14AA, 13AA, 12AA, 11AA, 10AA Tournament Rules

(revised on 10/21/19 Annual Meeting)

14AA/13AA: no time limit

12AA/11AA/10AA: no new inning after one hour and 40 minutes

There will be no time limit in the Championship game.

Run rules remain in effect in the Championship game.

The bracket is double elimination with a single "winner takes all" championship.

Four (4) berths will be awarded in each age to the MSF State Tournament.

NFHS and League rules will apply to tournament play with the following modifications:

Games: 14AA/13AA games will be (7) seven-innings. 12AA/11AA/10AA games will be (6) six-innings.

Home Team: The home team will be the high seed.

Official Scorebook: The home team will be the official scorekeeper for each game. The umpire shall keep a scorecard to be turned into the tournament director at the conclusion of the game.

Pitchers: A pitch count card will be kept between the two coaches recording each pitcher's count after each half inning. At the end of the game both coaches will sign this card agreeing that the counts are correct. This card will then be given to the umpire who will turn it in at tournament headquarters with the score card. The pitch count cards will remain accessible during the entire tournament in case a question arises for a particular pitcher's count later in the tournament. The per day and per tournament pitch counts are:

10AA 75 pitches per day, 140 per tournament

11AA 85 pitches per day, 150 per tournament

12AA 85 pitches per day, 150 per tournament

13AA 95 pitches per day, 160 per tournament

14AA 95 pitches per day, 160 per tournament

*New pitchers may take up to (7) seven warm up pitches in the half inning.

Returning pitchers may take up to (5) warm up pitches in the half inning.

Runs Per Inning: There is no run limit per inning.

Run Rule (mercy rule): Eight (8) runs after five (5) innings.

REMINDER: Base Running Restrictions:

10AA Runners may not leave the base until the ball crosses home plate.

11AA Runners may not leave the base until the ball leaves the pitcher's hand.
