Steve's Sentiments


In the business world, a good vision statement is within or just beyond grasp but not yet attained. It gives a picture of what a company aspires to be. The vision statement's value lies in the fact that it draws confident, motivated people to see that vision realized and so, in effect, it "pulls" people in the same direction toward the vision. It is a tool to bring into reality that which is not. Proverbs 29:18 in the King James Version gives a compelling reason for the church to have a clear vision statement—"Where there is no vision, the people perish."

The leadership of this congregation spent several hours together over three different weekends earlier this year considering an appropriate mission statement and vision statement. Simply put, the mission statement describes what we intend to be doing notably well in, say, five years. Similarly, a **vision statement** describes who we intend to be in five years. Our mission statement should bring focus to our activities (what we do) and the vision statement should help refine our character.

Now, I don't typically use the King James (translated in 1611) or the New King James (revised in 1994) Versions of the Bible, although I have both on my shelves and refer to them from time to time. I was struck by the difference in this verse in these two versions of the Bible. The KJV is the most quoted version of this

verse, but

the NKJV sounds almost entirely different: "Where there is no revelation ("prophetic vision," in footnotes)



the people cast off restraint..."

The newer version reflects a greater wealth of understanding of the ancient usages of the Biblical languages. Other versions of the Bible that have been translated in the recent decades agree. The NIV, for example, reads, "Where there is no revelation, the people cast off restraint..."

What's my point? A vision statement like ours certainly has value in pulling us in the same direction, and *one* vision (as opposed to division) absolutely makes us stronger. But the real power in a vision

statement rests in its **origin**. Was it divinely revealed to us? Were the words received as clearly as a prophetic utterance?


Divine revelation from God is like a bit

in the mouth of a horse. It harnesses the power in a productive direction. It is the difference between a horse plowing a field and a horse running wild in open country. This is why we all prayed during the season before Easter (and continue to pray) for greater receptivity to the Holy Spirit. Jesus told us that the Holy Spirit will reveal all things to us (John 14:26).

I believe that inasmuch as we were able to hear, the Lord was speaking to us about our vision. And I am committed to building on it until the Holy Spirit reveals more that He wants us to know. I will encourage our elders to revisit our vision statement frequently and ask the Lord if there is more clarity He wants to give us. Until then, I encourage you to consider the revelation that He has given us: We are inspired, empowered and used by the Holy Spirit to change lives through prayer and service with the love of Jesus Christ. ~CPC Vision Statement, 1/16






TREASURER'S TALK

Using Your RMD

Required minimum distributions (RMDs) generally are minimum amounts that a retirement plan account owner must withdraw annually starting with the year that the account owner reaches 70 ½ years of age. The purpose of the RMD rules, which are established by the Internal Revenue Service, is to ensure that people don't just accumulate retirement accounts, defer taxation, and leave these retirement funds as an inheritance.

A charitable tax break for IRA owners is now permanent thanks to the tax package passed in December 2015. Individuals who are age 70 ½ and older can transfer up to \$100,000 annually from their IRAs directly to charity at **any time during the year.** These transfers count as part of the yearly required minimum distribution.

There are several tax breaks for these direct IRA payouts to charity. The distribution counts toward your RMD without increasing your adjusted gross income. That can be a big help if you don't itemize and can't deduct charitable contributions. In addition, keeping the money out of your adjusted gross income could help you avoid the Medicare high-income surcharge or make less of your Social Security benefits taxable. Of course, the donation to the charity in this case cannot also be deducted.
