The United States Senate Youth Program takes two delegates from each state, Washington, D.C., and US military bases stationed around the world. Typically, delegates are

flown out to Washington to participate in the program, but this year it is online. This year's speakers include Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas and Dr. Fauci, among others. Each delegate gets a \$10,000 scholarship with the purpose of the program being to invest in the next generation of public servants.

Marissa runs Junior State of America and Activism club at Mooresville High School. She hopes that what she learns through this conference can help her grow as a leader in those clubs and as an influence at Mooresville.

"I want to convince students that they have good

ideas that public servants deserve to hear; I want them to know that they have the power to make life better for those around them." Marissa said.

Marissa said that the chance to be in this program means a lot to her, "Being a delegate for this program means a lot because I plan to go into public service as a career, and I hope that hearing so many great speakers can help me grow as a leader.
