Translators and Guides

While in China a couple of years ago to pick up our adopted granddaughter, I was able to worship two times at a Christian church. (If anyone thinks that the church is "underground," then the definition of "underground" needs to be changed. Several blocks away I could hear the message at an early service being preached over loudspeakers strategically stationed outside the church.)

We were accompanied to the church by our guide and translator Rue (pronounced Ray). She was a delightful young lady. What we saw when we entered the church was a 400 seat sanctuary filled to overflow with standing room only for both services. The female minister wore a Geneva gown and spoke from behind the pulpit. The choir was robed and accompanied by a very accomplished organist. There was a communion table and baptismal font in prominent places, as well as paraments, ushers, classical hymns out of a standard hymnbook, the Lord's Prayer, Apostle's Creed, Doxology, Biblical passages on the walls (John 3:16), pictures of Jesus, visitor's registration pad, bulletin with inserts, and an offering plate at the entrance. A large wooden cross mounted on the wall behind the preacher was central in the worship space. If it wasn't for the language difference, we would have thought that we were in Bull Shoals.

The guide/translator was essential for us to get the gist of the message. The first service focused on it being stewardship Sunday. At the second service the preacher spoke about the centrality of Christ in our families and the larger human family. The preacher said (as best as I could determine through the translator), "If you call yourself a Christian then you must walk the talk."

For me to get this message though, I needed Rue. I needed a translator or guide... not to enter and sit down and enjoy the hymns and be spiritually present, but to get the core message and hear the centrality of the Word read and proclaimed. I needed someone familiar with Chinese and English who was able to bridge the gaps in order to share the images of the powerful message and symbols used in the Chinese language that are strange to the Western mind.

I think that this same issue is present in the mainline church today. There are many in our culture for whom going to church is like entering a foreign space where the language and words demand interpretation. Sure they can enter, sit and be spiritually present, but things that are very familiar to us as "church-going folk," oft times need to be interpreted and translated.

There are those in our culture fluent in the "language of faith" and what happens each Sunday during the worship time. But in our culture, inside and outside the church, there are those who need a guide or translator if what occurs on Sunday is to have any relevancy. Whether it is a visitor with a long church history, a teen struggling with growing up issues, a person who has never set foot in a church, a person who has been abused in other church settings, the same thing applies. Each will probably need a guide or translator.

This is where the members of the church takes on the critically important role of making sure that they are attuned to folks that might be in need of some translation assistance. The task of all Christians is "passing on the faith." We do this through being a translator or guide. Wear your name tag as evidence that you would like to be a translator or guide so that everyone will Encounter God in meaningful ways.

The book of the month is HOME TO HOLLY SPRINGS by Jan Karon.



Why did Jesus fold the linen burial cloth after His resurrection? Submitted by Chet Walker

The Gospel of John (20:7) tells us that the napkin, which was placed over the face of Jesus, was not just thrown aside like the grave clothes.

The Bible takes an entire verse to tell us that the napkin was neatly folded, and was placed at the head of that stony coffin.

Early Sunday morning, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and found that the stone had been rolled away from the entrance. She ran and found Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved. She said, 'They have taken the Lord's body out of the tomb, and I don't know where they have put him!' Peter and the other disciple ran to the tomb to see. The other disciple outran Peter and got there first. He stooped and looked in and saw the linen cloth lying there, but he didn't go in. Then Simon Peter arrived and went inside. He also noticed the linen wrappings lying there, while the cloth that had covered Jesus' head was folded up and lying to the side.

Is that important? Absolutely! Is it really significant? Yes!

In order to understand the significance of the folded napkin, you have to understand a little bit about Hebrew tradition of that day. The folded napkin had to do with the Master and Servant, and every Jewish boy knew this tradition.

When the servant set the dinner table for the master, he made sure that it was exactly the way the master wanted it.

The table was furnished perfectly, and then the servant would wait, just out of sight, until the master had finished eating, and the servant would not dare touch that table, until the master was finished.

Now if the master were done eating, he would rise from the table, wipe his fingers, his mouth, and clean his beard, and would wad up that napkin and toss it onto the table.

The servant would then know to clear the table. For in those days, the wadded napkin meant, 'I'm done'. But if the master got up from the table, and folded his napkin, and laid it beside his plate, the servant would not dare touch the table, because.........

The folded napkin meant, 'I'm coming back!'

She remains in good health otherwise, very active and friendly.

DEACON'S CORNER

Subject: 2008 Deacons Annual Report To Session To: The Session, Presbyterian Church of Bull Shoals

This 2008 Deacons report is submitted in compliance with the Book of Order.

We, the Board of Deacons believe we have faithfully fulfilled the responsibilities of the Deacons as outlined in the Book of Order. Acting as Guardian Angels to our church members and friend during 2008 we made 4600 contacts as follows.

Personal visits to the sick or ailing in the hospital, nursing homes, and shut ins or others in need.—323

Angels On Wheels assisted those in need of transportation.—96

Made telephone calls to let our church family know we were there for them or to offer assistance.—2099

Sent personal notes or cards on birthdays and Anniversaries and most importantly to those who were sick or who had lost loved ones.—1855

Sent "We Care Cards" signed by the congregation to those in nursing homes, shut-ins, on the special prayer list, and those who were sick or disabled or had lost loved ones.—226

Notes cards were mailed to visitors and new members.—A personal note and worship folder was sent each week to our sister churches on the prayer list. Worship folders were sent each week to church members missing church service on a Sunday.

The telephone prayer chain is administered by the Deacons. We are known as a "Praying Church" with the Prayer Chain being activated approximately 45 times during 2008. These Prayers were both for church family members and other outside the church family.

When the family of a deceased member or friend requests, the Deacons prepare a "Celebration of Life" gathering following the service. Most of these require the preparation and serving of food and coffee. Celebration of Life gatherings held—3

The Home Maintenance Angel deacon assisted those members who may need help with minor home maintenance repairs.

A supply of soups or casseroles is available and delivered to members who cannot cook for themselves due to illness or released from the hospital etc.

Deacons assist the Pastor in providing Communion to shut-ins and those in nursing homes or assisted care.

At Christmas time, trays of cookies, candy and fruit were prepared and delivered to assisted living residents and to shut-ins.

The annual Golden Opportunity Days was held in May. We selected as our local mission outreach project Gamma House in Mountain Home, (a transitional shelter for homeless women and their children), which was in dire need of help of every kind. We spearheaded a successful drive to get other area churches involved in the major work that needed to be done at the House. Besides collecting hundreds of dollars worth of household items, etc., we adopted a room and painted, carpeted it, as well as making major electrical and outdoor improvements, all paid for by donations received from our church family and friends. In addition, we presented the Director of Gamma House a check for \$1095.69 designated to be used toward a badly needed new heating and cooling system.

In closing, we would like to recognize the faithful and caring ministry of Deacon Eileen Stewart who went home to be with the Lord on October 21, 2008.

Our tasks are many, and we are grateful for all the assistance, the support and the generous giving that we received during the year from our church family.

Our P.W. Thursday Bible Study held in Memorial Hall at 11:00 a.m. and lead by Laura Lenneville was very informative. It is on Women of the Bible. Come for coffee at 10:00 a.m. and then our Bible Study. Laura does a great job and we are so very happy to have her. Plan now to join us.

It was voted to approve the Debbie Heroux's Employee Contract as follows:
