Wake-up Call

The clock is ticking on American culture. God can repair our broken society, but it must start with the church.

Perhaps the greatest need of our day is revival. I'm not talking about a series of revival meetings, though that might be needed as well. I'm talking about a genuine revival in the lives of Christians that brings spiritual renewal, vibrancy, and power. What a difference it would make in our day if revival was stirring in individuals and churches and beyond!

Christian, wouldn't you like to see a move of God that changes the hearts of believers and impacts beyond to our culture? Here are three reasons why revival still matters.

We tend to drift from God.

I'm not much of a sailor, but I do know that drifting doesn't take any special effort at all. It is easy to drift from the shore. And it is easy to drift from God.

We get busy, distracted, or preoccupied and drift away. We get rebellious, sinful, or selfish and move away from God. It is easy to do and can happen with us hardly noticing.

Note that we drift from God, not towards God. Getting closer to the Lord involves intentionality. Drifting away from God can happen without any recognition or premeditation at all.

In revival, believers come back into right relationship with the Lord. In revival, there is a recognition of our sloth or sin or self-centeredness. We need revival because we tend to forget about what matters most. We tend to lose sight of God's perspective and grow stale in our religious activities.

Revival draws us back to a close, intimate relationship with the Lord.

Revival brings new life, joy, effectiveness.

Getting right with God is not to our detriment. Though there is sorrow in recognizing our sin, repentance doesn't result in our loss. Revival involves the recognition of judgment, but it leads us to restoration.

Revival is in our best interest. It leads us to the fruit of the Spirit and the joy and peace that come with walking with the Lord. Though revival can start with discomfort and even pain, it leads to healing and purpose. It reminds us of the joy of our salvation. Revival is what our soul is longing for!

Revival impacts church, community, culture.

One of the reasons we need revival so much is because of the impact revived Christians have on those around them. When churches are revived, they are more effective and focused. The revived church is more committed to evangelism and discipleships and fellowship. But, revival has an impact beyond that.

We often decry the state of our culture, and rightly so. Our culture is increasingly coarse and crude and rebellious and disrespectful to our God and the truth from God's word. Revival can open the eyes of the lost to the realities of sin and the priorities of faith. Often, revival has even resulted in large scale recognition of the need for biblical morality in the culture at large.

Let's pray for a sweeping revival in our generation. Revival still matters!

Illinois Baptist Disaster Relief in Kentucky

DECEMBER 22, 2021 BY IBSA DISASTER RELIEF

Approaching two weeks after massive tornadoes destroyed much of Mayfield, Kentucky, and other communities and left 78 dead, Illinois Baptist Disaster Relief (IBDR) volunteers remained on the scene, providing assistance to victims and families. Three units responded immediately, and since then have been reenforced or replaced by additional units from Illinois. Some 90 volunteers from Illinois have been deployed.

IBDR state director Butch Porter reports the units hope to complete their work by Friday, December 24, however "rain has delayed our work, and some of our teams may need to return in the week between Christmas and New Year," he said. "We'll be there if we're needed." On December 18, Porter issued another call out for additional chaplains to reach a neighborhood that had not yet received recovery support.

While traveling to Benton on Thursday, a DR trailer being towed by a pick-up truck flipped on the highway and landed upside down in a ditch. The trailer was damaged, but no injuries to volunteers were reported. The trailer was insured, but Metro East Baptist Association would welcome donations to cover replacement of materials they would have used on scene.

"The Gospel impact of relief is amazing because satisfying an immediate need helps to open the heart," Litton told Baptist Press. "This is something we're proud of as Southern Baptists, in the right sense, and we should be...This is our life together as Southern Baptists at its best," Litton said. "Out here everyone knows we need each other from the associational, state level to the national level."



Litton urged continued giving by Southern Baptists to support the volunteer relief ministry and storm victims. In Illinois, donations may be given through Illinois Baptist Disaster Relief. A link and explanation are on the Illinois Baptist State Association website main age, IBSA.org. Southern Baptist Disaster Relief is

the third largest relief agency in the nation. IBDR has approximately 900 trained volunteers who specialize in storm and flood recovery, support for feeding and shower/laundry units, childcare, and chaplaincy for spiritual and emotional support.

Two more of our former Pastors have gone home to heaven:

Dr. James Clinton Leischner, 85, of Cisco, Illinois, died early Friday morning, December 3, 2021 in Carle Hospital, Champaign Urbana.

When Dr. James Leischner wrote a memoir of his life in 2010, he entitled it, "Meanderings of a Tortured Mind." In this book,



he summarizes his life as being born in Decatur on April 30th, 1935. He lived in Decatur, Long Creek, and Cisco with his preacher Father J. H. Leischner, his Mother Virginia, and his family. After graduating from Monticello High School, he enlisted in the US Navy and retired with the rank of Senior Chief Petty Officer.

While in the Navy he married Delores "Dee" Hubler. After leaving the Navy, he surrendered to the ministry and served as Associate Pastor at the Lakeview Baptist Church in Decatur, Outreach Minister at Forsyth Baptist, and then as Pastor at First Southern Baptist in Findlay, New Salem Baptist in Owensville, Missouri, and Boody Southern Baptist Church. He also served for several years on an Evangelism and Revival Team with his brother Dale and Matt Underwood. During his ministry, Dr. Leischner earned Bachelor, Master's, and Doctorate Degrees in ministry.

Dr. Leischner passed into the presence of Jesus on December 3rd, 2021. He is survived by his wife, Dee, their children, Melody, Duanna, and Gary and their families. He was preceded in death by his parents, his son Sherman, and his brother Dale.
