Report from the Virginia Synod

On Saturday, June 12, Pastor Sherrie and John and Diane Colin spent from 9AM-4PM on the Zoom Annual Synod Assembly. There were 140 ministers and 213 lay members for a total of 353 in attendance. The day was led by Bishop Robert Humphrey, Assistant to the Bishop, The Reverend Kelly Bayer-Derrick and Synod Secretary, Blythe Ann Scott. They did an exceptional job balancing the tasks for the day and working the agenda of the Zoom conference. Our morning began and the afternoon concluded with worship.

In 2019, Bishop Humphrey's theme was "Faithful" and the image was Jesus as the bridge to God. All people are welcome on the bridge. This year, the theme was "Bold" and the image was a table. Who has a place at the table? All people – no exceptions. The theme verse was Ephesians 4:1-3: Be completely humble and gentle. Be patient, bearing with one another in love. Live a life worthy of your calling you received, making every effort to maintain a unity of spirit through the bond of peace.

Bishop Humphrey spoke of the need to recognize all people as worthy of being at the Lord's Table. He shared that the Holy Spirit is doing something <u>NEW</u>. We should be alert, learning, listening and trying new things, creating communities of love, collaborating with others of diversity and being "church together" for the work of the Lord. As God is faithful to all, we should be bolder in our lives and in our ministries.

Several reports were given including AMMPARO which stands for Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities. Due to the work of the ELCA in under-developed countries, 88-90% of the people decide NOT to migrate to the US. Reports of Hungry Mother Lutheran Retreat Center and Carolina Furnace Camps were given. The budget was passed. We voted to change the 2022 Compensation Guidelines for Called Pastors, with a 1.3% increase. There is now a formula for housing based on Comps in an area. Recognitions of First Called Pastors and those celebrating an anniversary or who had passed away were held. Pastor Sherrie was recognized for 15 years of ministry. Lakeside Lutheran was recognized for our 27th anniversary and Reverend Olson was recognized for his many years of service and his passing. Diane Colin,

Worship Matters

July 4th: We are on the **6th** Sunday of Pentecost. Jesus does great deeds of power and gives his disciples authority over demons; however, it all must be received by faith. Jesus asks his disciples to go out without money or supplies, so that they will be dependent on how others receive them. When we are sent out, we are to be dependent on the reception of others as well. The Spirit always operates in the "between": between Jesus and his Father, between Jesus and us, between you and me, between us and those to whom we are sent. Our music includes songs of faith such as "Knowing You" and "How Firm a Foundation." The Traditional Service at 9:30 will return to **Setting 4**. The paraments continue to be **green**, signifying anticipation and hope in the resurrection, each new day. We receive Holy Communion at both services. As is our tradition, we will sing "God Bless America" after the blessing, also at both services.


July 11th: On this7th Sunday of Pentecost, we hear that speaking out in truth comes at a risk of being killed, such as happened to John the Baptist, Jesus, the prophets and the Disciples. Psalm 85 says, "I will listen to what the Lord is saying." Our music this day includes "Just a Closer Walk with Thee," and "Faith of Our Fathers."

July 18th: On this **8th** Sunday of Pentecost, Mark's gospel makes clear how great is the press of the crowd, with its countless needs to be met, on Jesus and his disciples. Yet in today's gospel Jesus advises his disciples to get away and rest, to take care of themselves. Sometimes we think that when others are in great need we shouldn't think of ourselves at all; but Jesus also honors the caregivers' need. As we receive Holy Communion today, we are sent from Christ's table to care for others and for ourselves. Music for the day includes "Amazing Grace, My Chains Are Gone," "When Morning Gilds the Skies" and "Blest Are They."

July 25th: On this 9th Sunday of Pentecost, we begin the first of five Sundays with gospel readings from John 6, the first four of which focus on Jesus as bread of life. Today Jesus feeds thousands of people with five loaves and two fish. What we have, what we bring to Jesus' table, seems like it is not nearly enough to meet all the needs we see around us. But it is not the adequacy of our supplies or our skills that finally makes the difference: it is the power of Jesus working in the littlest and least to transform this world into the world God desires, a world where all the hungry are satisfied. Paraments are green. Music of the day may include "Loaves Were Broken, Words Were Spoken," "Open Now Thy Gates of Beauty," and "Jesus Calls Us." A reminder that Holy Communion is normally on the first and third Sundays of the month and on Festival Sundays.

There is no Hymn of the Month for July.

WHAT IF...our church became more blessed?

This is the final article from *Becoming a Blessed Church*, by author, N. Graham Standish. The book concludes with part three, dedicated to helping those in leadership positions in the church. In our Lutheran Church, this is not only our dedicated Church Council Members (which includes the pastor) who oversee every committee having to do with the operation of the ministries of our church, but also all sub-committees and smaller ministries that include ALL people. Therefore, ALL people take on some portion of leadership within the church.

Standish points out that leadership begins with leaders-pastoral and laity-who are willing to help their churches move toward new horizons where God, Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit are leading. Becoming a blessed church requires leaders who genuinely want their congregations to bear love, grace, mercy, forgiveness and life of Christ in their midst. Two sides of the coin make it difficult to lead without God-led leadership. One side is that of adapting to a new era in healthy church ministries as new people arrive with different needs, gifts and talents to offer. The church must be ready and able to embrace new approaches, new members and often embrace changes in community, culture and/or a healthy fiscal life. This is evident in the past year and a half as much changed in our worship and community fellowship due to Covid-19 restrictions. The other side of the coin he points out, is the yearning for what he terms as "the golden era" when being a church was much easier. People just came to church. Pastors just preached "normal" sermons and didn't need to think about technology or preaching styles. Standish points out that leading a church to blessedness means living and leading in such a way that God's purpose, presence and power flow through *everything*. This is done by relying less on the gifts and skills of pastors and laity, and **more on God's grace**.

Listening to and for God's will, direction and timing are all important. As leaders, we are called upon to listen and to listen so we can hear. That begins with prayer. He reminds us that Jesus constantly prayed to the Father before deciding anything. He points us to the book of Acts that is filled with examples of early Christians and apostles seeking God's guidance in community as well as in solitude. The biblical example is that God speaks to us when we seek God's guidance. Scripture is vital. Being rooted in scripture teaches us how to listen to God, but we must actively seek God in prayer if we are to hear God. With regards to education programs within the church, Standish pays attention to the four kinds of people who are attracted to the life in any church denomination: onlookers, followers, disciples and apostles. These are loosely based on the kinds of people who gathered around Jesus' feet to learn from him on the Sermon on the Mount. Onlookers attend church and may like most of what they hear and see there, including the people, but they only attend and are reluctant to become involved. Followers are committed to serving God in the church. They pray and attend church regularly, love others and want to grow their faith. They believe they can be God's hands and feet in the world. A disciple is one who has committed his or her whole life to deep learning about God and a life in Christ by taking the extra step that says, "I will put Christ first in everything." They change everything about the way they live in order to be like Christ. All of us have been called to be disciples, but Standish replies that not all respond yes to the call. Finally, those who grow into apostles often go on to become seminary students to go into some facet of ministry. While not all are called to be apostles in seminary, the ultimate goal is for us to become something *like* an apostle.

His point here is that the Christian Education (CE) programs in the church should be offering an assortment of studies for the above four groups to continue in their growth. *Onlookers* shy away from even the Small Group programs that are available, so it is difficult to engage them in CE programs. Small Groups, Bible Studies, Sunday School and monthly, weekly and bi-weekly offerings should be available in order to meet the needs of the congregation.

In the final portion of the book, Standish shares insights for leaders in forming task forces and small teams to work with the pastor in effective leadership that will lead the church into blessedness. It all begins and ends with God.



What is Stewardship?

Stewardship is our topic today, presenting the question: what is the appropriate relationship between each of us and the things of this world? For centuries, the major religions and philosophies have answered this question, generally with the principle that it's best not to get too attached to the things of the world. Both Buddhism and the Stoics of ancient Rome counseled this, and the New Testament echoes the sentiment when Jesus tells us that we should not put our faith in the things that moths and rust will corrupt (Matthew 6:19).

This is wise counsel. But I believe the definitive teaching of the Bible on this subject is actually quite different. It is found at the very start of the Scriptures, in Genesis, and is captured in the word "stewardship."

Let's recap. God creates the heavens and the earth and all that's in it. He then plants a perfect garden, the garden of Eden. And then? He makes man from the dust of the earth, and in due course he makes woman, and he puts them in His garden "to work and keep it." In short, Adam and Eve were created by God to be stewards of His garden, and by extension, His world and all that He has created.

And so too for us. We are not to distance ourselves from the world like the Stoics, for after all, God created this world and declared it all to be good. But by the same token, we are not to claim ownership of the things in our lives. For all this has been given us by God, our Father, to be held in trust for His benefit. We are, like Adam and Eve before us, stewards, working the gifts God has given us.

Traditionally, Church Stewardship focuses on Time and Talents. These are actually three gifts from God. Biblical Talents were a form of money. Thus, as good stewards, we are to yield a portion of our money back to God in the form of tithing to His church and the church's missions. Talents also refers to those special abilities each of us have, given us to improve lives in our church and communities. And Time, this is the most precious of God's gifts to us. We are to set aside a portion of the time we have on this earth to further God's purposes for us and for His world.

Your Stewardship Committee will be helping to coordinate and publish opportunities in all these areas for each of you to prayerfully discover what God has in mind for your own Time and Talents. So, stay tuned, thou good and faithful stewards!

Getting the word out about Lakeside Lutheran Church and all it has to offer is a pretty big undertaking. Fortunately there's a committee for that.

The Evangelism Committee, chaired by Betsy Freeman, uses things like Facebook, and printed media to inform people inside and outside the church of all the fun and helpful activities going on in the church. Other members include Pastor Sherrie Hofmann, Joyce Walker, Bev Noland, Ken Hinrichs, and Scott Hofmann.

While Covid made it difficult to have activities during 2020, the group has been busy making plans for activities for the rest of the year.

"Now that the church is opening back up, we are doing all we can to inform new people to our area about our church and activities we are offering," Betsy said.

Beside word of mouth, the group posts regular notices on many Facebook pages about church activities and the YouTube Services each Sunday.

The group also participates in helping with the John 3:16 Center.



"Our first "God's Work Our Hands" activity for the year will be to help feed the John 3:16 campers during their summer session," Betsy shared. "We have selected four Wednesdays of camp to provide a meal for up to 20 children representing different countries each day that they will be studying."

Puzzles have become very popular during the Covid 19 so we plan on setting up a table where members, as well as others in the community can have a "puzzle exchange." Others will be able to visit the church and select a puzzle to try before they return it for another puzzle.

"September 12th is **God's Work, Our Hands** Sunday. It is also the Sunday we plan on the dedication of our new addition," Betsy confided. "Earlier this year Diane Colin presented the idea of painting **Signs of Hope** to be placed on the hill of the church. We have decided to have a workshop in late August or early September to paint our signs to be used during the dedication. More information will be announced later."

The group is also responsible for helping guests at the church to feel welcome. Betsy said that beginning in July the church will again employ greeters for Sunday morning services.
