written by Horatius Bonar in 1846. Each stanza pairs an invitation from Jesus with a response from the narrator. The three invitations recall how Jesus welcomed those who were heavy laden, offered living water, and identified himself as the light of the world.

### I HEARD THE VOICE OF JESUS SAY

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "Come unto me and rest; Lay down, O weary one, lay down your head upon my breast."

I came to Jesus as I was, so weary, worn, and sad; I found in him a resting place, and he has made me glad.

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "Behold, I freely give The living water, thirsty one; stoop down and drink and live."

I came to Jesus, and I drank of that life giving stream; My thirst was quenched, my soul revived, and now I live in him.

I heard the voice of Jesus say, "I am this dark world's light;

look unto me, your morn shall rise, and all your day be bright."

I looked to Jesus, and I found in him my star, my sun; and in that light of life I'll walk till traveling days are done.




Racial Justice Book Study

**Jesus and John Wayne**, by Kristin Kobes du Mez, was a tough read.

Granted, she is a wonderful writer and her prose moves quickly and gracefully from one topic to another. Truly, the research she has done is thorough and lacks the sloppiness of someone trying to publish a book quickly to capture the fickle attention of the American reader.

And, her topic, religion in America, is not something that I find to be beyond my interest or comprehension.

But this book was tough for me.


The difficulty was how close it hit home and how much of my adolescence was contained in its pages. She is writing about the great hope of so many: America is a place of God's choosing; this is a land of manifest destiny; we are a key part in the plan of creation. In each chapter she unravels this hope, lays bare its myopic vision, and, more importantly, begs the reader to consider that a drunken Hollywood star may not be a role model for following Jesus.

But it became really tough when I remembered: I had a poster of John Wayne in my room for most of my youth!

Jesus and John Wayne is a careful, well researched consideration of what Christianity can become in America.

There is a temptation to make our faith a triumphant march instead of a humble following.

What du Mez does is ask a single question again and again: Is Jesus really a soldier killing them all? Is Christianity really about swager? It may be that you have exhausted all Netflix has to offer. If so, or even if you haven't, read Jesus and John Wayne.

Celebrating This February marks Nancy Leardi's fifteenth anniversary as staff member of the First Presbyterian Church of Metuchen.

> Little did we know, when Nancy joined us back in 2006, how well she would foster and facilitate our young people's ability to share Christ's love in so many ways. As Director of Christian Education, Nancy excels at culti-

vating biblical curiosity and education for our youth from Preschool up to High school! Over the past 15 years, Nancy has significantly improved Sunday School curriculum as well as upgrading training for our Sunday School Teaching volunteers. And she's done a remarkable job re-making our VBS program, along with Brenda Day and Julie Shaver. But it's not just about the little ones - Nancy singlehandedly developed and leads Presbyterian Young Women, for middle and high school girls. She has worked hard at also developing different types of opportunities for adult Christian education.

A few weeks ago, The Personnel Commission recognized the incredible work that Nancy has done this past year during the pandemic. Some of these accomplishments include:

Creating "Faith Kits" for the virtual Sunday school. These to-go bags contain crafts and activities organized so that

when the Sunday School teacher "virtually" announces a project, the children can quickly find what they need in in the worship bags.

Developing a virtual VBS program. Nancy was not going to let a pandemic stop our VBS program. She even added decorations to the Sanctuary so that the children wouldn't miss out— even though they could not be in the Sanctuary this year.

Finding readers for our Sunday Services. Worship has been very different this year, and having Congregants read during services is one way to make enhance Worship. Nancy encourages readers and meets with them during the week to ensure they are comfortable with their reading in advance of Sunday Services.

Seamlessly shifting to a virtual Sunday school curriculum and then coaching and supporting the Sunday school volunteer teachers in leading their zoom classes.


