FIRST KIDS

In preschool this month we're going to be talking about how God is good! Sometimes we get so excited about the gift that we forget to remember the giver. So, this month we will take some time to look around at the wonderful gifts God has given us and teach our preschoolers that God is good! We want our preschoolers to know that all of the good things they see in the world are good gifts from a very good God Who loves them. And we can say "Thank you, God!"
