## PASTOR'S PEACE by Rev. Ashley Bair

As 2022 has taken off with a running start, I've found myself searching for hopeful things happening this year.

February has historically been the snowiest month of the year. As our climate continues to shift, the unpredictability of the weather - which in winter can also barometer my mood makes this search for the hopeful more of an investigation.

I started this investigation with the obvious: holidays. What holiday is in February? Valentine's Day. I read all the pages on the history of Saint Valentine and how the Saint Valentine that we celebrate today was martyred for his radical ministry to persecuted Christians. Noble indeed. But the thing that made me pause in my investigation was the note that said that Saint Valentine is the patron saint of beekeepers.

I'm fascinated by beekeepers and bees.

New Jersey alone is home to 12 species of native bees and honeybees. According to the New Jersey Department of Agriculture, "bees are the most important pollinators in most ecosystems. They facilitate the reproduction and improve seed sets for half of New Jersey's top fruit and vegetables.

Throughout history, bees have provided humans with products such as honey, beeswax, pollen, venom, and dietary supplements. In New Jersey, we benefit from bee pollination as they help sustain many crops, such as apples, cranberries, blueberries, cantaloupes, cucumbers, and watermelons.

Honeybees pollinate about a third of the food Americans eat. And honeybees have been plagued by a variety of introduced insect and bacterial parasites, so today it is extremely rare to find natural colonies. This makes beekeeping an essential activity, not only for agriculture culture but also for anyone who has a backyard vegetable garden and flower beds or trees in their yard." So far this year there are over 3,000 registered beekeepers in the state of New Jersey. What a hopeful thought.

Soon our youth will be exploring the realities of food loss and lack of access to food on a global and local scale. With this reality and the effects of climate change, especially during a pandemic where consumerism and our carbon footprint has increased exponentially, it feels right to spread some seasonal warmth to the patron saint of beekeeping. This February, this Valentine's Day, let us give thanks for the hope found in beekeepers, the hope found in those seeking to care for some of the smallest creatures in our midst that make the biggest impact. Thank you, beekeepers, for your hands that hold the food on our tables.



## Something brewing...

Bob Smietana posted an article on May 2021 in the Episcopal New Service (ENS) regarding the beloved church coffee hour.

Coffee hour is a staple of congregational life for many houses of worship, where members drink coffee, often brewed in commercial vats, and chitchat before or after services. But when in-person worship services paused during the pandemic, coffee hour disappeared. That time of socializing is one of the things that churchgoers have missed most about meeting in person.

Invited guests from Camp Johnsonburg presented the organization's \$2 million Capital Fundraising Program for infrastructure improvements to the camp campus. Rev. Garry noted FPC-M's long-tenured association with Camp Johnsonburg, pledging continued financial support from the congregation for the camp and their capital fundraising program.

Elder Linda Boughton, Chair of Personnel Commission, presented to Session an overview of the 2022 Church Staff Employee Handbook. Session will review the Handbook and look to approve it at the Regular Monthly Session meeting on 8 February 2022. Session expressed its thanks to the Personnel Commission for undertaking such a critical project.



A series of New Member Classes will be offered in February. This is open to adults interested in becoming members of the First Presbyterian Church of Metuchen.

They will meet with Rev. Garry to explore what it means to be Presby-

terian, what are the opportunities to be part of ministry, and what mission projects and efforts are currently under way for people of all ages.

This workshop is planned with the goal to explore healthy boundaries that will sustain good and healthy relationships in the church, and making room for spiritual growth.

In December, Session voted to invite Dr. Stephen Treat to lead a workshop/training for the congregation, and for other churches in the Presbytery as well. Steve Treat has a long career in counseling and is a sought after speaker. Many of you have had training on boundary awareness in your workplace as this is a significant challenge. Yet, this workshop is focused on the unique dynamics of maintaining healthy boundaries within a church.

Pastors receive ongoing training in this area, but such training is not often made available for the larger congregation. We believe this is equally an important training to share with church members and certainly a timely one as we seek to move forward.

The event is open to all and there is no charge. We are still fine tuning the details of this webinar with the hope that a hybrid meeting consisting of in-person and virtual by Zoom will be possible. We remain vigilant in monitoring the Covid-19 situation and a final decision will be announced through all of FPC social media platforms and eblasts whether a hybrid meeting or only a virtual one will occur. ## From your Minister of Music Brenda Day

As we navigate this spike of Covid as a church, with the disappointments yet again of no in-person services, rehearsals, or meetings, I was reminded of hymns about our faith. The first one I'll quote was written by Isaac Watts in 1719 and wedded to a tune that was written by William Croft in 1708. It's a beloved hymn of the church with words as timely today as they were when written 300 years ago—"Our God, Our Help in Ages Past."

Our God, our help in ages past, our hope for years to come, Our shelter from the stormy blast, and our eternal home.

Beneath the shadow of thy throne thy saints have dwelt secure; sufficient is thine arm alone, and our defense is sure.

Before the hills in order stood, or earth received its frame, from everlasting thou art God, to endless years the same. A thousand ages in thy sight are like an evening gone, short as the watch that ends the night before the rising sun.

Time, like an ever rolling stream, bears all our years away; they fly forgotten, as a dream dies at the opening day.

Our God, our help in ages past, our hope for years to come, be thou our guard while life shall last, and our eternal home.

Another hymn about faith was written more recently, in 1995, by Carl P. Daw Jr. with words that can speak to us today. Hymn lyrics of "Faith Begins By Letting Go" is a message we can all cling on to and claim.

Faith begins by letting go, giving up what had seemed sure, Taking risks and pressing on, though the way feels less secure: Pilgrimage both right and odd, trusting all our life to God.

Faith endures by holding on, keeping memory's roots alive So that hope may bear its fruit; promise fed, our souls will thrive, Not through merit we possess but by God's great faithfulness.

Faith matures by reaching out, stretching minds, enlarging hearts, Sharing struggles, living prayer, binding up the broken parts; till we find the commonplace ripe with witness to God's grace.








## FPC Youth Group 2022 Famine is Coming Soon!

FPC Youth Group members will once again participate in the annual Famine Event. In order to raise funds, our Youth ask sponsors to support them as they fast for 24-30 hours in solidarity with the many people that go hungry everyday around the world. This year's fundraising goal has been set at \$20,000. Monies raised by the Famine participants will be split amongst our own FPC Food Pantry, Kids Against Hunger, Elijah's Promise and World Vision.

Every year our Congregation responds to this event with great enthusiasm, generously sponsoring individual youth or the general famine group and we look forward to your support again this year. You can sponsor our youth online in several ways:

To sponsor an individual youth, type their name in the Fundraiser Search box or you can just make a donation to the general Famine event. If you prefer, you can mail a check payable to FPC and put FAMINE 2022 in the note field. All donations are tax deductible and greatly appreciated!

During Famine, the youth will spend the day learning about issues surrounding food insecurity and its causes and effects on both individuals, families and communities. This year's theme of *WHAT'S ON YOUR PLATE?* examines how difficult it is to fill a plate with food in so many parts of the world, including our own communities. We'll explore issues and factors including "food deserts", access to water, farming, labor, environmental changes and more. Along with the research portion of the day, the youth will package 20,000 meals for Kids Against Hunger (www.kidsagainsthunger.org), learn about our own FPC Food Pantry and the amazing work that they do feeding local families, play some games, and create visual reminders for our church and community about the lives lost every year due to hunger related issues.

While we are planning a COVID-safe event, given the current pandemic situation, it is possible that Famine 2022 may end up modified or canceled at the last minute. Any funds raised will still be donated to the agencies mentioned.

## Creative (and Simple!) Means to Stay Connected by Amy-Bertelsen Robles

My mother is an independent person, who appreciates having her own space and routines. She lives alone and is approaching her 90th birthday. When she recently tested positive for covid, her doctor told me that I needed to check her temperature and blood oxygen levels four times a day. Having my own health issues, I was not going to be able to take care of her in-person. I was really scared, and I had to figure out another way to take care of my mom.

Thankfully, over the summer she reluctantly agreed to set up an Echo Show 8 in her living room, which is a video camera with built-in Alexa. In order for us to see each other, I had to get one for my house and we've been "dropping in" on each other ever since. It connects automatically, so mom didn't have to be close to the device for me to see into her living room when she wasn't feeling well. Also, if she was in another room, she would hear a sound that the echo makes to alert her that I "dropped in" and was waiting for her to come to the device.

Due to the technology, I was able to care for my mom, monitor her affect, observe her using her oximeter and thermometer, and record her numbers for the doctor. Mom and I are a pair of the least tech-savvy people, but due to this simple technology, we were able to stay connected while she was sick. I was able to take care of my mom, myself and my family, and I am truly grateful.

# Love gardening and the Food Pantry? This could be for you!

The Food Pantry Garden (FPG) is currently looking for a new leader to lead a team of volunteers to manage, plan and expand the capabilities of the First Presbyterian Church of Metuchen's Food Pantry Garden. The new FPG space is about 80 x 30 feet plot constructed in 2021 through an Eagle Scout Project. In the year of its inception in 2020, the FPG provided 600+ pounds . In 2021, the FPG donated 1,200 pounds of fresh food to the clients of the food pantry! With our new space, it is conceivable that we will hit 2,500 pounds!



The FPG Lead's primary responsibility will be to ensure the execution of day-to-day work to keep the garden producing at its highest capacity. Not only is the FPG a way to provide food to the community, but it is also an opportunity for the community to become involved. This individual will work closely with community volunteers on a day-to-day basis to plan, obtain resources, operate equipment, monitor plant growth, and coordinate any needed work sessions. During the growing season, the garden requires nearly daily inspections to assess watering, harvesting, and pest control requirements; taking anywhere from 10 minutes to 1 hour if work is required. This individual should have availability early Wednesday mornings (7:00-8:30 am) to oversee the main weekly harvest, as the Food Pantry is open on Wednesday and Thursdays for distribution. In addition, the candidate should have flexibility to respond to urgent issues, such as storm damage and frost protection.
