The Angelus

This year, students will be invited to recite the Angelus daily at 12pm during the school day.

Traditionally, it is believed that the practice started in Italy in the 11th Century, where the Church bells would ring and call all who heard them to pray at 6am, 12noon and 6pm. It was an invitation to take the time to pause, direct their thoughts to God and humbly receive His grace.

The Angelus remembers the Incarnation, which ties directly to the theme of "belonging" because Christ became man so that He could be intimately connected to every part of our lives and ultimately die for us. So great is His love for us.

Sometimes it's easy to forget that Jesus had a family, a mom and a dad, He went to school, played with His friends in Nazareth and ate meals with His family. He belonged to a family and a community, and He is the foundation for ours.

The Angelus is a beautiful prayer to remind us that Christ is close to us in the ordinary, everyday events of our lives. While we are not Italian field workers, we are still invited to join our daily work (whatever that is) to Christ and be reminded of the larger community and family that we belong to.

Please join our community in praying the Angelus daily and commit to praying for each other.


We also wanted to mention that families who are not Catholic or who haven't been to Mass in a long time are also welcome and encouraged to join us and learn more.

The Angelus is a unique Catholic devotion that helps us meditate on the importance of the Incarnation three times each day with a special focus on the Annunciation.

TIME

At the sound of church bells (or a notification on your phone) at these specific times each day, stop and pray the Angelus alone or in groups:

6:00 a.m. • Noon • 6:00 p.m.

THE ANGELUS PRAYER

The words of the prayer are arranged in such a way that a leader begins with the call (V.) and others offer the response (R.), but you can certainly pray the entire prayer alone. You are always united with other people in your time zone praying at the same time as you. Here is the prayer:

V. The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary. R. And she conceived of the Holy Spirit.

Hail Mary...

V. Behold the handmaid of the Lord.
R. Be it done unto me according to thy word.

Hail Mary...

V. And the Word was made flesh. R. And dwelt among us.

Hail Mary...

V. Pray for us, O holy Mother of God. R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Let us Pray:

Pour forth, we beseech thee, O Lord,thy grace into our hearts, that we, to whom the Incarnation of Christ, thy Son, was made known by the message of an angel, may by his Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of his Resurrection.

Through the same Christ our Lord.

Amen.

REVERENCE

It is customary to genuflect or bow when we say the words "And dwelt among us" to show our gratitude to God for the Incarnation.
