On Easter Sunday Christians around the world gather to proclaim the Easter Message: Jesus Christ is Risen! Alleluia! Through the resurrection of Christ from the dead, God has announced that not even death is stronger than the love of God in Jesus Christ.



As people of faith we are called to trust in this incredibly Good News. There is nothing, absolutely nothing stronger than God and the power of God's love as revealed in

Christ. Yet as Easter People we live in a Good Friday world. We live in a world where sin and death exist. Sometimes they appear to have the upper hand.

It's tempting to bury our heads and pretend that these problems do not exist. We could turn off the TV, fold the paper, and go about our daily lives. We could simply ignore the problems of the world.

It is also tempting to throw up our hands in despair. We could complain, "The problems of this world are too numerous. There is nothing I can do about it."

But we can do something. On Saturday, May 18 and Sunday May 19, we will join with other Christians in "<u>Change the World Day</u>." We will be engaged in several ministries to serve our community in love. On Saturday we will be serving at the Soup Kitchen and on Sunday we will be serving at the Community Garden.

Why would we do this? Because we are Easter People!

As Easter People we're asked to trust that ultimately love wins. As Easter People we are called to face the reality of the world with our eyes wide open and to recognize the wonderful in the world along with the needs of the world/ community. As Easter People we are called to follow the example of Christ and offer ourselves in love to the world. We are called to offer our skills, our resources, our hearts, in love and hope that sin and death are not the strongest forces at work in this world. As Easter People we are called to live faithfully in a Good Friday world in trust that through the Grace of God, ultimately love wins.

Words from our mother-to-be...

I'm sure some of you may be wondering what's going to happen around the church while I'm on maternity leave. The District Superintendent and SPRC have agreed on the following plan supported by the Finance Team and Ad. Board.

We wanted to keep everyone else in the loop so here are the details. If you have any concerns please don't hesitate to talk to a member of the SPRC or me. Due Date: May 17--or whenever Baby Goff decides to come!

Pastor Richelle

Details:

The Book of Discipline dictates at least 8 weeks paid leave, and allows up to 12 weeks. SPRC and Pastor Richelle have agreed on 10 weeks.

Pastor Richelle will be applying for Short Term Disability so that the church will be reimbursed up to \$170 per week (by the insurance company, Zurich) for 6-8 weeks (or longer) as determined by her doctor.

We will be paying \$100 a week to the person providing Pastoral Care

We will be paying \$100 a week to the person leading worship/preaching.

Rev. Betty Burlew will be the primary individual responsible for all pastoral care. Her primary responsibilities will be providing pastoral care for families where there is an illness or death. She'll be available for funerals, weddings and visitation with others who may request a visit. This position is very part time and Rev. Burlew will be accessible to church leaders and staff via phone 315-682-6190 (home office) or 315-729-2584 (cell) or e-mail contact: revbettyb@juno.com. Office hours will be posted.

In the case that Rev. Burlew is unable to provide care for certain days/weeks. Rev. Mary Guy has agreed to provide the needed care. She will be on call when Rev. Burlew is unavailable and will coordinate with her. There will be a Statement of Understanding created and signed by the SPRC, District Superintendent, and Rev. Burlew.

It's important to note that during Pastor Richelle's leave she will not have pastoral responsibilities. In cases of death and illnesses the pastor providing care will be responsible for caring for that family.

There will be different preachers each week; a mix of laity from our own church and retired pastors/lay people from the area for each Sunday service. They will be responsible for leading the entire service. May and June 10am regular service and in July the 9am Garden Service. Pastor Richelle will work on a schedule to ensure each Sunday is covered and that the schedule will be left in the hands of the SPRC.

This is an exciting time in the life of Pastor Richelle and Mike, and it is important that the church respects the leave time as they welcome a new addition to their family. It's also important to know that all the details are being ironed out to ensure that the church is fully cared for during this time by gifted and dependable clergy persons. AUMC is blessed to have two retired elders who can share the sacraments and care for individuals during this time. If you have any questions, please contact the church office at (315)253-6295,

I'm super excited to tell you all about the Vacation Bible School plans we're making for this summer! We've purchased a Starter Kit for "God's Backyard: Bible Camp Under the Sun". It's jam packed with almost everything we need to plan and run a wonderful and successful VBS.

The focus of the week is on service; serving others, serving God, and serving our community. Each day has a different focus, a different Bible verse and story, and a different theme all centered around the idea of service. There's even a mission project for the week ...so we can put our words into action. We have materials for everyone from pre-schoolers to teens; there's even an adult companion study, "Beyond Our Backyard". It would be wonderful to have a bunch of the kids we have served through the school lunch program come and see what our church is all about and get to know Jesus for themselves. But, that's a very big job for one little Coordinator of Congregational Life ...so I'm counting on all of you to help.

Stewardship & Generosity Corner

Our United Methodist Church calls all members and committees to be aware of how they are conscientious stewards of our many blessings. AUMC's Stewardship and Generosity Committee-John Burlew, Carolyn Case, Joe Wolczyk, Ruth Schussler, chair, first met in February. Our Statement of Purpose is to make people aware that generosity and stewardship involves thoughtful living and giving--not only of money, but time, talents, spirit, our bodies, and our world. Your Church calls all members and committees to be aware of how we are all conscientious stewards of our many blessings. We'll be writing this monthly newsletter column to encourage everyone to be better caregivers of our blessings.

April's stewardship theme aligns with Earth Day and careful use of God's natural resources and the environment. Ray and I have always been recyclers-so much so that our adult children tease us and call us "green". Having lived too close to the dump in Waterloo, we both feel that reducing, reusing, and recycling is in the best interest of everyone. We even recycle when on vacation! When we can't find a recycling center, we bring it home.

This year my class of 5th graders is collecting plastic bottle tops, which aren't accepted for recycling in Seneca County. So far we have sent 17 boxes (reused boxes) to a company that will reuse/recycle them. This is only from 15 classrooms in five months!

Having family in Virginia and Colorado, we have been surprised at how differently states treat recycling. Our daughter had to find places in Richmond to recycle, as it totally depended on where she lived, while our son and daughter-in-law have curbside pickup in Chesapeake. While visiting the western part of Colorado, finding recycling centers was difficult. Compare that to Ithaca, NY, that has recycling in malls, on the Commons, and other locations throughout the city.

Our committee has a challenge for everyone this month. Increase your stewardship of God's Earth by careful use of resources. Reduce, reuse, or recycle more than you did before. Turn off the water when you brush your teeth, take

reusable bags to stores, and recycle papers.

Along with our goal to recycle more than we throw away, Ray and I are going to remember to take the reusable bags to stores (other than the grocery stores). We also plan on using less water, and to recycle dishwater on the outdoor plants.


