How the Light Gets In

Scripture:

The God who said, "Out of darkness the light shall shine!" is the same God who made his light shine in our hearts, to bring us the knowledge of God's glory shining in the face of Christ.

Yet we who have this spiritual treasure are like common clay pots, in order to show that the supreme power belongs to God, not to us. 2 Corinthians 4:6-7

The letters to the church in Corinth seek to heal a community that is fractured and divided—splintered by competing voices and deepening divisions. Paul reminds the community that there may be people with what looks like official authorization commissioning them to be missionaries, but it is apparent from their work and witness that they have not been commissioned by Jesus Christ—there is a contradiction between their teachings and the teachings of Jesus. Paul emphasizes that the success of ministry does not depend on human skill, discipline or power, but on God's power and spirit. Pathrapankal, theologian Joseph seminary professor in India, writing for the new Global Bible Commentary, notes, "Indeed, we need to rediscover the power of

These texts to bring new vision within our communities, and help us see our communities in a new light." 1

"This extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us." Leonard Cohen's song "Anthem" includes the words, "There is a crack in everything / That's how the light gets in." 2 Those words are an echo of Paul's words, "We have this treasure in clay jars."

In The Message, a paraphrase of the Bible, Eugene Peterson writes: "It started when God said, 'Light up the darkness!' and our lives filled up with light as we saw and understood God in the face of Christ, all bright and beautiful" (2 Corinthians 4:6).

During the reign of apartheid in South Africa, congregations began using the Amnesty International symbol of barbed wire wrapped around a candle. South Africans living in brutal poverty created candles surrounded by barbed wire on pieces of wood, and placed them in sanctuaries and homes, in windows and on altars, as reminders of the power of God already at work to undo the power of apartheid. During worship, the names of those who had been banned or exiled, arrested or executed by the apartheid government were called out, an illegal act at the time, and the candle was lit as the congregation prayed: "For the light has come into the world and the darkness has never overcome it." The prayer countered the narrative of the apartheid government, which declared that apartheid reflected the will of God and would remain in force despite protests and nonviolent justice movements. Echoing Archbishop Desmond Tutu, the South African bishop, human rights activist, writer and nonviolent warrior, the candle reminded people that God had taken sides. Apartheid could not stand and was already becoming undone.

The candles and this prayer practice became so threatening to the apartheid government that soldiers were ordered to seize the candles from sanctuaries, to break through windows in homes where the candles were on display. The apartheid government recognized the power of this candle prayer to redefine the narrative and embolden a people willing to openly defy, engage and transform the powers of death, empire and colonization in the name of the God of life and liberation.

When I [Janet Wolf] first saw apartheid in South Africa, the brutal apartheid system appeared over-whelmingly powerful and immovable. I remember hoping that my children would see the day when freedom came, never imagining that I would one day dance in the streets of a free South Africa. My hope was so small. Each time I light the candle, I remembers the outrageous hope and creative courage, the holy boldness and relentless truth-telling of the South African freedom movement, their kin-dom* living and loving, and hope grows larger. 3

*kin-dom: This term was first coined by Ada Maria Isasi-Diaz. It emphasizes relationality, community and equity as the basis of God's reign.

Thoughts to ponder:

When have your hopes been too small? What communal practices might you identify to remind you that the dark-ness has never overcome the Light?
