BATTLE FOR THE **CROSS**

There was a good point/counterpoint exchange at the Elders Training event here in February. One person made the comment that the reason for lack of growth in most CP congregations is lack of spirituality. We've gotten so accustomed to the world's ways that we function as a manpowered organization and lack the dynamism of the power of God.

Then another person respectfully proposed that we are in our current condition because we aren't doing the stuff we are supposed to do. We don't talk to our neighbors, work associates, and friends about God; we don't interact with people

we don't know; we don't love others sacri-

ficially. As a result, our circle of relationships stays the same and we miss spontaneous opportunities for our good works to glorify God and draw new life into our fellowship.

Our Seek God for the City presented another key ingredient on Feb. 27: We seem to underestimate the work of Satan and his relentless pursuit to keep people away from the transforming grace of God. Our devotional suggested prayers that God would do three things: 1) pray that blinded spiritual eyes will see; 2) pray that those who

see will believe; and 3) pray that the believing will worship. Satan works to 1) keep the porate worship. = 1

blind blind; 2) cause those who see to re-

main skeptical; 3) cause believers to confine their belief to an intellectual position rather than letting their belief become heartfelt devotion in worship with reckless abandon.

The cross and the resurrection diplay the ultimate victory of Jesus over the power of Satan. Victory over Satan is already won, but his influences are still rampant. If Satan's schemes aren't exposed and neutralized through the power of God, all efforts are sabotaged. It really does come down to the fact that if God does not work among us, all of our efforts are puny, with little results.

Let's stand up to Satan's bluff by letting our roots grow deep through prayer! Let's fast and pray! Let's worship passionately! Let's boldly enlarge our circle of friends for the cause of Christ! Let's pray that God goes before us and opens blinded eyes, causes those who see to believe, and draws believers into incredible


Palm Sunday


Easter Sunday



TREASURER'S TALK

What Is Average?

Another way to measure giving besides a comparison with budget is by determining per capita giving. The total amount given for a fiscal year is divided by average weekly attendance. This determines the average amount given per attendee. Of course offerings are also received by mail and by the use of online giving. However, a majority of offerings are given by those actually in attendance.

Averages mean that some amounts are above the average while others are below. For the year 2012, per capita giving at Cumberland Presbyterian Church was \$2,426 per attendee. This is an average of \$202 on a monthly basis and an average of \$46 on a weekly basis.

Treasurer Talk articles this year will focus on the concept of generosity and its relationship to being a good steward of God's blessings. "From everyone who has been given much, much will be required; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked." (Luke 12:48 NIV). We are left on our own to determine how much "much" is.
