As we approach Earth Day on April 22, we approach another opportunity to examine how we have lived into the call to care for the goodness of God's creation.


There is cause to pause and lament that the damage of climate change has become such a destructive force to our planet. That we have flattened the high places, made grids upon the land and redirected the flowing waters. The perfected basins that God created to catch the rain and snow no longer define the people, animals and plants. We have created things in the chaos, but we can't call it good.

There is cause to pause and remember that this is why the call to care for the goodness of God's creation is such an important one for the church. The active agents in climate change impact us and our neighbors, animal life, and our ecosystem.

So long as fossil fuel companies are hurting our neighbors, this is a church issue. So long as all of our futures are at stake because of the consumption of a few, this is a church issue. So long as people of color and poor communities are impacted first and worst by climate change, this is a church issue.

There is cause to pause and give thanks that when we are working for climate justice and the goodness of creation, we're putting our faith into action.

- As a result of continuing improvements to the State of NJ CALI score for the Central East region, Session moved to make masks optional throughout the entire church campus effective 20 March 2022, with the exception of the balcony in the Sanctuary during Sunday Morning Worship service. The balcony is designated as a socially distanced space during Sunday Worship service where masks will be required. Session also moved to resume space rentals throughout the church campus to outside groups. Session noted COVID-19 matters may require more discussion going forward.
- Session approved a resolution retroactive to 1 January 2022 requested by Elder Linda Boughton, Chair of the Personnel Commission to adopt a Further Flexible Spending Account as part of the Church Staff employee benefit plan.
- Elder Jim Krauszer, President of the Trustees and Chair of Finance Commission reported FPC-M received the two cancelled Social Center Building Campaign mortgages from Manasquan Bank which were entirely paid off in October 2021.

The 4 C's of Fellowship: Coffee, Community, Comfort, and Church

When it comes to bringing religious communities together, coffee, community, comfort, and church are the foundation of fellowship across religions and denominations. Having a high-quality coffee hour at your church attracts members, encourages ongoing bonding and stimulates growth.

COFFEE: Coffee is more than just a java jump in the morning; it's something we all have in common. Coffee is a tradition that brings people together. When enjoyed at church, it fuels fellowship and underscores the importance of community, not to mention lifting the spirit.

COMMUNITY: Coffee ministries are about more than just hot beverages. It's about inviting visitors to stay a little longer, get to know each other better, as we strive to strengthen the bonds of the church community.

COMFORT: Coffee is like liquid courage that helps people interact with each other. When you look over and another person is holding the same cup, it's a simple yet profound connection. It doesn't matter if you're 20 or 100, coffee is an unassuming beverage. Suddenly, different generations are getting to know each other at coffee hours, smiling, laughing, and sharing. New friendships form, couples greet each other, and parents exchange stores as their children play.

DID YOU KNOW...that one way we can engage in social change is by protecting and nurturing our environment?



Easter Egg Hunt April 17th, 10:30-11:00 am Social Center Ball Field




Come visit our ball field on Easter morning. Each child will be given a bag for the egg hunt. Families are encouraged to walk their child onto the field in search for eggs.
