County Tables Vote on Ambulance Levy

Citing the absence of Commissioner Harold Michael for health reasons, the Hardy County Commission tabled a vote on including an emergency ambulance levy on the November ballot.

The commission met on Tuesday, July 3.

The levy being considered would raise \$1.2 million per year for the Hardy County Emergency Ambulance Authority. It would increase Class I taxes by \$0.0469, Class II taxes by \$0.0938 and Class III and IV by \$0.1876.

If approved by 60 percent of the voters, it would remain in effect for five years.

"Most people I've talked to don't mind paying a bill, but they don't want to pay too much and have the money just sitting in an account somewhere," said Commission President William "JR" Keplinger. "If you consider the amount we're collecting now, if we collected 100 percent it would be \$890,000, which does not include businesses. The budget seems to work now."

"The problem is, we have to look five years out," said Hardy County Ambulance Authority President Paul Lewis. "If Fraley ceases to exist, for whatever reason, we would have to add a fee to the levy."

Lewis said the emergency ambulance fee collected \$742,161, which constitutes about 77 percent of the total billed. The HCEAA had a total income of \$946,000 with insurance billing.

"I didn't hear anyone come out and say they were for the levy," said Commissioner David "Jay" Fansler.

Fansler was referring to a public information meeting held on Wednesday, June 27. About 20 members of the community attended.

"We don't know what will happen in the future," Fansler continued. "If need be, we could increase the fee."

Keplinger said the main advantage of the levy is that it solves some collection issues.

"Let the fee in place for a few years," Moorefield resident Fran Welton suggested. "This is a new organization and people need some time to get used to it."

"Can you investigate who is not paying and why?" asked Mathias resident John Buckley. "Are there privacy issues that would prohibit you from publishing the names of the people who don't pay?"

"The majority of people are out of state," Lewis said.

Keplinger said the commission would consider adding the levy question to the November ballot at the next County Commission meeting on Aug. 7.

Rosier Pleads No Contest, Smith Sent To Prison

Steven M. Rosier, 20, of Moorefield pleaded no contest to one count of first degree arson. Judge C. Carter Williams heard cases in Hardy County Circuit Court on Tuesday, July 3.

Rosier was originally charged with multiple counts of arson as well as burglary and conspiracy in a fire that occurred on June 7, 2017.

In return for his plea, Prosecuting Attorney Lucas See agreed to drop the other charges and recommended Rosier be sentenced to the Anthony Center for Youthful Offenders. If Rosier completes the program, the prosecution will recommend probation.

The penalty for arson is not less

State Auditor Promotes New Open Government Website

"When I campaigned, I said I wanted West Virginia to be the most transparent state in the country," said West Virginia State Auditor J. B. McCuskey. "This is a way to make that happen."

McCuskey came to the Hardy County Commission meeting on Tuesday, July 2 to present information on OpenGov.com, an online system that will show all the county's revenue and expenditures and will be available to anyone who has access to a computer.

West Virginia is already using the program at the state level. "This is real time access to the money being spent," McCuskey said. "You can look at General Revenue, the sources. This is up-to-date within 24 hours."

McCuskey demonstrated how to access wvcheckbook.com and how to access the revenue, spending and Supreme Court windows. "There's been a lot of interest in the Supreme Court's spending recently," he said.

The website also features a tutorial on how to access the site.

A "Quick Link" menu provides direct access to Employee Commission

Governor Asks for Federal Help After May/June Storms

(AP) - West Virginia Gov. Jim Justice is seeking a major disaster declaration from the federal government for flooding and wind damage in eight counties.

State officials have done a preliminary damage assessment that totaled about \$4.5 million in eli-

gible costs and damage.

Justice declared a state of emergency for Berkeley, Grant, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, Mineral, Morgan and Pendleton counties on June 4, after rainfall that started May 28. The rains led to mudslides in some areas. Hampshire county

was the hardest hit, with about 40 percent of the damage.

Justice says in a statement the storms "created conditions that are beyond local and state capability to effectively respond."

DHHR Announces Implementation of New Opioid Prescribing Requirements

The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) today announced the implementation of Senate Bill 273, also known as the Opioid Reduction Act, which took effect June 7. Introduced at the request of Gov. Jim Justice, the legislation sets limitations on opioid prescriptions and authorizes a "nonopioid directive" patients can put in their medical files, formally notifying health care professionals they do not want to be prescribed or administered opioid medications.

"Thanks to Gov. Justice's vision and the ongoing efforts of the West Virginia Legislature, more individuals can avoid opioid addiction and potential overdose as a result of improper prescribing," said DHHR Cabinet Secretary Bill J. Crouch. "This legislation also assures that providers share critical information regarding the risks of opioids and alternative treatment options."

Prior to prescribing opioids, providers must first refer or prescribe treatment alternatives such

as physical therapy. If an opioid is prescribed, it must not exceed a seven-day supply at the lowest effective dose and the provider must explain the associated risks. In addition, the provider must document the patient's medical history, conduct and document a physical examination, develop a treatment plan and access relevant prescription monitoring information under the Controlled Substance Monitoring Program Database.

Subsequent prescriptions may only be issued at least six days following the initial prescription and the provider must document that it is necessary and appropriate for the patient's treatment. A third prescription for ongoing treatment requires consideration of referral to a pain clinic or specialist.

For supplies greater than seven days, a patient must sign a narcotics contract with the prescribing provider agreeing to only get medication from that doctor, use the same pharmacy each time and notify the provider of any emergency where the patient is pre-

scribed a controlled substance. Adults receiving an initial opioid prescription in an emergency room or urgent care facility are limited to a four-day supply of opioid pain medicine. Minors are limited to a three-day supply.

In addition, the bill enables individuals to decline in advance any treatment option that includes opioids. The Voluntary Nonopioid Advanced Directive form, available at dhhr.wv.gov/Office-of-Drug-Control-Policy, will be filed in the patient's medical records, which should be referenced by the provider prior to opioid prescription.

"This directive is critical to patients with and without a history of substance use disorder who wish to decline that opioids be offered or administered to them," said Dr. Rahul Gupta, State Health Officer and Commissioner of DHHR's Bureau for Public Health. "With this information, providers can make more appropriate recommendations concerning pain management."

Sherman Property Needs New Name, Gets Demolition Funding

The West Virginia Department of Education, Career and Technical Education Division, has committed \$50,000 to demolish the remaining buildings on a 2.5-acre parcel of land adjacent to the Moorefield High School. The parcel, formerly known as the Sherman Property and Main Street Project, will be the location of a school/community farmers market.

One of the buildings was demolished last month, primarily with private funding.

School Superintendent Sheena VanMeter announced the funding at the July 2 Hardy County Board of Education meeting.

"Mr. Simmons met with Dr. D'Antoni and spent a lot of time on this," VanMeter said.

Former board member and former East Hardy High School principal Brad Simmons has been working as a CTE and Special Projects Coordinator with the school system.

Dr. Cathy D'Antoni is the West Virginia Assistant Superintendent for Career and Technical Education.

"The asbestos abatement will begin on July 23," VanMeter said. "The demolition will begin soon after."

Simmons said he has been talking with D'Antoni since September/October. "She understood it was easier to get money to build things than it was to tear things down," he said.

"Our thoughts were on the same page about how to create a simulated workplace centered around the existing programs at Moorefield High School, East Hardy High School and the South Branch Ca-

reer and Technical Center.

"Dr. D'Antoni really deserves a big 'thank you' for seeing this project for what it can be."

The plan is to augment the MHS Agriculture Studies program with a green house and high tunnel and offer the produce grown for sale on the premises. The MHS Hospitality and Tourism classes simulated workplace could provide baked goods and pastries. The East Hardy High School Pro-Start and Agricultural Education classes could participate as well.

"We want to involve as many kids as possible," Simmons said. "It will be a big entrepreneurial endeavor." "The project needs a new name," said VanMeter. "We are being confused with the Main Street Initiative through the West Virginia Commerce Department."

VanMeter suggested it be called the Moorefield Farmers Market, but asked board members to bring other suggestions to the next meeting.

School Board Meetings

The board voted to send the School Board Meetings Policy BDA out for first reading. The only change to the existing policy is to change the time of the board meetings from 6 p.m. to 5 p.m.

"I think we should have one meeting a quarter that starts at 7 p.m.," said board member Jerry Yates. "For people who work, getting here at 5 or 6 p.m. is difficult."

VanMeter said she would like to hear from the public. "I would ask the public to let us know what they think," she said.

The board welcomed new members Jerry Yates and Melvin Shook.

President Nancy Hahn and Vice President Doug Hines will remain in those positions for the fiscal year 2019.

According to AAA last week, gas prices in West Virginia averaged \$2.835. At \$2.860, the national gas price average increased two cents. On the week, motorists in West Virginia (+3 cents) and Washington, D.C. (+2 cents) were the only areas in the Mid-Atlantic and Northeast region to see gas prices increase. Across West Virginia, prices ranged from a low of \$2.778 at Parkersburg to a high of \$2.858 at Huntington. Area averages were \$2.906 in Hampshire, \$2.887 in Jefferson and \$2.830 in Mineral counties. In Hardy County the price of gas varied with Moorefield, Wardensville and Mathias staying at \$2.89 while Baker stayed at \$2.99.

Walking and Bike Trail

Representatives of the Hardy County Parks and Recreation Commission requested support from the commission to secure a Right of Entry petition against a private property owner.

The property in question is part of a proposed Walking/Bicycle Trail which would connect the Moorefield flood control levee with Brighton Park.

"The total length is 7,270 feet, about 1 1/2 miles," said Bob Taylor. "We have permission to go on top of the levee."

Taylor presented an aerial view of the proposed trail, which would begin just south of the South Fork Potomac River bridge near U.S. Route 220.

"Of the 7,270 feet, the town of Moorefield owns 2,300 feet, the West Virginia Land Trust owns 1,800 feet and this private landowner has 3,170 feet," Taylor said. "We have tried numerous times to talk with the landowner, but no meeting has every materialized. We can't even get a response to talk."

"We can get grant funding for the project, but we can't even apply until we can secure the property."

According to Hardy County land records Louis C. and Margaret A. Miltenburger own 237.5 acres adjacent to Brighton Park.

A Right of Entry would allow representatives of the Parks and Recreation Commission to survey the property for the trail without fear of prosecution for trespassing.

"Since this is for the benefit of all the citizens of Hardy County and there is funding available, I think we should support this," Keplinger said.

"We should either do this or stop talking and working on this project," Taylor said.

The commissioners approved a motion to support the park in their endeavors to create a walking/biking path to Brighton Park.

Taylor also presented a rendering of a large pavilion planned for Brighton Park. "We've been working on this for four or five years," he said.

The pavilion is 40 ft. x 80 ft. and will be located across from the gazebo.

"The total cost is \$130,000 and we have \$103,000 from the Hotel/Motel tax," Taylor said. "We hope to look for grant funding for the difference."

OEM/911

Paul Lewis, director of the Hardy County Office of Emergency Management and 911 Center presented his report for June.

"The state came to assess flood damage to public property," he said. "I'm getting calls from people with personal damage, but I don't think the total is enough to warrant a claim and none of it was in a flood plain."

"People think when there is a disaster declaration, the money will be coming and that's not the case. It just means the state can use certain resources, like the National Guard. There needs to be a federal declaration."

"Once FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Authority) makes a declaration, farmers can go to the USDA for disaster help," said County Coordinator Rose Helmick.

Fran Welton asked if there were any local resources for personal damage. "The county should be tabulating that amount, so they know what it is," she said.

Lewis said there was another landslide on South Fork Road at a different location than the one reported last week. He said Division on Highways is assessing the situation.

The 911 Center was not impacted by the recent rains, although the power was off for a few minutes because of a lightning strike, he said, "But the system was only down for a couple of minutes."

Calls for service increased during the month of June. There were 694 calls in May and 752 in June.

"The Division of Highways responded to 25 calls this month for road hazards," Lewis said. "They still don't have an exact date for opening South Fork Road."

Lewis said he is still researching ownership of tower sites in the Mathias area. He said one site on Jenkins Hollow Road is particularly attractive.

"I'm not sure if there are tower funds available from the state anymore," he said. "The only other option would be from a cell phone company."

Lewis noted that Yvonne See passed away recently.

"She was the first paramedic to work for the county," he said. "She helped us out a lot. I would like to see the county recognize her in some way."

HCEAA

HCEAA Director Derek Alt presented financial information for the month of June and FY2018. According to the reports, the HCEAA had a budget surplus of \$167,209 at the end of the fiscal year.

Alt reported the student program is up and running with one student from East Hardy High School participating.

All units are in working order.

There are still minor issues with the building's plumbing.

Alt requested \$70,000 be transferred from the ambulance fee account to pay bills for the month of July. "It is high because our annual insurance payment is due," he said.

"The HCEAA had 402 patient contacts with 307 patients being transported," he said. "Note that mutual aid calls and transports are not tracked."

The commissioners voted to approve the \$70,000 transfer of funds.

LEPC

Fran Welton, chair of the Local Emergency Planning Committee requested the commission consider funding for training in three specific areas. They are Safe Response/HazMat, Search and Rescue Certification and Swift Water Rescue.

Lewis said some of those classes are being offered out of Martinsburg, but would not be offered unless there are a minimum number of people registered. He also said the training and equipment is very expensive.

Welton reported the LEPC had a successful Grain Bin Rescue Training with four fire departments participating.

Other Business

- The payroll register for June 1 - 15 was \$71,306.51.

- The payroll register for June 16 - 30 was \$70,850.19.

- The regional jail bill for May was \$40,723.

- The county's contribution to the Farmland Preservation Board for June was \$11,530.20.

- The commission approved an order to establish wastewater boundaries between the Hardy County Public Service District and the Moorefield/Hardy County Wastewater Authority.

- The commission approved the reappointment of Charlotte Bowman, Lee Lehman and Tim Wilkins to the Planning Commission.

- The commission approved the reappointment of Raymond Hines to the Board of Zoning Appeals.

- The commission approved the reappointment of Derek Barr, Harold Michael and Mallie Combs to the Corridor H Authority.

- The commission approved the reappointment of Greg Greenwalt to the Potomac Valley Transit Authority Board of Directors.

- The commission approved a request for support for the Corridor H Authority in the amount of \$5,000.

- The commission approved a resolution naming the Hardy County Rural Development Authority the agency of record for Local Economic Development grants.

- The commission approved a Memorandum of Understanding with Family Court to rent 1,557 square feet of space at \$6 per square foot.

- The commission approved joining a class action suit regarding payment in lieu of taxes, pending approval by the Hardy County Prosecuting Attorney.

- The commission approved renewal of the Global Science contract for courthouse network maintenance. The amount is \$912.50 per month.

- The commission approved a resolution that requires elected officials to get commission approval before hiring. It is not a hiring freeze, but a reinforcement of code requirements.

- The commission approved the

lease of two copiers for the Prosecuting Attorney's office. They will replace two old copiers currently owned by the county. The new copiers will cost \$5,800 per year total and will include maintenance and supplies.

- The commission approved a grant to the Mathias Ruritans for roof and heating system repair in the amount of \$2,000.

At first it looks like an accident, but when the body of eighteen-year-old Daniel Gingerich is found inside—burned alive—Kate suspects murder. But who would want a well-liked, hard-working Amish man dead? Kate delves into the investigation and discovers Daniel had a dark side. As Kate wades through a sea of suspects, she's confronted by her own violent past and an unthinkable possibility.

The Cottages on Silver Beach (Haven Point; 8) by RaeAnne Thayne – Years after he turned his back on her family, Megan Hamilton is stunned to find Elliot Bailey on the doorstep of the family inn, who in turn discovers that seeing Megan again has dredged up feelings he long thought dead.

Stay Hidden (Mike Bowditch;

pensation, Department Expenses, Annual Actuals, Annual Budget, Monthly Actuals, Vendor Payments and What's Included and Excluded.

"You can type in a vendor name and see what was spent," he said.

McCuskey said the auditor's office paid for every county in the state to use the pro-

gram.

"We're asking for a reimbursement from the counties at \$3,000 for the first year and \$1,800 for subsequent years. Our goal is to have this in every county, all 55."

McCuskey said there could be dispensation for those counties that are in dire financial straits and of course, it would be up to the counties to maintain.

"The website is able to incorporate

data from QuickBooks or Excel," he said. "There will be some additional work, but we're not asking anyone to do anything they can't do."

"The county site can be updated on their schedule, once a month or twice a month. It's up to you."

Installation at the county level is done electronically, said Gary Cogle, legislative administrator to the Auditor. "There's a

simple evaluation form and then a webinar that shows how to implement it," he said.

Hardy County Finance Department Manager Tammy Carr said she and County Clerk Gregg Ely are in favor of the system.

"We're on board with it as long as it doesn't involve more work," she said. "I create reports twice a month already, and if this can incorporate the data from them,

it will be fine.

The Hardy County Commission must approve the expenditure, which could happen at the August meeting.

"It's the taxpayers money," Carr said. "They have every right to see how it's spent. If more people are looking at it, we'll be more accountable."

Richard "Dick" Raymond, M.D. is the 2018 Producer Educational Program Speaker

Dr. Raymond was a rural Family Physician in O'Neill, Nebr., for 17 years and then established and directed Clarkson Hospital's Family Practice Residency Program in Omaha for 10 years. During this time he also served as the President of the Nebraska Medical Association. In January, 1999, Dr. Raymond was appointed by Governor Mike Johanns to be Nebraska's Chief Medical Officer. Dr. Raymond directed a large number of public health programs including investigations of food borne illness outbreaks and building public health preparedness. He also served as President of the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials.

During his six years in Nebraska government Raymond also filled in for Governor appointed Director vacancies as the Director of Finance and Support, which also included Medicaid political oversight, Director of Licensure and Regulation, and Director of Health and Human Services.

In July, 2005, Dr. Richard

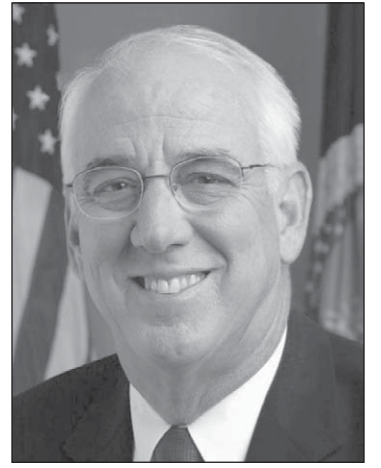
Raymond moved to Washington, D.C., when President George W. Bush appointed him Undersecretary for Food Safety at the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In this position, Dr. Raymond was responsible for overseeing the policies and programs of the Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) which regulated the meat and poultry food industry and once again was a direct report to Mike Johanns, at that time the Secretary of the USDA.

Dr. Raymond now consults and writes on food safety and public health issues from his home in Timnath, Colo., and speaks on the same subjects both domestically and internationally.

Dr. Raymond has been a member of the Board of Trustees of the Co-WY Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, the Business Advisory Board of Identigen, the Food Safety Solutions Advisory Board for Elanco/ Eli Lilly, the Christie Club Property Owners Board of Directors and Tyson Food's Animal Well Being Advisory Board.

He writes two food safety blogs



a month for both meetingplace.com and Feedstuffs Foodlink.

Dr. Raymond has had ongoing working relationships with Eli Lilly/Elanco, consulting on food safety and public health issues, and with Merck Animal Health regarding messaging as it relates to antibiotic use in animals raised for food.

In the past he has also spoken on antibiotics for Zoetis, JBS Swift, the National Pork Board, the National Pork Producers Council, the International Poultry Council, the South African Pork Council, and multiple state pork and poultry associations.

To make Chicken Satay: In dish, soak bamboo skewers. In large bowl, combine soy sauce, peanut oil, toasted sesame oil, seasoned rice vinegar, ginger, coriander, turmeric and thinly sliced chicken breast. Cover bowl and marinate 2 hours.


To make Peanut Sauce: In food processor, process scallions, cilantro, jalapeno, garlic, ginger, peanut butter, toasted sesame oil, roasted garlic rice vinegar, lime juice, coconut milk, hoisin sauce and honey until smooth. Garnish with chopped peanuts.

After 2 hours of marinating, skewer chicken. Heat grill or grill pan to medium heat and cook 2 minutes on each side. Garnish with cilantro and serve with Peanut Sauce and Cucumber Salad.

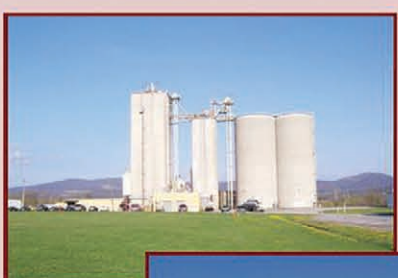
