V.W.B.C. DIV 4 (Wed. 5/6)

Melbourne University Beaurepaire Composers 61 d. Preston Rams Quartet 22 On the fifth of June, the Beaurepaire composers gave their first musical performance at Albert Park in a display of remarkable musicianship and competance. Two pieces were performed by this band of talented performers, the first of which was a concerto for the bassoon and clarinet in A flat andante (that's how I like my spaghetti - Ed.). This piece was performed beautifully by Mandy on the bassoon, maintaining a steady beat and rhythm to the receital which conjured up images of size and strength whilst listening. It was a delight to be present when she attacked a few difficult movements late in the piece. Tracy on the clarinet was, as usual, very smooth and clear in herperformance, with a note of certainty about her playing, showing brilliant control in phrasing and breathing. This was a typical Renaissance piece, superbly performed by two dedicated artists. At intermission the score was 30-5 in favour of the composers. The second piece of the evening was clearly from the Baroque era (I didn't ber-ake it - Ed.) Impromptu in C sharp allegro non troppo (translated as "almost Steve Nolan" - Ed.). In contrast to the earlier work, this rendition was much more vivacious and lively. It began with Woody on the flute playing a series of scales and trills (specially for the trillseekers in the audience? - Ed), with her fingers moving up and down the flute with great rapidity. She was soon joined by Lissa on the oboe with a very expressive and natural display, reaching notes of a very high pitch. The performance of Pauline in this piece on the harpsichord was one of brilliance and precision, showing her ability to produce very subtle tones. Supporting both pieces were Rose and Kylie on strings providing the backbone to the evening's entertainment with their dynamic range and variety in harmonics. At the end of the performance, after encores and standing ovations the musical score read MUBC 61 to Preston Rams Quartet 22. The two pieces were composed by the players themselves in conjunction with their conductor Brian Connors and are willing to autograph copies of this edition of Dribbling Balls.
