

"A New - arvest?"

I must say, the past couple of weeks have been almost as educational and taxing for me, personally, as the two weeks of church camp that I experienced earlier this summer (See <u>The Lynn Christian</u>, July 3, 2012). It began when I first inquired about the possibility of helping as a substitute at Randolph Southern Elementary. Realizing that creating stronger connections with the local school corporation might lead to some additional opportunities of service and outreach for the church family, I concluded that working, a day or two (but, no more than 3 days!... I had been informed that opportunities to substitute could quickly multiply.) each week as a substitute, could potentially help reinforce the encouraging thought for many individuals and families in the Lynn and Randolph Southern community, that this church family understands and believes that there is no other ministry more important than reaching young people and their families with the Good News of God's Word!

Of course, for almost 25 years, First Care has also provided an essential childcare ministry to many families in this region. Throughout its ministry, First Care has been a strong witness in this community... proclaiming that important message of Christian care for families and children. As a result, there has now been a generation of First Care graduates who have been impacted by caring individuals, this church family, and the Good News of God's Word!

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However, many families who send their children to our area schools often have additional needs in which this church family may help, and thereby, possibly connect with people who need and want to hear of God's love and care. We just need to stay focused in God's Word, sharing our lives together with Him. At the same time, we also need to be conscious of where God is working in people's lives and try to understand how we can help. When that happens, our joy will be complete, because we will know that our lives could be used by God to make an eternal difference for someone else!

As I began to complete the application paperwork, I learned that the process for gaining approval could take four weeks or longer. Suffice it to say that, in my situation, due to advancements in technology and trying to live according to God's standards of morality as revealed in His Word, I completed that process in a small fraction of the time it could have taken. In fact, on the morning of the second day of school at Randolph Southern, I received a telephone call, asking if I could make myself available to substitute immediately following lunch. I quickly agreed and reported to school a short time later.

That afternoon, the school asked if I could also substitute the final two days of that week and all of the following week. Realizing my limits, I did finish that week, but only agreed to the first three days of the following week. However, something else occurred during those few days.

The school suddenly needed another driver for one of the daily small bus routes. Since I was "handy" at that moment, the school asked if I would be willing to be trained to drive that bus route. After learning what that position required and how it would work with my assignments with the church, I agreed. After a brief training process, I am now spending about 15 hours each week, trying to keep U.S. 27 warm as I help transport some of the students to Winchester and back.

Only God knows for certain how long I will be asked to help with this; and only He knows the future results of anything that we do. However, we trust that He knows best and the glory belongs to Him. Of course, with the path of my journey these past couple of weeks, I am praying that a "harvest" will be gathered from this work... and that I might not have to be trained for anything new for a couple more weeks!



Servant Spotlight by Rebecca Glunt

"For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have everlasting life (John 3:16)." This is the favorite verse of Scripture of Omer Johnting. Omer was born 86 years ago in Franklin County, Indiana east of Laurel, Indiana. He moved up here as a child in 1940. He and his late wife Ruth Johnting were married 62 years, until her passing on June 16, 2009. They had five children: Kathy, Linda, Theresa,

Becky, and Bill. Omer has eight grandchildren and ten great grandchildren. The couple began going to First Church in 1964.

Omer served in WWII in the ninth armored division, the second tank battalion company B in three campaigns. He had training at Fort Raleigh, Kansas. He began as a bow gunner in a Sherman tank. At this time, he would look through the telescope of the tank and shoot the gunner as necessary. He served for two years. During this time, he participated in the Battle of the Bulge and became a driver after two deaths of other servicemen. As a tank driver he drove over 2,700 miles during the war.

Following his service to our country, Omer worked at Crosley Abco, where Crosley refrigerators were made. He worked there for ten years. Later, he labored at another factory in the Richmond/Centerville, Indiana area, which made rotary drills for drilling. Omer also labored as a dairy farmer during most of his life, at the same time as his work in the factory.

In the church, Omer has served as a deacon and had taught the eighth grade Sunday School class in the past. Some interesting facts that one may not know about Omer is that he and his family took a 30 day trip to drive to and vacation in Alaska in 1960. At this time, part of their journey was on a gravel road. Omer has also been in eleven foreign countries; some of which are Canada, Mexico, Belgium, Luxemburg, France, Germany, and Czechoslovakia. In addition to these travels, when he was eight years old he lived in southern New Mexico in 1934 for about six months during the Depression, while his father worked on an irrigation project in the Rio Grande Valley. Later in life, he also moved to Tucson, Arizona in 1971 for six months; then moved back to this area.

When this writer first asked Omer what his favorite Bible verse was, he responded that he liked the whole Bible. This attitude seems to be in line with what is found in II Timothy 3:16-17, which states, "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work."
