Judgment & Pardon

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Thank God for how great it is to be pardoned, freed, and adopted by God through His Son, Jesus

1. The "<u>rightness</u>" that God requires only comes by faith in Jesus, not religion

Romans 3:21-22

How do religions answer this question: "What must I do to be '<u>right</u>' with my deity?"

2. Jesus accomplished your <u>pardon</u>, your freedom, and turned aside God's wrath at the cross

Romans 3:22-25

To be justified is "to be declared right"

Definition of "<u>pardon</u>" (v) - to use the executive power to forgive a person convicted of a crime, thus removing any remaining penalties or punishments and preventing any new prosecution of the person for the crime for which the pardon was given

2 Corinthians 5:21

Definition of "redemption" - "the price paid for release" (slavery term)

The concept of <u>atonement</u> meant that Jesus' sacrifice "turned aside the wrath of God" that could only be satisfied by the shed blood of the sinless God-man who bore the sin of the world

"Paul has thus pressed into service the language of the law court ('justified'), the slave-market ('redemption') and the altar ('atoning sacrifice') in the attempt to do justice to the fullness of God's gracious act in Christ. Pardon, liberation, atonement - all are made available to men and women by his free initiative and may be appropriated by faith." FF Bruce

3. The intersection of God's judgment and our pardon provides our <u>adoption</u> as God's own

Romans 3:25-26

forbearance - "of God releasing His judgment on sin in the OT when redeeming believers. This was based on the absolutely sure, upcoming sacrifice of Christ – 'retroactively applied' to them in God's immutable, eternal plan." biblehub.com
