



#### The 18 Cent Donation

Sunday's service was business as usual for the First United Methodist Church in Charlotte, North Carolina. But it was one offering that warmed the hearts of everyone at the congregation, and it wasn't the amount of money that moved them.

In an offering envelope were a dime, a nickel, and three pennies. That was a total of 18 cents. There was also a note written by an anonymous donor. The note said: "Please don't be mad. I don't have much. I'm homeless. God bless."

Pastor Patrick Hamrick believes that the money and note came from a man who had eaten breakfast with the church Sunday morning and left the note behind afterwards. Every Sunday morning the church serves breakfast to their homeless neighbors and this man was a regular at those meals.

Pastor Hamrick said: "It warmed our hearts because proportionally that gift could be an average middle class person giving a thousand dollars." He added: "I feel like he gave everything he had that morning and it's a touching example of someone who has so little to give but feels in their heart the need to give something."
