

County Tables Vote on Ambulance Levy

Citing the absence of Commissioner Harold Michael for health reasons, the Hardy County Commission tabled a vote on including an emergency ambulance levy on the November ballot.

The commission met on Tuesday, July 3.

The levy being considered would raise \$1.2 million per year for the Hardy County Emergency Ambulance Authority. It would increase Class I taxes by \$0.0469, Class II taxes by \$0.0938 and Class III and IV by \$0.1876.

If approved by 60 percent of the voters, it would remain in effect for five years.

"Most people I've talked to don't mind paying a bill, but they don't want to pay too much and have the money just sitting in an account somewhere," said Commission President William "JR" Keplinger. "If you consider the amount we're collecting now, if we collected 100 percent it would be \$890,000, which does not include businesses. The budget seems to work now."

Rosier Pleads No Contest, Smith Sent To Prison

Steven M. Rosier, 20, of Moorefield pleaded no contest to one count of first degree arson. Judge C. Carter Williams heard cases in Hardy County Circuit Court on Tuesday, July 3.

Rosier was originally charged with multiple counts of arson as well as burglary and conspiracy in a fire that occurred on June 7, 2017.

In return for his plea, Prosecuting Attorney Lucas See agreed to drop the other charges and recommended Rosier be sentenced to the Anthony Center for Youthful Offenders. If Rosier completes the program, the prosecution will recommend probation.

"The problem is, we have to look five years out," said Hardy County Ambulance Authority President Paul Lewis. "If Fraley ceases to exist, for whatever reason, we would have to add a fee to the levy."

Lewis said the emergency ambulance fee collected \$742,161, which constitutes about 77 percent of the total billed. The HCEAA had a total income of \$946,000 with insurance billing.

"I didn't hear anyone come out and say they were for the levy," said Commissioner David "Jay" Fansler.

Fansler was referring to a public information meeting held on Wednesday, June 27. About 20 members of the community attended.

"We don't know what will happen in the future," Fansler continued. "If need be, we could increase the fee."

Keplinger said the main advantage of the levy is that it solves some collection issues.

"Let the fee in place for a few years," Moorefield resident Fran Welton suggested. "This is a new organization and people need some time to get used to it."

"Can you investigate who is not paying and why?" asked Mathias resident John Buckley. "Are there privacy issues that would prohibit you from publishing the names of the people who don't pay?"

"The majority of people are out of state," Lewis said.

Keplinger said the commission would consider adding the levy question to the November ballot at the next County Commission meeting on Aug. 7.

Auditor Promotes New Open Government Website

"When I campaigned, I said I wanted West Virginia to be the most transparent state in the country," said West Virginia State Auditor J. B. McCuskey. "This is a way to make that happen."

McCuskey came to the Hardy County Commission meeting on Tuesday, July 2 to present information on OpenGov.com, an online system that will show all the county's revenue and expenditures and will be available to anyone who has access to a computer.

West Virginia is already using the program at the state level. "This is real time access to the money being spent," McCuskey said. "You can look at General Revenue, the sources. This is upto-date within 24 hours."

McCuskey demonstrated how to access wvcheckbook.com and how to access the revenue, spending and Supreme Court windows. "There's been a lot of interest in the Supreme Court's spending recently," he said.

The website also features a tutorial on how to access the site.

What You Need **To Know About** Newspapers and **Their Survival**

There are two things you need to know about newspapers. Newspapers are important to community life and democracy. Always have been. We at the National Newspaper Association think it is important for all sorts of newspapers to survive for the sake of a free society—the very large and the very small ones, the liberal ones, the conservative ones, the middle-of-the-road ones, the ones with no viewpoint but just important news, all of them. Some are our members. Many are not. We defend them anyway. America needs them like we need oxygen.

The second is that even if your newspaper seems to be "online," the digital copy that you may count on probably couldn't exist if there weren't a printed newspaper behind it. The newspaper in print supports all of the other versions economically. So, if the printed version disappeared, you can't assume all would be well because it is online anyway. It won't be.

These facts are important because the paper your newspaper is printed on is under attack.

One small paper mill in Washington State is trying to use the federal trade and tariff laws to make this paper-newsprint, or uncoated groundwood paper, in paper parlance-about 50 percent more expensive. This mill has complained to the U.S. Department of Commerce and International Trade Commission about international competition. If it succeeds, the prices of newspaper printing will skyrocket. The resources available for everything else your local newspaper may need or want to do for you will be strangled.

Canadian paper producers have supplied the U.S. for many years. They have some natural advantages over U.S. papermakers because of hydroelectric power and shipping costs. More than a dozen U.S. mills have stopped making newsprint in the last decade because demand for paper has declined. Today, even if Canadian paper disappeared because of high tariffs being proposed to the federal government, the U.S. paper mills could not supply newspapers with the paper they need. Mills cost hundreds of millions of dollars to build and can take many years to be safely situated in compliance with environmental rules. With demand falling, no one is going to invest in a massive expansion of U.S. newsprint. Over the short term, tariffs could force the price of paper up and the New York investors who own the Washington State mill could gain.

But our country will lose. Fragile newspapers will vanish. Challenged newspapers will have to cut back. Even healthy newspapers are going to have to find ways to absorb a daunting new cost. And who will pay? Everyone who relies on a newspaper to tell the local stories, cover elections, advertise sales, get pictures of the winning touchdown, and cheer the economic development people on in their work of creating new jobs.



DHHR Announces Implementation of New Opioid Prescribing Requirements

(DHHR) today announced the implementation of Senate Bill 273, also known as the Opioid Reduction Act, which took effect June 7. Introduced at the request of Gov. Jim Justice, the legislation sets limitations on opioid prescriptions and authorizes a "nonopioid directive" patients can put in their medical files, formally notifying health care professionals they do not want to be prescribed or administered opioid medications.

"Thanks to Gov. Justice's vision and the ongoing efforts of the West Virginia Legislature, more individuals can avoid opioid addiction and potential overdose as a result of improper prescribing," said DHHR Cabinet Secretary Bill J. Crouch. "This legislation also assures that providers share critical information regarding the risks of opioids and alternative treatment options.'

Prior to prescribing opioids, providers must first refer or prescribe treatment alternatives such

The West Virginia Department as physical therapy. If an opioid scribed a controlled substance. of Health and Human Resources is prescribed, it must not exceed a seven-day supply at the lowest effective dose and the provider must explain the associated risks. In addition, the provider must document the patient's medical history, conduct and document a physical examination, develop a treatment plan and access relevant prescription monitoring information under the Controlled Substance Monitoring Program Database.

> Subsequent prescriptions may only be issued at least six days following the initial prescription and the provider must document that it is necessary and appropriate for the patient's treatment. A third prescription for ongoing treatment requires consideration of referral to a pain clinic or specialist.

For supplies greater than seven days, a patient must sign a narcotics contract with the prescribing provider agreeing to only get medication from that doctor, use the same pharmacy each time and notify the provider of any emergency where the patient is pre-

Adults receiving an initial opioid prescription in an emergency room or urgent care facility are limited to a four-day supply of opioid pain medicine. Minors are limited to a three-day supply.

In addition, the bill enables individuals to decline in advance any treatment option that includes opioids. The Voluntary Nonopioid Advanced Directive form, available at dhhr.wv.gov/Office-of-Drug-Control-Policy, will be filed in the patient's medical records, which should be referenced by the provider prior to opioid prescription.

"This directive is critical to patients with and without a history of substance use disorder who wish to decline that opioids be offered or administered to them," said Dr. Rahul Gupta, State Health Officer and Commissioner of DHHR's Bureau for Public Health. "With this information, providers can make more appropriate recommendations concerning pain management."

Sherman Property Needs New Name, Gets Demolition Funding

The West Virginia Department of Education, Career and Technical Education Division, has committed \$50,000 to demolish the remaining buildings on a 2.5-acre parcel of land adjacent to the Moorefield High School. The parcel, formerly known as the Sherman Property and Main Street Project, will be the location of a school/community farmers market.

One of the buildings was demolished last month, primarily with private funding.

School Superintendent Sheena VanMeter announced the funding at the July 2 Hardy County Board of Education meeting.

"Mr. Simmons met with Dr. D'Antoni and spent a lot of time on this," VanMeter said.

Former board member and former East Hardy High School principal Brad Simmons has been working as a CTE and Special Projects Coordinator with the school system.

Simmons said he has been talking with D'Antoni since September/ October. "She understood it was easier to get money to build things than it was to tear things down," he

"We want to involve as many kids as possible," Simmons said. "It will be a big entrepreneurial endeavor."

"The project needs a new name," said VanMeter. "We are being confused with the Main Street Initiative through the West Virginia Commerce Department."

VanMeter suggested it be called the Moorefield Farmers Market, but asked board members to bring other suggestions to the next meeting.

The board voted to send the School Board Meetings Policy BDA out for first reading. The only change to the existing policy is to change the time of the board meetings from 6 p.m. to 5 p.m.

"I think we should have one meeting a quarter that starts at 7 p.m.," said board member Jerry Yates. "For people who work, getting here at 5 or 6 p.m. is difficult." VanMeter said she would like to hear from the public. "I would ask the public to let us know what they think," she said.

Walking and Bike Trail Representatives of the Hardy County Parks and Recreation Commission requested support from the commission to secure a Right of Entry petition against a private property owner.

The property in question is part of a proposed Walking/Bicycle Trail which would connect the Moorefield flood control levee with Brighton Park.

"The total length is 7,270 feet, about 1 1/2 miles," said Bob Taylor. "We have permission to go on top of the levee."

Taylor presented an aerial view of the proposed trail, which would begin just south of the South Fork Potomac River bridge near U.S. Route 220.

"Of the 7,270 feet, the town of Moorefield owns 2,300 feet, the West Virginia Land Trust owns 1,800 feet and this private landowner has 3,170 feet," Taylor said. "We have tried numerous times to talk with the landowner, but no meeting has every materialized. We can't even get a response to talk.

"We can get grant funding for the project, but we can't even apply until we can secure the property."

According to Hardy County land records Louis C. and Margaret A. Miltenburger own 237.5 acres adjacent to Brighton Park.

A Right of Entry would allow representatives of the Parks and Recreation Commission to survey the property for the trail without fear of prosecution for trespassing.

"Since this is for the benefit of all the citizens of Hardy County and there is funding available, I think we should support this," Keplinger said.

"We should either do this or stop talking and working on this project," Taylor said.

- 15 bamboo skewers
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 1 tablespoon peanut oil
- teaspoon toasted sesame oil

To make Peanut Sauce: In food processor, process scallions, cilantro, jalapeno, garlic, ginger, peanut butter, toasted sesame oil, roasted garlic rice vinegar, lime juice, coconut milk, hoisin sauce and honey until smooth. Garnish with chopped peanuts.

After 2 hours of marinating, skewer chicken. Heat grill or grill pan to medium heat and cook 2 minutes on each side. Garnish with cilantro and serve with Peanut Sauce and Cucumber Salad.

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
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
