The following procedures are recommended by the ABF and the Australian

Sports Medicine Association.

Bleeding should be controlled and all blood cleaned away. If after the initial cleaning further bleeding continues, the player should ie may be requested by the referees to leave the court. The player can return once the wound has been treated/covered/ceased bleeding.

If there is significant blood on the uniform, the player should change.

Players should not spit onto the floor or onto towels.

Players should have their own towels and water bottles.
