PASTOR NEWS

Each issue of our newsletter will include information from the pastors and churches in our association. This issue focuses on Kevin O'Connor, pastor of Agape' Fellowship Church in Coffeyville. His church recently joined our association. Please keep the church, Kevin, and his family in your prayers.

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And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. And awe came upon every soul, and many wonders and signs were being done through the apostles. And all who believed were together and had all things in common. And they were selling their possessions and belongings and distributing the proceeds to all, as any had need. And day by day, attending the temple and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having favor with all people. And the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved." Acts 2:42-47

As I sit to write this Pastor's note our church started a 30-day prayer meeting, in which we are praying every night at 6 p.m. at the church until December 19th. I had several conversations with people at the church and in the community shortly after announcing this Season of Prayer, as we are calling it. Many comments centered around expecting too much from people. Basically, the sentiment was people are too busy, and people have lives, pastor you can't really expect people to show up every day for a month. Though to be clear only one board member and I were the ones saying we are committing ourselves to prayer every night for a month. We did invite others to join us and called for this to be a church wide time of prayer.

And as I continued over the next two days to have these conversations with people, I was realizing a disturbing trend. Nearly everyone had an excuse why they could not come and a reasoning why they could not be there. This text came to mind almost immediately, and I thought, this is in stark contrast to modern Christianity. These people it says devoted themselves to the apostles teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Even forgetting the portion of selling all their possession and having all things in common. They attended temple daily and broke bread daily, by far this is much more devoted and committed than most Evangelical Churches today. Why is that? Was it just a different time and people didn't have as much responsibilities as we do today? Do we truly have more responsibilities and less time?

This answer did not sit well with me. The problem with this argument is that people make time for everything else they want to do in life, the things that they deem important. When our children are in sports or band or cheerleading, we will make sure they are at every practice and we go to every game or concert or recital. And we will make sure they have all they need to do these things. We make time for hunting trips, family plans and events. We will turn our lives upside down for the things that we find important. Why, because we see intrinsic value and meaning in them. Do we place that same intrinsic value and meaning on the things of God, on our relationship with Christ or on our relationship with fellow believers? Are we truly devoted to the teachings of Christ and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to the prayers? Or are all of these things secondary to whatever I want or whatever I deem more important, or more valuable?

You see there is a far deeper problem here than just being busier, we are bordering on idolatry. When instead of Christ's love being so amazing and divine, demanding my soul, my life, my all, we simply try to fit Jesus in where we have time for him. We are a people who are double minded, attempting to serve two masters. We are like the children of Israel in the book of 2 Kings who try to follow God but refuse to tear down the idols and high places of false worship. Oh, that we would again Survey the Wonderous Cross as Isaac Watts said and once again remember our first love! That we would remember that our richest gains should be counted as loss and pour contempt on all of our PRIDE. Oh, that we would indeed remember and be swayed to true commitment, true faithfulness and true devotion.
