

A Light that Interrupts

Scripture: Luke 1:78-79

Our God is merciful and tender. He will cause the bright dawn of salvation to rise on us and to shine from heaven on all those who live in the dark shadow of death, to guide our steps into the path of peace.

Scripture: John 1:1, 4-5, 14a

Before the world was created, the Word already existed; he was with God, and he was the same as God.

The Word was the source of life, and this life brought light to mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has never put it out.

The Word became a human being and, full of grace and truth, lived among us.

Zechariah, the father of John the Baptist, is filled with the Holy Spirit at his son's birth and celebrates the tender mercy of God, light for all who sit in darkness, a dawn that will guide our feet into the paths of peace. We read his words at the end of Luke 1.

And in John's Gospel, we hear the exclamation: Jesus is the true light that

splinters all darkness, the light that has never been overcome, the light that dwells among us, a source of life and light for all people.

As we celebrate the birth of Jesus, God's light splintering the darkness, we are invited to identify where and how that light shines in the world around us. The following story is taken from the mission study Practicing Resurrection: The Gospel of Mark and Radical Discipleship:

When they announced that Christmas Eve services were to take place at the state maximum-security prison, I [Janet Wolf] was not enthused. The pastor urged us to attend, emphasizing the story of incarnation, the Word becoming flesh among us, this baby born to an unwed

teenage mama among an oppressed, colonized, and impoverished people. "This story belongs in the streets," he argued, "the body of Christ in and for and with the world."

When we arrived at the prison that night, we were told that we couldn't go Something had happened at the prison, and we would have to hold our service outside. And even though this was Nashville, Tennessee, it was snowing. We were a sad little handful of people, huddled outside the immense prison, snow and sleet swirling around us. This was not my idea of Christmas Eve. Christmas Eve for me had included brilliant poinsettias and candles lighting up the rafters in the sanctuary. Christmas Eve was trumpets and pageantry, majestic music and bright colors, the choir spilling down the aisle, little children dressed up like angels and shepherds. Once we even had a live donkey. But here we were, standing in the cold. And I was pretty sure no one inside even knew we were there. My children were going to get sore throats and earaches and then I'd have to miss work. This was so definitely not my idea of Christmas Eve.

As all this went through my head, our group huddled together, trying to get the Christ candle lit. The fierce wind extinguished the match every time. A member of the group who was trying to help shield the flame handed me the Bible and said, "Read this." And I did, from Isaiah 9:2: "The people who walked in darkness have seen great light . . . on them light has shined."

Just about that time, the Christ candle was lit and I leaned in, trying to help my children light their small candles. And still in my heart I was grumbling, sure this moment could not possibly matter to anyone. But then one of my boys tugged on my coat. "Mama, look!" I turned to look where he was pointing and saw, in cell after cell, the glow of matches and lighters being held up to the windows, light spilling through the bars. As we began singing "Silent Night, Holy Night," I imagined I heard voices inside and out, singing with the joy and awe of those who have turned to see what God is doing in the world around us.

Questions to ponder:

When and how have you "turned" to discover God's light that splinters darkness?

How have you invited others to turn and discover what God is doing in the world?

Closing Prayer

When the song of the angels is stilled when the star in the sky is gone when the kings and princes are home

when the kings and princes are home when the shepherds are back with their flocks

the work of Christmas begins:

to find the lost

to heal the broken

to release the prisoner

to rebuild the nations

to bring peace among the people

to make music in the heart.

May it be so. Amen.

United Methodist Student Day

What is Student's Day? One of six church-wide Special Sundays with offerings of The United Methodist Church, United Methodist Student Day takes place the first Sunday after Thanksgiving. This Special Sunday calls the church to support students as they prepare for life in uniting faith with knowledge. The special offering provides scholarships for qualified United Methodist applicants. When you give generously on United Methodist Student Day, you support students as they prepare for life in uniting faith with knowledge. What students have to say:

The United Methodist Church believes that every person has the right to education and that the responsibility of educating young people rests with the family, faith communities, and the government. On United Methodist Student Day, we have the opportunity to support scholarships and low-interest loans that help young leaders achieve their dreams. Morgan Murdock, a 2018 graduate of North Carolina State University, was a Gift of Hope scholar. According to her, when we give on United Methodist Student Day, "You are reminding and encouraging students of all majors and walks of life to remain constant in their faith and to continue to uphold the great qualities that The United Methodist Church has instilled in us. The church has shown me so much unconditional love over the years in many forms, and this was a very meaningful form of that love. I was encouraged to pursue more in my community and remember the church that helped make me who I am." As a child who experienced being bullied, Benjamin Carlson found refuge in his church. As a college student, the Gift of Hope scholarship offset some of his college expenses and he says it "reinforced my understanding that The United Methodist Church supports [its] students."

NEWS FROM STAFF/PASTOR PARISH RELATIONS COMMITTEE

Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committee recently met and dealt with the following:

- Accepted the resignation of Kathy Scudder as treasurer. Hired Donna Kuhner as treasurer effective November 1, 2020.
- 2. Reviewed all staff salaries. Upper **New York Conference** recommended an increase of 1.7% for 2021. Recommended that increase to Finance Committee for pastor, financial secretary and organist. Administrative assistant and treasurer salaries will be reviewed for possible increase after completing 6 months employment. Custodian and assistant will receive New York State minimum wage increase for 2021. All salaries are subject to approval by Finance Committee and Church Council.
- Completed the S/PPRC Advisory form for UNY Conference. We recommend that the current pastor's ministry continue for 2021-2022. However, we have concerns that need to be addressed.
- 4. Completed the Pastor-S/PPRC Covenant form.
- 5. In the near future we will be working on updating the church profile.

Touchless thermometers have been purchased and will be used to take the temperature of members and staff as they enter the building.

Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committee is responsible for maintaining communication with the pastor and employees. If you have a question or an issue with any of them or

with another member of the congregation, please contact a member of the committee. It is our responsibility to attempt to resolve such issues.


