Nominating Committee

In September, the Nominating Committee will begin work contacting Lakeside Lutheran Church members to fill open Council positions and a new 2022 Nominating Committee. This year's members of the Nominating Committee are Bob Roegner, Peggy Kimble and Bey Noland.

According to Lakeside Lutheran Church's Constitution and By-Laws, congregational leaders must be elected for the next year. The following positions are open for 2022:

President	One year term
Vice-President	One year term
Secretary	One year term
Treasurer	One year term
Christian Education Chair	Two year term
Evangelism Chair	Two year term
Social Ministry Chair	Two year term
Stewardship Chair	Two year term
Nominating Committee	One Year Term

All <u>officers</u> will need to be elected because they all end their one year term (President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer). No elected officer is eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office. The President and Treasurer are currently in their first term and can, therefore, be nominated to run again for their current office, but the Vice-President and Secretary are completing their second term and, therefore, **cannot** run again for their current office. Four standing committees, Christian Education, Evangelism, Social Ministry and Stewardship need a Chair for a two year term, plus three people need to be found for the Nominating Committee. The election for these positions will be held at the November Congregational meeting.

Currently the Nominating Committee is contacting outgoing Council members for their interest in running again for the Council. Contacting other members will begin in earnest in September. We will try and determine nominees by October 1. If you have questions about the duties of the open positions contact Bob, Peggy or Bev.

Take some time, give some thought and then offer your prayers for guidance about signing up for one of these positions. These positions represent some of the leaders of Lakeside Lutheran Church who will give vision and direction in the coming years. Please help our congregation be what God calls it to be.

Worship Matters


September 5: We are on the **15th** Sunday after Pentecost. After spending five weeks in August hearing from the Gospel of John about Jesus as the Bread of Life, we return to the Gospel of Mark this day where we find Jesus as Healer. The seventh chapter of Mark is where we find Jesus healing a little girl with a demon and healing a deaf man with a speech impediment. Jesus "orders" them to tell no one about these miracles, but scripture says the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. The gospel tells us that God shows no partiality. Everyone who brings a need to Jesus is received with equal honor as a child and heir. The parament color remains **green.** Music for the day includes *Open Our Eyes Lord; Healer of Our Every Ill; Lord, I Lift Your Name on High; Change My Heart, O God; I Love to Tell the Story; Praise to the Lord, the Almighty.*

Holy Communion will be held at both services. The Traditional Service returns to 10:30 September 5th.

September 12: On this 16th Sunday after Pentecost, we will have one combined service at 9:30. We will welcome Bishop Robert Humphrey as our guest who will be delivering the sermon. Pastor Kim Triplett will serve as Assisting Minister. Our readings for the day include James 3:1-12 warning of the dangers of an unbridled tongue; Mark 8 where we read of Peter's confession; Psalm 116:1-9 which reads, "I will walk in the presence of the Lord." What a special worship service it will be with the dedication of our new addition at the close of the service. Music for the day will be traditional hymns including *The Church's One Foundation; Immortal, Invisible; and A Mighty Fortress*. Since it is also designated as "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday, we will sing a hymn with that title but to the tune of *Earth and All Stars*.

September 19: On this **17th** Sunday after Pentecost, we hear James warn against selfish ambition, while the disciples quarrel over which one of them is the greatest. Jesus tells them the way to be great is to serve. Then, to make it concrete, he puts in front of them a flesh-and-blood child. We are called to welcome the children God puts in front of us, to make room for them in daily interaction, and to give them a place of honor in the assembly. Holy Communion will be served. Music for the day includes: *All Are Welcome; In the Singing; Children of the Heavenly Father; Will You Let Me Be Your Servant* and *Touched With Grace*. The paraments remain **green.** The services return to 8:00 and 10:30 a.m.

September 26th: On this **18th** Sunday after Pentecost, we hear James 5:13-20 explain that the marks of the Christian community include praying for those who are sick and in need, celebrating with those in good health, restoring those who have strayed, confessing sins to one another, and offering forgiveness to each other. Mark 9:38-50 is the Gospel of the day. On the way to Jerusalem, Jesus teaches his disciples about ministry that involves service and sacrifice. His disciples are slow to realize that these words apply to them as well as to others. Music for the day includes *Go, Make Disciples; Spirit of God Descend Upon My Heart and More Precious Than Silver.* The paraments remain green.

Perhaps that seems like a pretty lame way to start an article, but for we coffee connoisseurs and chocoholics who are also socially conscious and desirous to lift up our fellow man, the Coffee Cart, (located in an out of the way place to the left in the narthex) is essential!

Perhaps you didn't know that the Coffee Cart, one of the many activities covered under the Social Ministries committee and carried out by Sara's Circle as part of WELCA, is a worldwide ministry that supports small farmers. Founded in 1986, the company, Equal Exchange, focuses on providing fair value for products from the North, South and Central America, Africa and Asia, and specializes in coffee, chocolate, tea and other grocery items. Churches across the world participate in the program which helps keep small farmers in business.

Here at Lakeside Lutheran Church, we offer three styles of Equal Exchange packaged coffee, organic teas, eight specialty chocolates, hot cocoa mix and unsweetened baking cocoa. According to Sara's Circle leader Elizabeth Groeger, the group buys the products and sells them to members and visitors at cost.

"The high quality products that we offer are mostly those that have proven to be popular with Lakeside Lutheran members," said Elizabeth.

How high is the quality of these products? Well, as one who has tried all eight specialty chocolates, I have to say it's the best chocolate I've ever eaten. It doesn't rely heavily on sugar to make it good. It reminds me of chocolate when I was a kid. Instead of devouring a whole bar in one sitting, I can make it last several days — it's that satisfying.

But don't take my word for it. Fellow chocoholic, Gus Best, has been known to clean out the cart at times. "The milk chocolate is my favorite," he said. "That's what I get when they have it."

And the coffee, well, take Nancy Roegner's word for it, the Hazelnut Decaf is the best. "I mix it with my regular decaf, just a hint", she said. "I have a cup at night and I don't have to worry about not sleeping."

Nancy mentioned the positive social aspects as well. "I know the money goes directly to the farmer and since I'm the grandchild of a farmer I know how important that support is."

So how important is it that you support the Coffee Cart. Well, right now it's very important. Sara's Circle leaders are reevaluating the ministry and will decide soon whether or not it will continue. You can show your support by contacting Elizabeth at 252-257-9258 or Margaret Apps at 252-535-4670 with suggestions or to let them know what your favorite products are.

You can also buy the products on the Coffee Cart. Don't be intimidated. It's on the honor system. All you have to do is pick your product and deposit the money in the money box. The prices are conveniently displayed on a price list for you. You can use check, cash or an IOU. Then, ENJOY!

The best way to learn more about Equal Exchange is to try their products. It is highly likely that you will be greatly satisfied. You can also visit their web site at https://equalexchange.coop. You are also encouraged to talk with Elizabeth or Margaret – they would love to tell you more and get feed back from you about your favorite items. This way, the Coffee Cart will continue, that wonderful chocolate, coffee and tea will be available, the farmers will gain support and Sara's Circle accomplishes its mission. It's a win-win-win and it doesn't get much better than that.

Vision 2020 update

The VISION 2020 building addition is on track to be completed and dedicated in September. As of this writing we still have many small tasks remaining, but the end is in sight. With the brick exterior finally done (they didn't order enough brick) the in-ground plumbing and final portico roofing & flashing was finished. Next comes concrete pads, HVAC, rough grading, perimeter drains, steel posts, soffit & gables.

After years of planning and preparation followed by months of construction and COVID related delays, we're close to opening the doors to expanded facilities of God's house. Many people are expressing thanks to me for my work on this. You're welcome. It was a labor of love and service to my God. But the real thanks must go to the dozens of people who lead or served on the various project committees and teams, and the donors who gave of their funds to start this.

In 2017 the Council recognized we had a lack of space for our growing activities and chartered an exploratory committee of Ed Sever, Lynn Norton, Jan Finch, Bill Gortemiller, David Zimmerman, and George Kimble to determine what we could do with the ~\$180K accumulated in the Building Fund. They spent a frustrating year looking at creative options before concluding that building a 1 room addition to the choir room or glassing in the pavilion with just on-hand funds wouldn't solve the space problem. They determined we needed to organize and plan for a broader facilities expansion with fund raising. That discerning group deserves thanks for that critical finding.

Taking that advice, Council formed a visioning (building planning) committee to conduct congregational surveys and interview the standing committees to identify and prioritize facilities requirements and define the scope of the project. **Joyce Walker, Jim Noland, George Kimble, Ed Sever, Nancy Roegner** and I did that work. With the support of retired ELCA church architect Pete Norgren—who designed our current building-- we presented a concept with floor plans for an addition and renovations to 3 rooms of the current building. The congregation voted to approve, and the project became VISION 2020. Thank you planning committee for defining clear requirements that were suitable, feasible, and acceptable.

To research builders and methods to execute the plan, the Council formed a Building Committee, and a Finance Committee to manage project finances. Bill Goertemiller as Chairman with Joel Everhart, Joe Armstrong, Bob Roegner, John Colin, Bill Fowler, and transitioning planners Joyce Walker, Nancy Roegner and I contacted design engineers & architects, interviewed multiple builders, made site-visits, did due diligence, and selected a finalist who would do a firm-fixed price design/build contract. Susan Bersch became Finance Chair and with Barry Munson planned the capitol campaign and searched for favorable loans. We were saddened by the death of Bill Goertemiller, who led us to that critical stage. I accepted Council's request to step back into a leadership role until completion. The Building Committee engaged many members as advisors in their iterative work to refine and approve detailed architectural and engineering plans. Thank you, Building Committee members and advisors.

We all owe a debt of gratitude to members of three specialty teams for months of work. Jack West led kitchen cabinet and countertop construction by David Zimmerman, Bill Fowler, Scott Miller, John Colin, Walter Harris (Jacks neighbor) and I, with transportation and installation support from Charlie Hendren and Clay Huntington. A color and finishes team of Margaret Best and Hank Norfleet spent weeks designing prior to Committee approval. An audio/visual team of Gus Best, Ken Hinrichs, and John Colin researched new technologies and vendors and made site visits before selecting an A/V contractor. Thank you to all who donated above and beyond your normal giving to LLC for the VISION 2020 building

Thank you to all who donated above and beyond your normal giving to LLC for the VISION 2020 building fund project. You made this possible. Thank you to the volunteers who made additional designated giving or direct purchases of needed cabinet building materials, appliances, and A/V equipment to better equip the new building than the budget allowed. My apologies to anyone I failed to acknowledge.

When you look at or enter the new structure say a prayer of thanks to God. Next comes Phase 2 renovation to convert the old kitchen into a parlor/meeting room and a sacristy room and renovate the choir room & storage room. And of course, start paying on the mortgage.

Each of us is called to bring creativity, purpose and passion to our vocation, no matter what that is." From artist and writer Julia Cameron: "The dedication of our work to a higher cause than our own self-promotion frees the work from preciousness. It becomes not about how good we are, but about how good we can be in selfless service to something that is larger than ourselves. When we take art into the realm of sacred, whenever we make it an act of service in any form, we experience the ease of creative flow and lessening of our creative doubts. When we make art in the spirit of service, it lightens the burden of our own ego."

Truly, the yard signs reflect the people who created them, many who said it therapeutic and fun to just do something easy together! Special thanks to Betsy Freeman and Nancy Roegner whose committees supported the idea, Alexa Molden who provided additional acrylic paints, supplies, refreshments and coffee, and to John Colin who coordinated the wood supplies and tools for assembly. Many thanks to all the painters! Volunteers will be needed on September 11th to drive the stakes in the ground. May all who participated and all who see the signs be blessed.

ELCA Daily Bread Matching Grant Awarded
