When I was growing up, September meant several things. On the farm, we were harvesting corn silage; it marked the start of school and, for our family, "September birthdays." Several in my family, including my grandma, an uncle, my dad and then Joy, after we were married, created such a group that we got the family together in September, had a cookout and celebrated September birthdays.

When my little family moved to Lubbock in '91, we were no longer able to participate in those gatherings. The tradition continued for a few years, but I have not heard much about September birthdays in recent years. It is nostalgic to me that our family will be going back to Indiana this weekend for our first September birthday celebration in 22 years!

This one will be different, however. It is celebrating a very special 90th birthday of my father. To give you an idea of what we will be doing, and who my dad is, here's a glimpse of our plans: Sunday we will be attending Sandcreek Baptist Church, where Dad has taught an adult Sunday school class for many years. After lunch, we will be heading to a retirement home where my mom and dad have lead a Sunday worship service for nearly three years, with organ music, hymns, preaching and occasionally communion. A reception

for the residents of the center will follow to celebrate his birthday. About 20 attend the service every Sunday, and the administrator jokingly says they need to "build a bigger church."

On Monday, Labor Day, there will be an afternoon reception. No doubt, there will



be many from the farming and co-op community who will help Dad cele-

brate, as well as others from the civic arena who would recall his service as an elected official on the County Council. Having lived all of his life in Decatur County, except for his years of service in the army during World War II, Dad is a respected man in that community.

In this day and age, some have abandoned referring to God as "Father" because their concept of father only brings to mind bad, if any, memories of their own earthly fathers; nothing could be farther from the truth for me. Dad's constant commitment to my mom and family has taught me about God's unfailing and enduring love. Dad's quiet, thoughtful demeanor has taught me about the patience and tenderness of our Heavenly Father. Dad's understanding of and love for animals, crops and nature has taught me of our Creator-God who brought order and wonder to creation. Dad's hard work ethic has taught me that God is pro-

ductive; I need to be, too. Dad's devotion to Sunday school lessons, God's people, and God's Word has taught me what it means to walk in humble service to our God. Dad has a positive attitude about life; he has an ability to laugh and cry and that has given me permission to do both. Dad has influenced me to be willing to surrender to a loving Heavenly Father.

If you are a dad, don't underestimate the influence you can have on your children of any age and any children in this world. If you have a dad who has not given you a great example to follow, then look more closely at our Heavenly Father and you'll see what every dad should aspire to be. More importantly, you'll see the original Father of fathers loves you and wants only the best for you – a life-transforming relationship with Him.

We are starting a ministry this fall for men to grow in their God-given opportunities to be a man. It will teach us men how to be warriors, kings, lovers and friends. I hope that the men in our congregation will take the opportunity to be a part of this ministry and bring along with you a son, father or any man who wants to grow. We'll meet at 6:15 Tuesday mornings and have you ready to go to work by 7-7:15.

Thank you to many of you who signed a card for my dad even though you never met him. Our family is blessed to get to go in person this weekend and express our love to Dad. But we are all daily blessed to express love to our Heavenly Father!

WHAM!!

The Aug. WHAM meeting began with a presentation by Spencer Stringer, a 14-year missionary on furlough in Lubbock with his family until January. The Stringers raise and homeschool their 4 children while serving in China. Spencer graciously came to share highlights of how and why God sent him to China.

Currently the Stringers live in Jinghong, a city of about 300,000, near the border of Burma & Laos. It is a lush, tropical area inhabited by the Dai people. While ministering to new believers (mostly women), Spencer has developed an aquaponics farm which grows crops of lettuce in water; fish provide the nutrients for the plants. Sadly, Spencer has just received word that the two-acre aquaponic farm has been destroyed by floods. He must now decide whether to rebuild the farm or produce small aquaponic systems for families to grow their own fresh vegetables. Over the past 14 years, the Stringers have faced many challenges....the Lord has always provided the answers.

During the business meeting, Sally Johnson suggested that those that will minister at Women's Protective Services meet to schedule the times and activities for the WPS mission this fall. She will contact those who have expressed an interest in the WPS project.

Another mission activity was presented to the group that involves the McKenzie family, newly arrived in India to minister to a deaf population that is ignored because of religious beliefs. This is a great opportunity to support Chris (who is deaf) and Stacey, and their three girls as they begin their lives of service. Their website includes a Wish List for the girls that WHAM plans to fulfill this Christmas.

WHAM also plans to, in some way, support Sam Lively's mission trip to Honduras and looks forward to receiving information about his next trip.




OT Genesis Study Leader: Dana Cook Wed., 6:00pm, Fireside Rm. Begins Sept. 11


